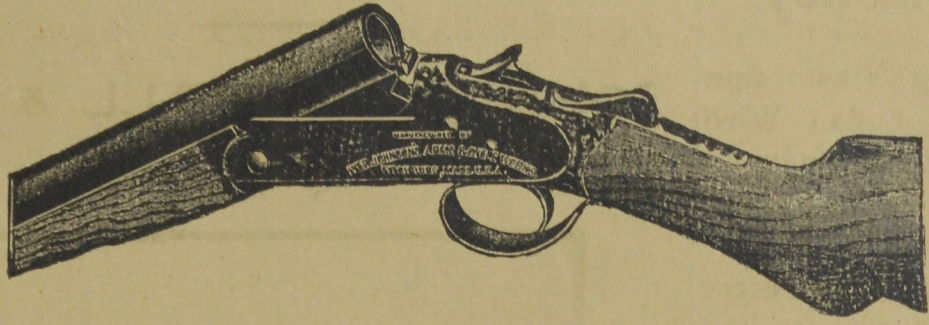

PLUNGED INTO NIAGARA

Car of Dressed Beef Went Through Bridge

NIAGARA FALLS, ONT. Aug. 19.—Another freight train went to wreck on the railway deck of the lower steel arch bridge this morning, resulting in great damage to rolling stock and freight and to the bridge. No one was killed or injured. It was 3.15 o'clock when a train of thirty-five cars left the upper yards of the Grand Trunk for the New York Central yards at Suspension Bridge, N. Y. Trains from the upper yards run down a very steep grade to the bridge, and attain a high speed. Just as they enter upon the bridge approach they pass over two switches which change their direction slightly. The engine and about a dozen cars of the ill-fated train this morning passed this point safely; then something happened under a car and a terrific mix-up ensued.

PLUNGED INTO THE GORGE

Eight cars left the track and went plunging over the bridge timbers, endways, cross-ways and upside down tumbling and pitching like cardboard boxes. Finally four of them plunged to the side of the bridge, crashed through the stout iron railing as if it were of cobwebs, and went headlong over the side into the gorge. These four cars were refrigerators of the Swift line. They were full of ice and dressed beef. They had not got far enough out on the bridge to fall into the water, but landed on the sloping talus at the foot of the cliff just in front of the bridge abutment at the foot of the arch. The drop there was about a hundred and twenty-five feet, and the impact of the heavy loads landing on the rocks was terrific.

Quarters of beef, sides of cars and general debris were carried down by the rapids, and the floating cakes of ice made the river look wintry in August. In the Whirlpool quantities of meat and wreckage are circling round and working out to the mouth for a trip through the Devil's Hole Rapids to Lake Ontario.

The damage to the bridge is large but is confined to the superstructure. One of the four cars which went over the brink struck on the top of the arch near its foot. The arch is apparently unaffected, but the car went to matchwood when it struck. About a hundred feet below the deck of the bridge a strong cross-brace was struck and cut off. The sidewalk of the lower deck was demolished for a considerable distance and the railing

has gone into the gorge. The railings of the upper deck are also gone, and the side girder of steel four feet wide and several inches thick is bent like a wire. The timbers of the railway deck are torn and splintered, the rails twisted off, switch standards torn loose and sidewalks demolished. One track of the railway bridge was cleared of wreckage and a train crossed about noon to-day. The other was opened and full traffic resumed during the afternoon. The damaged side of the bridge, a pile of wreckage in the yards and another down in the gorge are all the traces that remain of one of the most sensational wrecks in the history of railroading.

HEIR TO MILLIONS.

Birth of a Son to the Marquis of Bute.

A son and heir was born to the Marquis of Bute at Mount Stuart on Sunday afternoon, Aug. 12. Professor Halliday Croom, of Edinburgh, was in attendance.

The Marquis of Bute, whose great wealth is largely derived from Cardiff Docks, was married in 1905 to Miss Augusta Bellingham, daughter of Sir Henry Bellingham, an Irish baronet.

Celebrated in the little parish church of Kilsarin, County Louth, the wedding was a social event which aroused widespread interest. The ceremony itself was of the greatest simplicity, the service being performed by the parish priest. After the wedding breakfast the pair, headed by Lord Bute's pipers, marched to the seashore, entered a white-painted boat, and were followed by sailors dressed in white, to their yacht.

Lord Bute, who came of age in 1901, has several magnificent residences, including Mount Stuart in the Isle of Bute and Cardiff Castle. His grandfather built the West Bute Dock at a cost of £350,000, the business being now carried on by a liability company, with a capital of three and a half millions sterling. The present Marquis owns about 117,000 acres.

SWIM FOR LIFE.

Lord Edward Seymour's Narrow Escape. Plucky Rescue.

London Daily Mail.—Lord Edward Seymour, a younger son of Lord Hertford, had an exceedingly narrow escape of being drowned while bathing at Bembridge, Isle of Wight, on Monday.

A practised swimmer, Lord Edward was tempted by the dead calm which prevailed into swimming too far out from the shore.

Unable to make his way back, owing to the strength of the tide, he struck out for the Bembridge Fort, distant about a mile from the shore, where he might find a refuge until the tide turned.

At this time, however, he had been considerably more than an hour in the water, and was beginning to feel the effect of his long swim. To add to his misfortunes, as he neared the fort he was caught in a bed of seaweed, and in his efforts to get clear he was suddenly seized with a cramp. Throwing himself on his back, as his last chance, he shouted loudly for help.

Fortunately, his cries reached a small boat, in which Mr. Humphrey Ploeden, a youth of nineteen (son of the police magistrate), was seated, lazily sculling his sister.

Rowing for all he was worth, young Ploeden reached Lord Edward just in time to grip him by the wrists and lift him, not without considerable risk of an upset, into the boat, where he almost immediately collapsed. A few seconds later and help would have been of no avail.

The occurrence, which was witnessed from the verandah of the Garland Club by several spectators without realising its significance, produced a deep impression, the families of both Lord Edward and his rescuer being among the best known of the visitors at Bembridge.
