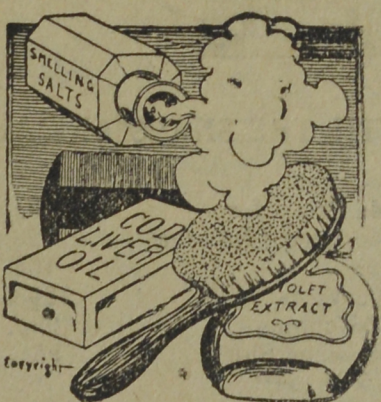

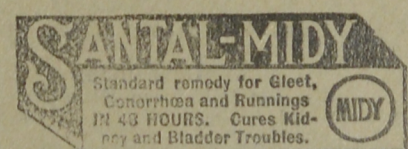

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SURGICAL OPERATION MAKES
BOY A THIEF.

Brooklyn Lad of Fourteen Confesses
to 200 Robberies in Seven
Weeks.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Entirely
alm, Edward Bridgeman, fourteen
years old, confessed that he has com-
mitted two hundred robberies since
August 5th last—say about four a day
on an average. Young Bridgeman
said, too, that he always "worked"
in daylight and passed his nights
with his parents at home in Brook-
lyn.

This most industrious young thief
has been in the hands of the Brook-
lyn Children's Society. The society's
agents say they believe he is mental-
ly unbalanced. They do not call him a
kleptomaniac; they think he has
never recovered from a surgical opera-
tion that was performed on him,
and that this makes him steal.

The boy pleaded guilty, and then,
with some pride, recounted his re-
cord "double century" of burglarious
enterprises. Judge O'Keefe sent
Bridgeman to the House of Refuge.

NEW TRAIL TO YUKON.

All the Journey Through Canadian
Territory.

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—The Royal
Northwest Mounted Police, after two
years' work, have cut an eight foot
trail from Peace River through the
Rocky Mountains to the Yukon, giv-
ing a route from Edmonton to Daw-
son entirely over Canadian territory.
Col. White, Comptroller of the
Mounted Police, today received a tele-
gram from Commissioner Perry an-
nouncing his arrival on the Pacific
coast after a seven hundred mile
ride on the trail from Edmonton.
The trail has been built to Hazelton
where it joins the trail along the
Yukon telegraph line, and thus con-
tinues to Dawson. Besides affording
access to an hitherto inaccessible
portion of the country, the trail will
be useful for justice purposes in the
transportation of prisoners, who
would be able to take advantage of
territorial law immediately if taken
over the usual route of travellers
which crosses American territory.
From a military viewpoint it will
also afford connection with the Yukon
by Canadian territory in the event
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
