British Columbia Judge Says Ex-Tory Minister Should be Stripped of Royal Honors

VANCOUVER, B. C., August 2.—At 3.15 yesterday afternoon, after an absence of forty-eight minutes the jury in Green ps. the World, newspaper, found for the defendants, with costs.

"I find it difficult to choose language sufficiently strong to characterize such an action," said Justice Clements this morning, referring to the letter written by Sir Adolphe Caron to R. F. Green, then Commissioner of Lands and public Works in the McBride Government, in which he mentioned certain shares which he would place at the disposal of any person named Green.

"Such a man," he said, should have the insignia of the royal favor stripped from him."

The charge arose out of an article in the World on the transactions referred to. The judge's charge was of considerable length.

Mr. Green, in the witness box, this morning, said except the letters from Sir Adolphe Caron and his own reply, he knew of no letters relating to the Caron syndicate, which were not official and which should not be on file in his department. The statement in the World article in regard to a private arrangement he declared absolutely untrue, also the statement that another share had been issued to his secretary, Neil MacKay, in connection with the land in Telqua Valley. He had never directly or indirectly any interest in the shares mentioned.

Cross-examined, he said he had been a merchant in the interior and had drifted into politics. He met Adolphe Caron on two occasions. He knew

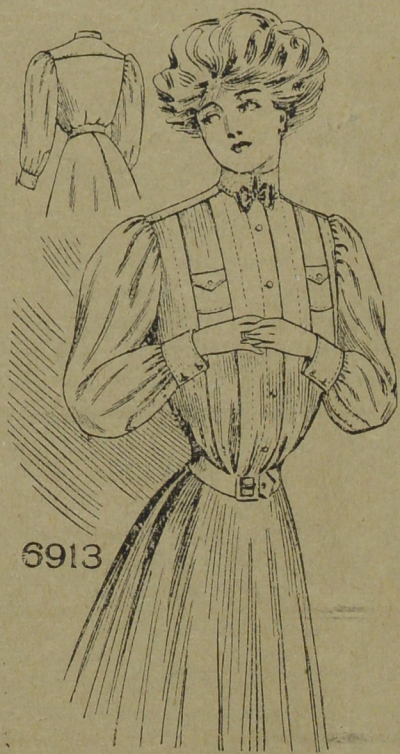
Caron had been a member of Sir John Macdonald's government and was a strong Conservative. When the application for licenses was made he recognized the name of Caron. He admitted having spoken privately to Premier McBride about retiring from the government. Before he did so, he said, he had not suggested to anyone that the government would be stronger without him. His reasons for resigning were purely personal. He had gone into other business in which he received more salary.

Asked what business he was now in, he declined to answer.

In the evidence read, as having been obtained from Sir Adolphe, he gave these as members of his transcontinental exploration syndicate, incorporated by Dominion charter in February, 1905: William M. Germain, M. P.; Sir Henry Pellatt, and Sir Frederick Borden. Caron was president, and W. H. Harris, Tunbridge Wells, England, vice-president. Sir Adolphe characterized as a dream the charge made by the editor of the Vancouver World, that he (Sir Adolphe), tried to bribe Hon. R. F. Green, the Commissioner of Lands and Works in British Columbia, who has since resigned, with an offer of \$37,000 worth of stock in the syndicate at a time when Sir Adolphe was doing business with the minister in regard to public lands. Mr. Green refused the shares, but named a friend as a likely member of the syndicate, and Sir Adolphe sent that friend, Neil Mackay, of Kaslo, free of cost, shares that he (Sir Adolphe) says are of the normal value of \$500.

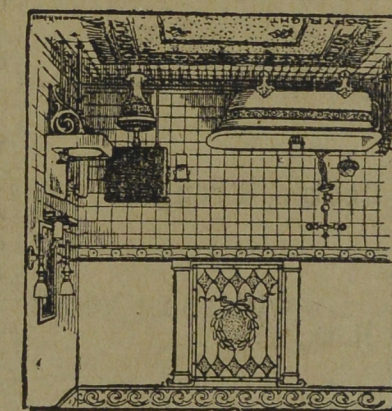

MILLIONAIRE'S QUEST FOR A BRIDE

Found After Fourteen Months' Search—Detectives Successfully Follow Slender Clues

London Daily Mail: After an apparently hopeless fascinating search for a beautiful girl, in which a corps of expert private detectives have been engaged, one of the strongest and most romantic of love stories is now through a discovery made on Monday, likely to have a happy ending.

The hero of the story, we will call Mr. X, an American millionaire; and the heroine is a young English girl, Miss Irene Walker.

Some fourteen months ago Mr. X. and Miss Walker, who was with her mother, met in the train at Newhaven. They chatted during the journey, and parted at Victoria. With the millionaire it was a case of love at first sight. He knew the young lady's name, for he read it on her violin case which she was carrying, but he did not know her address.

For months he continued to think of her, and some weeks ago he determined to find the girl who had so fascinated him. His agents have just succeeded in their difficult task.

SLENDER CLUES.

The available clues were of the slightest. The girl's name was known; it was obvious that she played the violin; her approximate age could be guessed; she had spent the winter of 1905-6 at Malta.

Here is a pen picture of the girl, and a few notes about the fateful train journey, supplied by Mr. X.:

"Strange to say I can give but a poor description of the girl who fascinated me so; but I guess this to be accounted for

by the fact that I was not aware of the fascination until we were about to part. To the best of my recollection she was about 5 feet 6 inches high, weighing about 125 pounds and had dark brown hair. She had beautiful dark blue eyes.

"I recall a little merriment, as during our conversation on the train we began to compare travelling in Europe to American travelling, and the young lady wanted to know about the cow catchers attached to our engines. Mischievously, she asked if the cow-catcher caught up the cow and carried it in safety to the next station.

"At Victoria I had an opportunity to look at the violin case carried by the young lady, and read the name 'Irene Walker,' with some address scratched out. However, I could read through the scratches the word 'Malta.'"
