THE LATE DR. DOBSON

The Methodist church in the mari-
time provinces has lost one of its
ablest men in the death of Rev. Dr.
William Dobson, a man who easily
stood in the front rank as a preach-
er and pastor among the clergymen
of that communion.

With strong natural ability, with a
mind well trained, a memory that
was phenomenal, with a ringing mel-
odious voice, and commanding ap-
pearance, Dr. Dobson was a striking
figure, and his pulpit utterances and
other public addresses were remark-
able for their originality, their re-
search, eloquence and earnestness.

He was an ardent student, a great
thinker, and could sway an audience
as is given to few to do, and person-
ally he was a very likeable man, clean
in character, earnest in purpose, and
doing with industry and success the
great work to which he had devoted
his life.

GOOD LUCK TO HIM.

The best wishes of a large circle of
New Brunswick friends and admirers
of Rev. H. E. Diblee will accompany
that gentleman and his family to
their new home in California. Mr.
Diblee has been an earnest, success-
ful clergyman, and an energetic mem-
ber of the communities where he has
so well ministered, and his church
and its people have had fine results
from his labors. A gentleman of fine
presence, high character, aggressive
and industrious in his profession,
broad in his sympathies, a genial
companion and faithful in his friend-
ship, Mr. Diblee will be greatly
missed in the diocese, and his depar-
ture has called forth strong expres-
sions of regret from his parishioners,
who feel that it will be difficult to
fill his place. The Herald joins with
Mr. Diblee's friends in the hope that
he may secure a full return to his
former rugged health in his new field
of labor, and that his work there may
be congenial, and blessed with abun-
dant harvest, a wish which is ex-
tended to his amiable and popular
wife, who has greatly endeared her-
self to her numerous friends.

ALGONQUINS DEFEATED

U. N. B. Boys got the Best of Satur-
day's Football Match

Both teams showed great material
and abundance of enthusiasm, and in
spite of the dismal wind and the
rather shaded atmosphere which pre-
vailed Saturday afternoon, the deep
interest always taken in football was
admirably manifested at College
field when the boys and girls ap-
peared in flying colors to encourage
the old college team. Such a goodly
combination of banners, colors, an-
ticipating smiles and rousing cheers
could not do other than urge a team
of kindred spirits to victory.

A number of changes were made
in the U.N.B. team, which the ath-
letic council were confident would
be for the better. Just how wise the
changes were cannot easily be decided
upon. Dolan, formerly a half, was
made full-back, and the genial veter-
an, Joe Dever, was out on the half
line, a good man wherever he is. Cal.
Gilchrist, who has been out of the
game for a week or more, from the
effects of a bad strain, was again
put on the forward line.

The Algonquins had among other
good men, "Mike" Clarke, an old
U.N.B. man, and "Joe" Howe, the
well known Acadia reliable.
Shortly after three, Referee Arthur
Finnimore gave the signal, the Al-
gonquins having the kick-off.
Baird returned the ball and Gibson
made a great run, bringing the ball
beyond our twenty-five-yard line. The
ball was then kept in the scrum, and
for some time things looked rather
bad for the U. N. B.

The Algonquins had a strong, though
poorly organized scrim, and brought
the ball within two yards of the U.N.
B. line, when Captain Deeds, of the
army, and Col. Gilchrist, with able
and well organized support, simply
drove the Algonquins up to the twenty-
five yard line. Great cheers and
deep waving aloft of banners and
the outbursts of enthusiasm from the
class-mates, boys and girls, seemed to
inspire our boys with fresh hopes.

Baird carried the ball to the
enemy's twenty-five-yard line, raising
cheers, and in an instant "Billy" Mc-
Naughton got the ball and amid a
rush of enthusiasm from the en-
raptured spectators and blind tackling
among the Algonquins, carried it over
the line. Rutledge failed to con-
vert the try and the game continued.
During the rest of the first half the
ball was kept in the scrum, the great-
er part of the time. The visiting
team were compelled to touch for
safety and the ball was kept in
their ground until the call for "half
time."

In the second half U.N.B. had the
kick-off. Gibson returned it and Bab-
bitt kicked out of touch. The visiting
team got their scrim in working or-
der and had brought the ball over the
twenty-five-yard line. Captain
"Mike" Rutledge then made a star
run, clear to the visitors' 25th line,
when he was tackled by Gibson. Hard
scrum work followed. Young Gibson
got the ball and might have made a
try, had not Kinghorn, our young
half, outwitted him in the run and
touched for safety.

The rest of the game was, with few
exceptions, in the visitors' territory.
Dever, Rutledge and Baird made
some good runs.

The visiting team certainly has
good material in every part of the
team, but they did not do enough
combination work.

"Coe" Howe was not given an op-
portunity to do any star work which
we expected of him. The scrim seem-
ed to do all the work.
The visitors played an excellent de-
fensive game. They are fine fellows,
good, clean, upright players, who
play in the spirit of players not
gamblers.

The U. N. B. boys deserve much
credit, considering the many changes
made in the team, and the heavy men
they were up against. We feel that
they are a credit to us. This game
was fine practice for them, and we
hope they will keep at it and be
in good condition for the game of
the season, when they line up with
Mount Allison on Thursday.

AN INTELLIGENT CANINE.

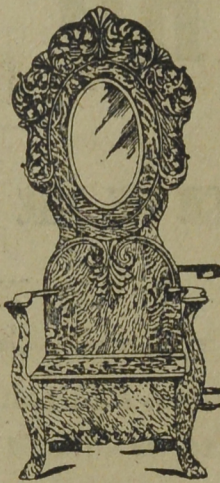
A brown spaniel dog, without an

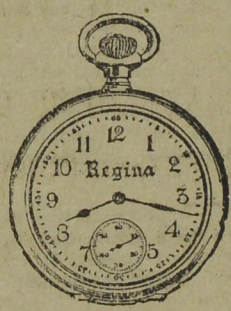

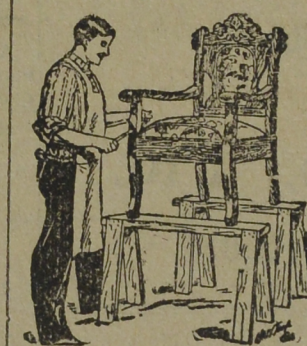
