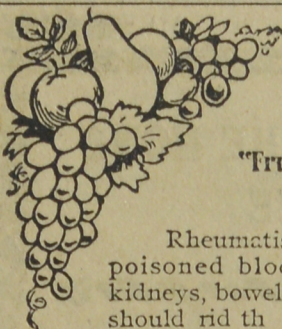

A PRETTY YOKE WAIST.

One of the most charming of recent designs for a separate waist is here sketched. Simple, graceful, and almost universally becoming, it is a model which will infallibly commend itself to the woman of refined tastes. The picturesque effect of the deep, square yoke and full front portion is greatly enhanced by the tucked-trimming bands, to which the Mandarin sleeves are attached. These accessories may, however, be

omitted if desired, and the plain development substituted. The sleeves are most effective when made as pictured, but they may, if necessary, be made full length for cool weather wear. Silk voile of the new fad color or string color was used for modeling the waist, with pale blue tucked chiffon for the yoke and flit lace and small gilt buttons for garniture; but foulard, crepon or any flexible material would develop equally well, with all-over lace for the collar and yoke.

For the medium size 3 yards of 27-inch material will be needed with 3/4 of a yard of 18 inch material for the collar and yoke.

FIERCE FIGHT WITH MADMAN.

Sailor Loses His Mind and Attempts to Kill the Vessel's Surgeon.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The White Star Line steamship Majestic, which arrived at quarantine late last night from Southampton, brought the story of a desperate and almost tragic battle that occurred in the ship's surgery one night during the voyage. Dr. Riversdale French, the ship's physician narrowly escaped death at the hands of a madman, one of the stokers of the vessel, who locked both himself and the doctor in the surgery, and who finally had to be shot down by an officer of the ship. The stoker, Patrick Sheehan, is seriously, but not fatally wounded.

Stoker Sheehan tried to throw him self overboard shortly after the steamer left Queenstown and Dr. French ordered the man sent to the surgery for examination. Scarcely had the fireman entered the office when he quickly turned and double-locked the heavy door. Then he seized a pair of scissors, as well as a surgical knife, which were hanging on the wall. All this was done in a flash the door being barred before the sailor accompanying the stoker had a chance to force his way inside.

LOOKED THROUGH GRATING.

The sailor, however, gave the alarm. Captain Hayes, several under-officers and a dozen seamen assembled at the surgery, and by looking through a locked door they could see the madman, a great heavy fellow, standing over the doctor, a man of slight stature, who sat quietly in his chair. Indeed, it was the coolness of the surgeon which saved him from being hacked to pieces by the

insane man. Meantime the men outside were not idle. A violent onslaught on the door would have signalled the doctor's death. The men outside pleaded with Sheehan to open the door. He paid no attention to any of them. He remained by the doctor, brandishing a knife and shears. Eventually the crowd outside of the narrow passageway held a hurried council and decided upon a new plan of defence. The latticed grating on the top of the door was slowly and cautiously unscrewed and removed. To divert Sheehan's attention from this manoeuvre, two of the seamen continued their pleadings in loud tones.

THREW PEPPER IN EYES

A few minutes later the mad stoker was induced to turn towards the door, whereupon he was blinded by a mass of pepper thrown full in his eyes through the opening in the transom. Sheehan slashed wildly at the doctor, but the latter had slipped from his chair and unlocked the door. Sheehan, partially seeing and feeling his way, followed blindly. In the passageway he was floored by a dozen men, but powerful and strong as a dozen men himself, he brushed them lightly aside and started for Third Officer Norris, trying to stab him. In self defence the officer was forced to shoot. The bullet entered Sheehan's right hip and lodged in the intestines. He was at once overpowered and carried to the hospital. The bullet had completely subdued him, and he recovered his reason immediately.

WATER FRONT TRAGEDY.

Wm. P. Cowie, Former Resident of St. Mary's,

Lost His Life Early Tuesday Morning in the St. Croix.

St. Stephen Courier: A tragedy that occurred on the water front during the early hours of Tuesday has caused deep gloom in at least one home, the victim being a well-loved son of Mr. and Mrs. George Cowie, of Fairville, N. B. During the past two years, William P. Cowie has been employed as engineer of the steamer Viking and was well liked by his associates. Lately he had been drinking heavily and to this fact is generally ascribed his untimely end.

Monday evening he was in town and consulted Dr. Murphy, who advised his return home and cessation from his duties for a time. This course he decided to pursue and secured his wages from the company, intending to return home Tuesday morning.

AT ABOUT MIDNIGHT he went on board the Viking, the crew then being employed at loading freight.

An hour later, he was seen to leave the steamer and started up the wharf at a lively gait. Captain Daniel Richardson followed him as rapidly as possible, and at Ferry Point bridge found that Cowie had been stopped by Officer McClure. He was evidently not in his right mind, but after some conversation started down the street with Officer McClure and Captain Richardson.

It was deemed best, for the man's own safety, to let him spend the night in the lockup, where he was accordingly taken and Dr. Lawson summoned. The physician prepared some medicine but Cowie declined to take it and made urgent appeals to be allowed to return to his steamer. Fearing that

ENFORCED DETENTION

might have an injurious effect on the man in his demented condition, he was escorted to the Viking and to his room, where he promised to remain, though he still refused to partake of the physician's medicine.

The crew watched him carefully while they continued at their work. Soon after two o'clock one of the crew saw him rush from his room and instantly gave the alarm. Captain Richardson and others started after the man, but before they could overtake him he had leaped or fallen from the stern of the boat. His cries in the water were heard and a boat was quickly lowered, but the night was dark, with rain falling heavily and the current running very swift, and he was rapidly carried away from them.

NO FURTHER CRY

was heard and no trace of the man could be found and the searchers had to return to the steamer unrewarded.

Knowing Cowie to have been a strong swimmer, and hoping that he might have reached one of the wharves, Captain Richardson, with a lantern, searched them all for some time, but without avail, and the sorrowful conviction was forced upon him all that the soul of their recent companion had gone out upon the unknown sea.

Search for the body was resumed with the coming of dawn, but it was not recovered until about eight o'clock, when it was found a few hundred yards astern of the steamer.

VIEWED THE REMAINS

but deemed an inquest unnecessary and they were taken in charge by J. R. Soderquest, undertaker. The father and brother of the deceased arrived here Tuesday evening and took the body to the saddened home Wednesday morning.

The deceased was twenty-six years of age and unmarried and was a member of the Independent Order of Foresters. Besides his father and mother, two brothers and six sisters survive him.
