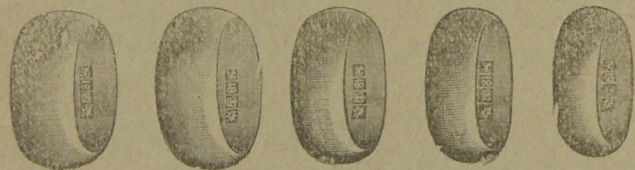

SUIT FOR LIBEL

Sir Frederick Borden Brings Action Against English Magazine for Quoting Calgary Paper's Attack on him

OTTAWA, Oct. 28.—(Special)—Sir Frederick Borden has instituted proceedings for libel against the well known British magazine the "Nineteenth Century," which, in its issue of the 21st inst., published statements made by the Eye Opener, published occasionally at Calgary, and forbidden use of the mails. These statements are held to be libellous. The "Nineteenth Century" left the name of the minister out, but it is said that it is easy to prove that reference was made to Sir Frederick.

TRAIN SMASHUP

Freight Cars Derailed on the I. C. R. and some of them Badly Broken up.

MONCTON, Oct. 28.—(Special)—A serious wreck occurred on the I. C. R. at Westchester, N. S., early this morning. Three steam cranes from Moncton and Westville were dispatched to the scene of the wreck between four and five this morning but it will be some hours before the line is cleared. Driver Bradshaw was in the cab of the engine of the wrecked train. The cause of the wreck is unknown. The road bed was also badly torn up.

FATAL ACCIDENTS

Man Killed at St. John---Lad Met Death at McAdam,

ST. JOHN, Oct. 28.—(Special)—Wm. Beatty, 25 years old, was killed almost instantly this morning while driving along Pond street. He fell from the team which passed over his neck, killing him. Beatty belongs to Wickham, N. B.

A lad named Nason was killed this morning at McAdam Junction. He was crossing the track when shunted cars struck him, knocking him down. One arm and one leg were severed, and his head was badly cut. He died almost instantly.

BANK OF CANADA.

New Financial Institution Organized at Winnipeg.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 28.—(Special)—After a very animated meeting, which lasted from 3 p.m. till nearly midnight on Saturday, the shareholders of new Canadian Bank designed to bring old country capital for the development of the west, named their proposed institution "The Bank of Canada," with head office in Winnipeg.

Following are the ten directors, first seven being of Manitoba, and last three from other western provinces: Hon. Hugh Macdonald, Senator Kirchoffer, Edward Brown, Senator Watson, T. W. Taylor, M. P., H. F. Forest, Alex. McMicken, G. T. Marshall, Regina; W. G. Budd, Calgary, and J. J. Sadler, Gainsborough. The meeting was characterized by bitter passages between the hostile camps into which it was divided, and a general tone of distrust seemed to pervade it, some of those present plainly stating their doubts as to proposition being a bona fide business one.

CHINAMAN SKIPPED

Tom Lee Wanted at Moncton to Relieve Creditors.

MONCTON, Oct. 28.—(Special)—Tom Lee, a celestial who ran a laundry at the lower end of Main Street here, is missing from the city and a number of patrons of the place are incidentally minus of shirts, collars, etc., which were entrusted to the Chinaman.

Lee also neglected to settle a few bills he owed about town. He is supposed to have skipped in the direction of Montreal Friday night.

THE STOCK MARKET.

Issues Stronger To-Day on Montreal Exchange and Worst is past

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—(Special)—The Stock market continued stronger today, and the feeling is gaining ground that the worst is over.

Assurance has been given that money will be available if Friday's panic returns, and this has done much to restore confidence, so that what liquidation there may be will be attended with less disastrous effects.

Still trading is restricted by scarcity of funds, and there is decided absence of bullish sentiment.

Dominion steel showed fair gains at 14 1/2, for Common, and 41 for pfd.

Nova Scotia Steel further advanced to 58, and MacKay rallied to 50.

Montreal Power was steady at 85 1/2; Detroit at 34 1/2; Montreal Street Railway 169, and Twin City 78.

EMPLOYEE'S RELIEF.

Number of Deaths For Past Month Was Small.

MONCTON, Oct. 28.—(Special)—Secretary Paver, of the I. C. R. Employees' Relief and Insurance Association, has issued his report for the month ending October 25th.

The number of deaths was smaller than usual, being four in all.

A. J. Munroe, of Moncton, had \$1,000; James McLaughlin, Moncton, \$250, and D. Coleman and Alexander, Anderson, Halifax, \$1,000 each.

Fees and levies for the month are class A, \$2; class B, \$1.20; and class C, 80c.

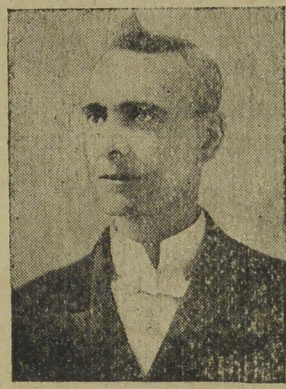
DR. DOBSON DEAD

Highly Esteemed Methodist Clergyman passed Away at Charlottetown

Former Fredericton Pastor and Respected Citizen.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Oct. 28.—Rev. Dr. Wm. Dobson, president of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Methodist Conference, and pastor of the First Methodist church, Charlottetown, since 1904, died Sunday afternoon from pneumonia, aged 61 years.

The late Rev. Mr. Dobson had many friends in this city who will hear with deep regret of his death. The deceased was a native of Bedouque, P. E. I., and was the second son of Mr. William Dobson, who came from Yorkshire, England, in 1821. His mother was a Miss Moys of Bedouque. He entered the ministry of the Methodist church in 1870, since which time he has filled some of the most important churches in this province, P. E. I., Nova Scotia and Bermuda, among which were Centenary, Portland and Fredericton, Halifax, Digby and Charlottetown. He was elected to the chair of the Conference in 1906, and had accepted an invitation

to Wesley Memorial, Moncton.

He represented the Methodist church of Canada at the General Conference which was held in California five years ago. His address on that occasion attracted widespread attention in the United States and Canada. He was considered one of the ablest Methodist preachers in the conference, ranking high among the clergymen of Canada. The funeral will be held at Charlottetown.

His wife was a Miss Morehouse of Digby, whose parents were of Loyalist stock, and came to Nova Scotia at the close of the revolutionary war. He leaves two sons and one daughter.

Dr. Dobson was pastor of the Fredericton Methodist church for

three years, 1888-91, and enjoyed a large degree of popularity, not only within the circle of his own church, but in the community generally. His able pulpit efforts attracted many hearers from other communions, and he was most highly esteemed as a preacher and citizen.

Dr. Dobson's last appearance in Fredericton, and his last address here was at the jubilee services of the Fredericton Methodist church in December, 1902. He preached a sermon on that occasion and later at a public meeting in connection with the celebration, made an address, during which he said he was glad to be back to Fredericton, and after what he had learned during the evening, he was sorry that he had not forty or fifty years ago arranged to have been born here. It was a delightful town and was growing and improving rapidly. It has been said that good, educated men are a large asset to the Commonwealth. Good men stand to the nation's credit and make it possible to carry on business, and there are a number of that class in this church. When Lot went out of Sodom stocks went down, therefore we ought to appreciate good men. The wealth of Fredericton is not in bank accounts, but in the bone and muscle of its people. No nation ever went down for want of money. Babylon, Carthage and Rome all had money. Burn Fredericton tomorrow, but leave us our bone and muscle, moral manhood and clear headed men, and it will rise again as Chicago and St. John did after the great fires which destroyed those cities. Take away the moral manhood and the world is gone. He was satisfied that churches made assets for the Commonwealth and gave the nation credit which enabled it to carry on business. The credit of New Brunswick banks was better because of this church, and New Brunswick politics was better because of its influence. It is not alone piety and religion in the churches that stand for manhood and good morals. If we only work out our piety and religion in the prayer meetings and afterwards get drunk in the streets and act brutally in the home we are not much of an asset to the nation.

There have been fifty long years of this church and because of that Fredericton has been much improved, and because this church is here Fredericton is what it is today. It is easy to laugh at churches and church going people, but take your churches away and men will not trust you. Then it behooves us to put our shoulders to the wheel and make the churches all that God intended them to be.

CONDITIONS IMPROVED

New York Reports Practical end of Financial Panic.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(Special)—The situation in New York today shows improvement, and the crisis is now regarded as over.

Boston has followed the lead of New York in issuing clearing house certificates, with the idea of, conserving the supply of gold.

Americans on the London market this morning bought all bar gold offered, amounting to five million dollars. Eleven millions of gold have been imported since Friday.

The Lincoln Trust company, and the Trust company of America resumed payments this morning, and the run is now pretty nearly over.

The Pittsburg stock exchange has not yet resumed business.

ATTORNEY GENERALSHIP

St. John Hears that Hon. H. A. McKeown the Likely Man.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 28.—(Special)—A rumor is current here that Hon. H. A. McKeown is to be the new attorney general, and that he will be sworn in very soon.

Another rumor names Mr. A. P. Barnhill for the position, but the general opinion seems to be that Mr. McKeown will be the man, and that he will run in St. John county. Dr. Ruddick making way for him.
