He had been ill for some years, and news of his death did not create much surprise. The deceased was sixty-seven years of age, and is survived by a widow, two sons and two daughters. Mr. Edgar Hanson, formerly of the staff of the provincial secretary's office, this city, is a brother. The body will be brought here tomorrow and interred at Sunnyside cemetery, with services at the Neil Street Baptist church. Mr. R. B. Adams is the officiating undertaker. The deceased gentleman in 1878 unsuccessfully contested York at a bye-election for the legislature, brought about by the unseating of Hons. A. G. Blair and F. P. Thompson.

A CLOSE CALL.

Sgt. W. A. Daniel, of New Maryland, had a rather close call on Saturday afternoon. He was passing Mr. Thomas Smith's blacksmith shop on King street, when he suddenly reeled and collapsed on the floor of the shop in a dead faint. But for Mr. Smith's prompt action in sending for a physician, the papers today would have been called upon to record another sudden death. Dr. G. J. McNally was quickly on the scene and after he had injected strychnine into the man's arm he began to show signs of returning animation. A coach was procured and he was removed to the home of his son-in-law on King street, where, under the doctor's careful treatment, he soon revived. Should there be no return of the trouble, Dr. McNally thinks the patient will pull through all right.

MR. SPURDEN'S ILLNESS.

WILL PROBATED

Queens County Man made Libera Bequests to Several Churches.

The will of the late Mr. Robert Bates, of Cambridge, Queens, was admitted to probate here on Saturday before Mr. R. W. McLellan, acting Judge of Probates for that county. The estate was sworn to as \$8,300, of which 91,800 represents real estate which 41,800 represents real estate and the balance personal property, the value of \$500 is to be divided among nephews and nieces and \$1,000 each is bequeathed to the Reform Baptist Church, St. John, the Presbyterian church, Barn'sville, the Baptist church, Upper Jemseg, and the Baptist church, Upper Gagetown.
