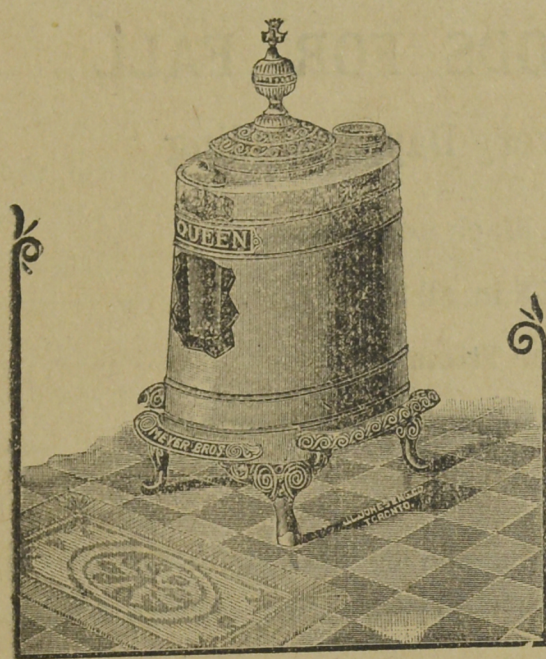

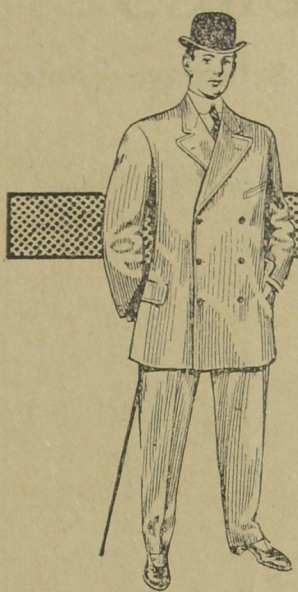

BY POPULAR BEAR TRAIN.

Captain Amundsen Will Travel North in State.

NEW YORK, October 17.—Captain Ronald Amundsen, the Arctic explorer, who arrived today on the Oscar II., said he will make an attempt to reach the north pole in 1910. He announced that he is having four big polar bears trained to haul sleds by an expert in Hamburg and intends to use them in the far north. He said also that he and his friends are going to petition President Roosevelt and the United States government to allow the vessel, Gjøa, in which he navigated the northwest passage in 1904, to be the first to pass through the Panama canal upon its completion. The Gjøa formerly was a whaling vessel, 794 tons, and is now undergoing repairs in the Mare Island navy yard at San Francisco. It was during the northwest passage trip that Captain Amundsen discovered the north magnetic pole.

in need of correct information. Why any school boy in the sixth grade at school can tell them of the blunders they have made. (Laughter and Cheers.)

THE VALLEY RAILWAY.

The St. John Valley Railway project, said the speaker, Mr. Hazen is pleased to refer to as "nebulous." When this matter was before the House the opposition found themselves in a very tight place, as they did not want to support it and they dare not vote against it. The St. John Valley Railway is not nebulous but a necessity calling for attention on the part of our public men. As premier he had taken the matter up and had succeeded in getting legislation passed providing for a bond guarantee of \$15,000 per mile to MacKenzie and Mann, if they would undertake the work. This was a great forward step and he was afraid his supporters in the Legislature would not look upon it with favor, but they were a unit in support of it. The legislation was passed in good faith, and MacKenzie and Mann sent engineers over the ground. Upon receipt of their report they told the government very frankly that the route had been found favorable from a traffic standpoint, but as it would cost in the vicinity of \$40,000 per mile to construct, they would like the bond guarantee increased from \$15,000 to \$30,000 per mile. With the government holding a first mortgage for \$15,000 per mile, they said it would be impossible for them to finance for the remainder of the money required to construct the road. He had hope yet that the project would be carried out, although he thought the bond guarantee of the province should be limited to \$15,000. If the company could raise \$15,000 per mile themselves, perhaps with some more assistance from the Dominion Government they would be enabled to build the road. As Minister of Public Works he would be in a better position than ever before to serve the province, and with the assistance of Col. McLean, whom he wished to congratulate, every effort he could put forth would be exerted to secure a railway down the St. John Valley. (Cheers.)

The Minister next referred to the great Liberal demonstration at Halifax in honor of Hon. W. S. Fielding which he attended, and paid a glowing tribute to the worth of that great statesman. He was confident that after the next election Nova Scotia will still have eighteen Liberals in the Dominion Parliament.

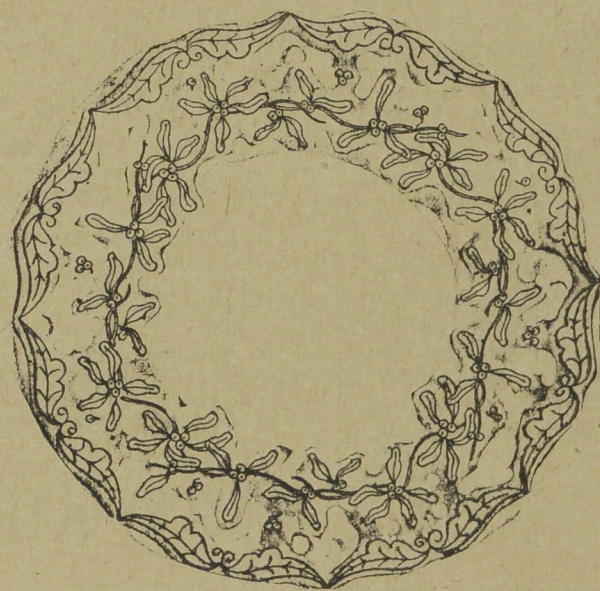
Proceeding, the Minister said it

was his earnest desire as far as possible to have Canadian trade carried through Canadian channels instead of having it go through American ports. The matter was of interest to Queens and Sunbury. He wanted to see a great and prosperous city built up right here at home where our young men can go and find employment instead of going to the west. It was sometimes said that he was not an old time Liberal, but it was a fact that he had left the Conservative party before the general election of 1896, when he ran as an independent candidate in St. John. He was proud of the great leader of the Liberal party, Sir Wilfred Laurier, who, whether at home or abroad, in parliament or at the colonial conference conducted himself in such a way as to make it absolutely certain that he will always do the right thing at the right time. (Cheers.) In view of that and in view of the wise and progressive policy this government has carried out, if he had not left the Conservative party in 1896, he would have felt it his duty long ago to have thrown in his lot with the Liberal party and do his best to assist it.

ELECTORAL PURITY.

Discussing electoral purity Hon. Dr. Pugsley said that they all agreed that elections should be free from the use of undue influences. While he did not deny that money was spent on both sides, he could not help condemning the hypocrisy shown by the leaders of the Conservative party on this question. Mr. Borden in his speech in St. John complained that he had been defeated in Halifax because the Liberals had spent money. If there is anything I hate it is hypocrisy, but lying is bad too. (Laughter.) I have had to put up with a good deal of it in my time. Many men have their weaknesses, but that is no excuse for their being guilty of hypocrisy. When I heard of Mr. Borden and his followers claiming that the Liberals were wholesale and retail election thieves I thought it time to speak out. I mentioned a fact known to a number of people, that among a small circle in Montreal there was gathered together in 1904 an enormous election fund to corrupt the people of Canada. I mentioned that \$25,000 had been sent to one constituency in this province to secure the election of a Tory candidate. My remarks created quite a storm and they were good enough to tell me that I

UNION IS SPREADING.

Churches in China and Japan Drawing Together.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., October 17.—The twenty-sixth annual convention of the Board of Management of the Women's Missionary Society of the Canadian Methodist church. The afternoon session was occupied largely in formalities and in conducting a memorial service for Mrs. E. E. Long by Mrs. J. B. Willmott, Toronto.

At the evening session Mrs. E. S. Strachan, field corresponding secretary, read the report of the year's work of the organization in Japan and China. The report showed a spirit of unionism abroad among the churches. In Japan the Methodist Episcopal, the Methodist Episcopal South, and the Canadian Methodist churches. To the first general conference of this body two women delegates had been sent. In China efforts

at uniting all the Protestant denominations had not yet succeeded, but a combination of the various Methodist churches was a thing to be anticipated in the near future.

The report of the treasurer showed the balance now in the bank to be \$83,558.14; total expenditure during the year \$82,666.10.

Mrs. (Dr.) A. Carman, vice-president, gave an address, dwelling especially on the great need for missionary work among the "strangers within our gates." The session continued all this week.
