MONTREAL TRAGEDY.

Dressmaker Seriously Wounded Billiard Hall Manager, and Fatally Shot Herself.

MONTREAL, Sept. 28.—A jealous or crazy woman turned the main billiard room of the Checker and Chess Club, east St. Catherine street, into a scene of the wildest confusion yesterday afternoon, when Miss Elaine LaPointe, a dressmaker, fired a revolver at the manager, Ludger Houle, wounding him, and then shot herself.

The woman is now in the Notre Dame Hospital, where the medical superintendent states that her life is despaired of, a 32-calibre bullet is lodged in the back of the head and has not yet been located.

Mr. Houle was fired at while his back was turned to the woman, and the bullet entered behind his right ear, but surgeons were able to extract it a short time after he had been conveyed to the Notre Dame

Hospital, and he will probably entirely recover from its effects in a few days.

What the woman's motive was in thus firing at a man with whom she had been more or less acquainted with during the past ten years, is still a mystery. Mr. Houle himself says he cannot account for the occurrence, except by supposing that Miss LaPointe was temporarily insane, but at the boarding house where the latter was staying the landlady asserts that the woman had never given any signs of being out of her mind.

"I cannot account for the affair at all," said Mr. Houle. "If there had been any question of love between us it might be explained, but there never was anything of the kind. I think the poor girl must have had hard times lately and gone out of her mind."

WANDERING DOUKHOBORS

WINNIPEG, Sept. 28.—Superintendent Bury of the C. P. R. has sent the following telegram to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Ottawa, and Hon. R. P. Roblin, Winnipeg:

"Party of forty Doukhobors, Khera, and party forty-four, White-mouth, intending to walk along railroad track to Montreal. With heavy traffic on railway there is every probability of their meeting with accident from being run over. In interests of humanity our officers used every endeavor to dissuade them from undertaking. As last resort they were arrested for trespass, found guilty, but liberated by authorities. They are now proceeding on their march. With sparse population around Lake Superior, cold winter coming on and danger resulting from walking on track some action should be taken at once. We offered to take them back to Yorktown, but they persisted on their march along the track."

Premier Roblin, Attorney General Campbell, Ministerial delegates, and 25-way officers had a conference yesterday. The desire of the delegation was to have the Doukhobors now in jail sent back to their homes in Saskatchewan and have the government of that province look after them. Bands are near starving but are determined to reach Montreal or die.
