

SEWED ON HIS HEAD.

Doctors Saved Life of Man Almost Decapitated.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Three surgeons at St. Gregory's Hospital had a hard struggle yesterday to save the life of a man who was almost beheaded by an elevator in a building at No. 213 Front street. The patient, Bernard Rush, while taking a load of fish from the first floor, slipped and became wedged between the floor and the platform of the elevator. The elevator was stopped in time to save his head from being torn from his shoulders. At the hospital it was found that in addition to the large muscles of the neck being severed, several small arteries and veins were separated. The patient was conscious throughout the operation, which was performed without anaesthetics of any kind. Rush was powerless to move his head because the largest muscles of the neck were snapped in two.

WHEELS WITHIN WHEELS.

It is an open secret that a sub-committee has been appointed by the rules of golf committee to revise and redraft the rules. It is said that the sub-committee consists of John W. Law, Wm. Bruce, and one other. Meanwhile, P. R. Burrow, a prominent member of the Midland Association, has suggested that there be two sets of rules, one for match and one for medal play, and that the feature of the former should be that the ball must be played from its lie or the hole be given up, says Golf Illustrated. This suggestion seems to meet with the approval of the majority of leading players. It is rumored that the new rules, now in course of preparation, will be longer and more elaborate than those now existing. In view of the strong opinions held by the leading St. Andrews players as to the desirability of playing the ball from its lie, the rumor would seem to be of doubtful character. The draft of the rules must be submitted to the

full committee and to the members of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club before they can become effective.
