CAUGHT IN THE ACT

London Hospital Nurses Victims of the Prying Lady Superintendent

(Special to Herald.)

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 20.—Five young ladies, nurses at Victoria Hospital, were caught on Saturday night in the act of entering the Nurses' Home by a window, instead of the door, and were peremptorily discharged.

The ladies had been visiting a town near London and having missed the train, were unable to reach the city until some time after the closing

hour of the home, at 10 o'clock. They secured a ladder and entered by a window, when they were surprised by the lights being suddenly turned on, revealing the presence of the lady superintendent, Miss Stanley.

A number of the doctors have interested themselves on behalf of the offenders and it is said the intervention of Hon. Adam Beck will be sought, but so far the authorities have refused to consider the matter of reinstatement.

POLITICAL RUMOR

Mr. Gibbons, K.C., May Contest London and Enter the Federal Cabinet

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 20.—A report was received here last night from Ottawa to the effect that the by-election in London would be brought on in the fall.

It is stated that Geo. Gibbons, K. C., would be the Liberal candidate, and would enter the

cabinet.

Gibbons is in Maine, and consequently could not be seen.

(The London seat was vacated by the resignation of Hon. C. S. Hyman, Minister of Public Works. Mr. Gibbons, mentioned as his successor, is one of the leading lawyers of Ontario.)

THE PARISH ELECTIONS

Not Much Interest Taken in Contest Set Down for September 3rd

Nomination for election to the York Municipal Council will be made on Monday August 26th, and polling takes place on Tuesday, Sept. 3rd. This is a month earlier than last year, the change having been made by the Legislature last session for the benefit of those whom business calls them to the lumber woods in the autumn. So far as the majority of the parishes are concerned very little interest is being taken in the contest and a good many of the councillors are likely to slip ign by acclamation.

There is usually a fight for blood in the parish of Stanley and this year promises to be no exception. Already there are six candidates in the field and there may be more in the course of a few days. The present representatives, Stanley Douglas and C. W. Pond will seek re-election, and others who have intimated that they intend to be in the fight are Ex-Coun John Hinchey, the old war horse of Bloomfield, Ex-Coun B. McManiman, Mr. David Peacock and Mr. David Douglas. They are all pretty strong men, and the contest is likely to be a sharp one.

In St. Marys there is no opposition in sight to the return of Coun. Goodspeed and Fred Pond, although it is hard to tell what a week may bring forth.

In the Parish of Douglas Warden McFarlane and Coun Brewer are again in the field and are likely to be opposed by Mr. Howard Rogers of Nashwaakiss.

In Southampton Coun Frank Brooks has announced his retirement, and it is likely that Coun Myster and Ex-Coun W. R. Fawcett will be candidates.

In Queensbury, Bright, New Maryland, North Lake, and Manners Sutton there is no opposition yet offering to the return of the present representatives.

In Kingsclear there will be three and perhaps four candidates in the field. Couns Fox and McNally will seek re-election, and the names of Ex-Coun David Essensea and Mr. F. W. Hatheway are mentioned as probably candidates.

In Prince William it is said that

Ex-Coun McGillivray will oppose the return of Couns Fraser and McMullin. Ex-Coun George Hillman will oppose the return of Couns Carr and Grosvenor in Canterbury, and will no doubt have plenty of company.

In Dumfries the veteran Coun Scott who has represented the parish for over twenty-five years, will retire, and will likely be succeeded by Mr. Robert Scott.

In McAdam the friends of Ex-Coun Green who was defeated at the last election by a narrow margin, are urging him to offer again, and if he should consent he has a good chance of being returned.

In all sections of the country the farmers are too busy gathering their hay to bother much with municipal politics.

SCOTTISH CLANS

Children of the Heather Welcomed at Halifax

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 20.—The sixth biennial convention of the Order of Royal Scottish Clans opened here this morning, Royal Chief W. H. Stein, presiding. The weather is beautifully fine.

Addresses of welcome were delivered at noon by Lt-Governor Fraser, Mayor McIlreith, and J. C. O'Mullin, president of the Charitable Irish Society.

This afternoon the delegates are being taken on a carriage drive to points of interest about the city.

PROVINCIAL FINANCES

Premier Robinson Announces a Short Term Loan on Favorable Terms

INCREASED SUBSIDY WILL BE PAYABLE FROM FIRST OF LAST JULY

Premier Robinson makes an important announcement concerning the financial affairs of the province.

Briefly, the government has been able to arrange a loan from the Bank of Montreal for £300,000, at a rate of interest which figures out a little less than five per cent.

"This," said the Premier, "is especially gratifying, as it shows the excellent credit of the Province of New Brunswick."

"While some of the best securities in America today are going begging, and cities like Halifax, Montreal, Winnipeg and New York are finding it almost impossible to sell bonds at a reasonable price, the Province of New Brunswick has been able to sell its treasury bills at a rate which is a slight improvement on what they have been paying for the past year or two."

The premier thought it quite likely that the teachers would receive their increased allowance for the next school term.

The extra grant for the University of New Brunswick would also be paid as soon as the increased subsidy was in the treasury.

"This," said the Premier, "together with increased revenue from stumpage, which would be several thousand dollars larger than that of any previous year, is sufficient to answer all the charges that have been made to the effect that the province was not in good financial condition."

The present loan is for one year from the 15th of August and the interest is payable yearly instead of quarterly as has been customary in the case of short term loans in the past, and which made the rate of interest for the whole year considerably over five per cent. Then, again, when this loan was effected, the rate of exchange was so favorable that the province was able to have the money placed to its credit at Fredericton at a premium above par. Usually a commission is charged for the transfer of the money, which would make the net proceeds of the loan slightly less than par, which is \$4.86 2-3.

Asked for some details as to how the money would be applied, the premier said that part of it had already been used to retire the liability to the Bank of British North America in the shape of outstanding treasury bills and overdrafts.

The balance will be devoted to taking up the six per cent. debentures as they mature, and to provide for the expenditures on capital account which have already been authorized by the legislature. These include the appropriations for several large permanent bridges such as the Suspension bridge over the St. John river; the new steel spans for the Fredericton bridge, the Hall's Creek bridge at Moncton; the bridge over the Washademoak at the Narrows and the Hawkshaw bridge. The government is also incurring some capital expenditures for rolling stock for the Central Railway, so called, and for the completion of the work undertaken by Brown Bros. on the road.

THE STOCK MARKET.

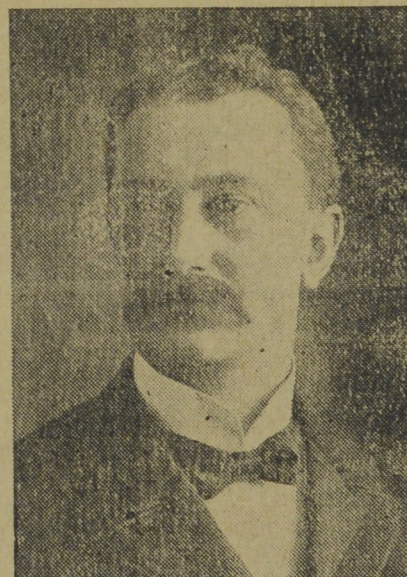
Traders in Montreal Exchange Avoid Steel Issues—Today's Quotations

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 20.—A tendency to avoid Steel issues again characterized the stock market this morning, although there were few transactions.

Dominion Iron bonds sold at 70 and Dominion Coal at 42.

Other issues were generally slack. Montreal Power sold at 90 to 100. Street, around 188, and under. Toronto Ry. at 98 1/2 and Detroit United at 63 1/2.
