DRANK CARBOLIC ACID BOQUETS FOR PUGSLEY

Effort of a ten year old Girl to end her life because she had to go to School

ST. JOHN, Nov. 6.—(Special)—Rebecca Scott, a ten-year-old girl, drank carbolic acid yesterday afternoon, and for a time lingered between life and death at the hospital. She had been playing truant from school, and was to be forced to return. When this decision was made known to her by her step-sister, little Rebecca became desperate, and running to a shelf in the kitchen, seized a bottle of carbolic acid and crying "I will end it all," drank part of the contents. Dr. Christie was hastily summoned, and the girl was taken to the hospital, where for many hours it was not believed she would recover. Now, however, she is out of danger. The child is a daughter of James Scott, 182 Erin street. Her mother is dead, and her step-sister has been filling her mother's place.

WOLFVILLE, N. S., Nov. 6.—The best game of the season was played yesterday afternoon on the Acadia campus, when Acadia defeated the U. N. B. to the tune of 6 to 3. This is the second game in the intercollegiate league.

The game was interesting on account of its closeness. There were many free kicks for both teams. There was good running and passing on both sides. The ball was in U. N. B.'s territory most of the time, and although they were good in keeping the ball before them, they were unable to score.

Acadia kicked off and U. N. B. returned the ball to centre field, when Acadia's forwards carried the ball back into the U. N. B. territory. Here the U. N. B. halves did good work by carrying the ball up to Acadia's 25-yard line by dribbling and passing. U. N. B. gradually forced the ball

down and McNaughton scored their first and only try, which was not converted. Acadia controlled the ball for the remainder of the first half. Time was called with the ball on U. N. B.'s five yard line.

In the first part of the second half the play was around centre field. Then the ball being well controlled by Acadia's scrimmage and by good passing of the halves, was taken down to the U. N. B. five yard line, when Dever, U. N. B. half, kicked it into Acadia territory. The U. N. B. team followed up well on the ball. Two or three scrims followed near Acadia's five yard line. After that the ball was carried into U. N. B. territory and kept there throughout the rest of the game.

The Acadia boys were now playing with all their might and gradually forced the ball nearer the U. N. B. goal. Lewis and Messenger of Acadia tried some buckling, during which Messenger scored a try, backed by the whole team, which was not converted. It was now four minutes before the close of the game, and the score stood 3 to 3. Acadia was bound to score again and rushed the ball from centre field. The game was fierce, the U. N. B. putting up a gallant defense and marking the halves. But finally Tiny DeBow, Acadia's big forward, broke through and scored. Acadia failed to convert just as the whistle blew for time up.

The score stood 6 to 3 in favor of Acadia.

The referee was McLellan of Dalhousie University.

After the game the Acadia students paraded the streets celebrating their victory.

Last night the U. N. B. team was entertained at a reception given in their honor by the Acadia Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. The college bell rang for an hour after the game.

Toronto Globe, Canada's Leading Newspaper Has Good Things to say of the New Brunswick Minister.

Toronto Globe, (editorial). One of the most trustworthy tests of a man's aptitude for statesmanship is his ability to discern clearly the difference between politics and partisanship, and to observe that distinction accurately whenever circumstances make it incumbent on him to do so.

Dr. Pugsley, the new Minister of Public Works, delivered a few days ago a speech that will stand this test better than the great majority of political addresses.

The occasion of the speech was a non-partisan banquet at Sussex, New Brunswick, to celebrate his translation from the premiership of his province to the management of one of the great spending departments of the Dominion administrative service.

The speech was admirably suited to the occasion—thoroughly political without a trace of partisanship, perfectly apposite without being too personal, and finely optimistic without being chimerical.

If Dr. Pugsley can maintain the same high level he will be a valuable addition to the personnel of the House of Commons.

Quite naturally a considerable part of the speech was devoted to the material interests and development of Canada, with which Dr. Pugsley will henceforth have very much to do. His department provides and maintains public buildings of several sorts, such as post offices, customs houses, armories, and warehouses; it also undertakes the improvement of navigable channels, the construction of docks, and the deepening of harbors. Less than forty years ago the annual appropriation for such purposes was about half a million dollars; now it amounts to nearly twelve millions, and with the expansion of settlement it must continue to increase. There is no possibility of the country going on and standing still at the same time. The people of Toronto, of Montreal, of Quebec, and of St. John, not to mention the smaller places, have the truth brought home to them that it cost much to

bring a great harbor up and keep it up to the proper standard of efficiency. As the volume of commerce increases, the facilities for transacting business must keep pace with it, if congestion tending to paralysis is to be avoided. It would be fatuous to go to any great expense for the construction of railways and canals and hamper their functions by failing to provide them with suitable terminal and transshipment facilities.

Though Dr. Pugsley is not individually responsible for the railways and canals, he is quite naturally deeply interested in the whole question of transportation, and is specially interested in the condition of the Intercolonial Railway. That great work means much to New Brunswick, the only province it traverses from end to end. During his management of it the late Mr. Blair did a great deal to improve the system, and to make possible Mr. Emmerson's excellent financial showing of the past two years. Though the railway portfolio has come west to Ontario, the people of the Maritime Provinces are as much interested as ever in seeing the Intercolonial made thoroughly efficient, and it was quite natural, therefore, that Dr. Pugsley should give it a place in his speech.

Warning his hearers that he was speaking only for himself, he raised the question whether the private railway corporations should be left to appropriate all the profits from the increase in transportation due to the development of the country, or if the people's railway should be pushed on from Montreal through the heart of Ontario to the Great Lakes, and ultimately to the west.

In view of Mr. Graham's recent observation of similar purport one can hardly avoid the conclusion that there is much significance in Dr. Pugsley's remark when he says, "this project must soon engage the serious attention of Canadian statesmen."

THE STOCK MARKET.

Dominion Steel Issues Weak—Other Quotations

MONTREAL, Que., November 6.—(Special)—There was continued improvement in the stock market today, but nearly all weak features are not yet eliminated.

Steel and Coal issues do not improve, owing, it would seem, to a strong likelihood that more of these securities may come out on account of legal action.

Steel pfd. sold at 38½, which is equal to recent lowest, and Common held at 14.

Dominion Coal pfd. sold at 86. Halifax Railway was a weak feature, being offered down to 88 and 87½ bid.

Nova Scotia Steel on the other hand showed improvement, advancing to 55.

Other features were: Twin City at 73½; Toronto Railway 87½; Illinois pfd. 73; Montreal Power 84½; Montreal Street Railway 166.

A LONG CHASE

Alberta Man Overhauled Eloping Wife and Paramour after run of 1500 Miles

ANN ARBOR, Mich., November 6.—(Special).—After a 1,500-mile chase, during which he was at all times just a few miles behind his wife and the man with whom she had eloped, Chas. Wixman Hermit, Justice of the Peace, in Raymond, Alberta, Canada, had the fleeing pair arrested here. The man who is held with the woman, is John Cooper, land agent. Hermit was enabled to make a capture because his wife tarried too long a visit to relatives.

PROFITABLE WHALING.

One Little Steamer Earned \$50,000 this Season.

SLUG ONE.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 6.—(Special).—A little 110 tons steam whaler has just completed her season's work on the west coast of Vancouver Island, having since the end of March caught 245 whales and earned over \$50,000.

The sum has never before been approached in the annals of whaling.

On one occasion, a monster sulphur bottom whale towed the steamer a distance of about twenty-five miles, taking three hundred fathoms of line and with the engines half-speed astern to tire the monster out.

ST. JOHN'S SENSATION

There were few developments yesterday in the mix-up at City Hall, says the St. John Sun—R. A. McIntyre, the Halifax auditor who has been appointed to make an examination of the chamberlain's books, arrived yesterday and at once began his work.

The chamberlain yesterday transferred his property to the city, including his life insurance policies and real estate. This will almost wipe out the shortage, if it is no larger than is believed at present.

CHARGED WITH THEFT.

MONCTON, N. B., November 6.—(Special).—C. Merritt, I. C. R. night operator at Windsor Junction, has been arrested, charged with the theft of \$25 from the I. C. R. The money was abstracted from the railway returns which were to be forwarded to Moncton.

PROHIBITION COMMISSION

Getting Evidence in Favor of the Law at Charlottetown.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Nov. 6.—(Special).—The New Brunswick Prohibition Commission have examined Stipendiary Magistrate, City Marshall, Premier Peters, Mayor Paton and others.

The evidence given so far has been strongly in favor of the act, which the witnesses declare has lessened drunkenness and heightened the moral tone of the city.

Merchants examined say that business has been steadily increasing since the advent of prohibition, and that many families formerly in poverty, owing to drink, are now in much better circumstances.

KING'S DAUGHTERS

MONTREAL, Que., November 6.—(Special).—As the sixth triennial convention today the Dominion branch of the King's Daughters and Sons is holding a birthday tea to mark the 21st anniversary of the organization.

FIRST INSPECTION TRIP

Hon. Geo. P. Graham made short stop at Moncton and went to Sydney

MONCTON, N. B., November 6.—(Special).—Hon. Geo. P. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals, and party, arrived at Moncton last night on his first trip of inspection of the I. C. R.

They made the run from Campbellton to Moncton in four hours on a special train, a very fast run.

This morning Mr. Graham inspected the I. C. R. shops and left for Sydney, Halifax and Nova Scotia points. Mr. Graham was accompanied on his inspection by Hon. F. R. Emmerson.

HEAVY FIRE LOSS

Dominion Park, Montreal's Great Pleasure Resort prey to Flames

MONTREAL, Nov. 6.—(Special).—Dominion park, a prominent pleasure resort, was destroyed by fire today, loss \$200,000.

CHANGE OF ENGINEERS
