HORRIBLE DEATH

Marine Diver Suffocated While Pursuing His
Calling Under Thirty Feet of Water

(Special Despatch to Herald.)

WINDSOR, Ont., August 3.—Death, in one of the most terrifying forms, came to Marshal Townshend, a marine diver, while the man was at work at the bottom of Lake St. Clair yesterday morning.

Townshend was clothed in his full diving outfit and had descended about thirty feet to inspect an intake pipe at Algonac.

The descent was made successfully, in the usual way, and Townshend apparently went at once to work, as the signal ropes indicated.

Suddenly there came two

sharp jerks on the signal rope, which the men above took to mean a call for more air, and the men immediately doubled the supply.

They then waited for nearly five minutes, when no further signals coming up, the men became alarmed, and began to haul him to the surface, when his thick copper helmet, cased in heavy flat glass rose above the water.

It was found that the air hose had been broken off and Townshend had been suffocated.

Heroic efforts at resuscitation were unavailing. No blame is attached to anyone.

SMELL ALL RIGHT

Edmonton Hospital Patient Rescued From Perilous
Position by Peculiar Tactics—A Bottle of
Whiskey Used as Decoy

EDMONTON, Alta., August 3.—George E. E. Wood, a young

carpenter, patient at Misori da hospital, gave the staff a bad fright and narrowly escaped meeting a horrible death.

While temporarily insane, Wood made a dash for the window of his room in the third story, and to the consternation of the nurses, got out at the stone cornice a foot wide, which runs about on a level with the window sill.

Garbed to a large extent in his own majesty, the man walked up and down the cornice for a

time, and finally reached the tower at the corner of the hospital.

Here he stood and commenced to address an audience gathered in the street.

Some of the staff of the hospital tried to coax Wood to return toward them but the man was deaf to their appeals.

Finally, somebody produced a bottle of whiskey and by means of this, Wood escaped from his perilous position.

Once he was safely within the windows were closed and the man was detained till the police authorities arrived.

STAR'S PIPE DREAM

Montreal Sensational Tory Organ Affects to
Give Political News of Doubtful Character—Says Laurier Had New Cabinet
Slate Ready and Wants
Dissolution

MONTREAL, Quebec, August 3.—The Star today gives currency to a report that since the return of Sir Wilfrid Laurier from abroad, he has prepared the personnel of his new cabinet which was in due course presented to his excellency for ratification with the understanding that dissolution should follow the announcement.

It is alleged that Earl Grey, knowing of the Premier's

promise to Mr. Borden to hold another session before dissolution suggested that the plan in view of the promise, should have Mr. Borden's consent.

The opposition leader, it is stated, was in Montreal at the time, and intended remaining here for several days, but only remained one day, proceeding to Ottawa.

It is not stated what happened, but there was some delay, and the announcement has not yet been made.

TUPPER-TILLEY VISIT.

Sir Charles Tupper and Sir Leonard Tilley, accompanied by Hon Mr. Perley and other gentlemen, arrived in the noon train from St. John on Tuesday and were met at the Railway Station by the Liberal Conservative Reception Committee, the 71st Batt. Band, and quite a large number of citizens, who cheered heartily as the distinguished gentlemen alighted from the train. They were, after a few presentations escorted by E. L. Wetmore, Chairman of the Reception Committee, to the Barker House barouche, to which were attached four handsome grey horses, gallily plumed and reined by Mr. John Orr. The procession was formed by Mr. Harry Beckwith, marshal.

From 3 till 5 p. m., the Ministers held a reception in the Barker House, and the leading gentlemen of the City were presented to them, all receiving a cordial greeting. The Reform Club Band played in front of the Hotel during the reception. At 4 p. m., Hon. Mackenzie Bowell, Minister of Customs, and Mr. Johnston, Commissioner who arrived by the N.B. Railway, were met at Gibson by Collector Street, and on landing at the Court House were played to by the Barker by the Reform Club Band.

The doors of the City Hall were thrown open shortly after 7 p. m., and before the hour for taking the chair had arrived, the hall was filled. The appearance on the platform of Sir Charles and Sir Leonard, preceded by the Chairman, E. L. Wetmore, Esq., was the signal for applause, and the Reform Club Band, which was in attendance, struck up "See the Conquering Hero Comes."

Mr. Wetmore called the meeting to order and read a joint address to the Ministers from the Liberal Conservative party, both gentlemen replying.

THIEVES ARRESTED

Italian and His Wife Who Made a Haul at
Sydney Jugged this Morning at St. John.
Three Years at Dorchester

ST. JOHN, N. B., August 3.—On the strength of a despatch from Stipendiary Magistrate Hearn, of Sydney, N. S., Jos. Ventresco and wife were arrested here this morning, charged with stealing \$210.

The telegram states that Ventresco and wife, who are Italians, left Sydney last night.

On the arrival of the early train at St. John, the pair were spotted by policeman Crawford and taken to the Central police station.

On being searched the man was found to have \$170 in his possession, and \$40 was taken off the woman, who has with her nine-months-old baby, and is in a delicate state of health. The man is 20 years of age and the woman 23.

Chas. McDonald, arrested last week, charged with obtaining \$200 under false pretences, from Mrs. Margaret Ferguson and subsequently admitted his guilt, was today sentenced to three years in Dorchester penitentiary by Judge Ritchie.
