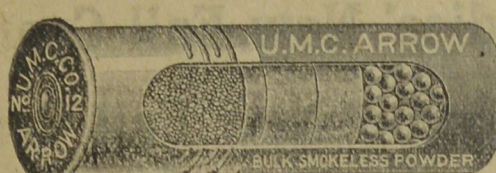

LOST FOR THREE WEEKS

Swiss Lady's Terrible Experience in Alpine Gorge

LONDON, Sept. 9.—Mme. Schopfer, the intrepid Swiss lady who had the remarkable experience of surviving twenty-one days' imprisonment in an Alpine gorge, is now recovering.

Thirty-seven years old, in excellent health and spirits, she left her hotel in the village of Loèche-Bains for a stroll into the mountains. For full three weeks she was lost to her friends, and narrowly escaped death. When she had recovered somewhat from the effects of the strain she had undergone, she described her experience as follows:

"On the morning of August 1 I walked along the bank of the River Dala, but penetrated too far into the gorge and lost my way. While retracing my steps I fell—I don't know how many feet—into a cave, and was horrified to find that, owing to its steep and slippery sides, I was unable to climb out. I shouted all that day and night for help until my voice gave out and my throat was so inflamed that I was unable to eat my last two pieces of chocolate. I continually drank water, which trickled through the rocks. Another day came and went, and yet another—I forgot how many, because I must have become delirious.

"The steeple of the village church was visible from my prison, and on Sunday I could hear the bells pealing and the choir singing, practically within a stone's throw of the spot, where all the while, as it seemed to me, I lay dying by inches.

"I cannot describe my hunger. I

often dreamed about bread and biscuits, which sometimes seemed to be dancing in the air before my eyes. I ate grass, moss, and my leather shoes. Gradually I became a skeleton, and my clothes fell from me. I had plenty of money in my purse, which I would have willingly exchanged for a piece of bread. On two nights rain soaked me, and on several days the heat was so great that I was glad to wet my head and sprinkle my clothes. My voice began to return gradually, and I took much care of it, crying softly at intervals during the day when I thought people might be passing my tomb.

"Slowly my strength failed, until I was unable to stand without resting my hands on the rock. Toward the end I became desperate and wanted to dash my head against the rock—my mind was willing, but my flesh was too weak. Then God sent darkness. I remember no more."

In the meantime the missing woman's husband and guides were searching the overlooking mountains, inquiring in every village. On August 22 a peasant named Adolphe heard groaning while he was walking on the bank of the Dala River. He rescued Mme. Schopfer, whom he carried like a baby, insensible, to the hospital. Mme. Schopfer recovered her senses thirty hours later. During her ordeal her hair turned from black to grey.

Records kept here show that since the middle of January last the Alps claimed seventy-four victims, some of whom were women.

The Liberal Government invites a comparison of the Conservative policy of high tariff and low revenue under which millions of people left Canada and the commerce of the country languished, and the tariff for revenue which was adopted by the Liberals, the beneficial effects of which are found on every side, and directly obvious in the large yearly surpluses to which the Liberals may justly point with pride.

PEOPLE REMAIN UNCONVINCED.

To talk scandals which cannot be proved, and present a platform which cannot be put in practical operation, is not calculated to convince the people of Canada that a change of government is necessary. But to take along a man like Geo. E. Foster has charged many scandals and proved none, advocated many platforms and abandoned them all, and who finally himself falls under the condemnation of a Royal Commission, is to bring politics into contempt and provoke derision instead of respect for the cause advanced.

WHO GOT THIS MONEY.

Mr. Borden has much to say on the subject of election purity, but he is very reticent with respect to certain moneys used for campaign purposes by the Con-

servative party in which the names of William Mackenzie of Mackenzie and Mann, David Russell, and Hugh Graham of the Montreal Star figure, and in which certain promissory notes for \$200,000 and \$100,000 are prominent features? It must be assumed that history has been forgotten or that political crimes, such as those committed by the Conservatives, can be eliminated from any discussion touching the merits of the two political parties.

It strikes the average man as the height of absurdity for Conservatives, who were turned out of power for grafting and practising political corruption, to appeal to Canadians to place them in power again to the end that they may put down grafting, punish dishonest men, secure clean elections and imprison corruptionists. They once had the opportunity to do these things, but failed in them. In the meantime, some of the men who were in power previous to 1896 have been doubly condemned for their shifty business methods and questionable transactions. Canada has done with these men, they will never again be in power.

POST OFFICE REFORMS.

The Postmaster General, Hon. Rudolphe Lemieux, has decided to give to the Dominion a one cent rate for drop letters, instead of the two cent rate which now prevails. Some years ago the rate was one cent for drop letters, since which time it was raised to two cents. Public opinion has been strongly in favor of this reform, and many representations have been made to the government on the subject, and very shortly the effect of this will be seen by the regulations bringing the lesser rate into force, which the Postmaster-General is now engaged in formulating. The Liberal government is truly a progressive one, fully alive to the needs of the people.

TRENT VALLEY CANAL.

Another contract has been awarded for the construction of the Trent Valley Canal. The section of the Rice Lake Division, Section 5, from the highway bridge at Campbellford to deep water in Crow, a distance of three miles, has been given to Brown and Aylmer, who were the lowest tenderers. The contract price is about \$550,000. Tenders are now being asked for Section 1. The intention is to prosecute the work with all possible speed as explained by Mr. Lemieux, when opening the Kirk-

field lift lock recently, so that there will be unbroken navigation from the Georgian Bay to Lake Ontario, thus providing another outlet for the wheat crop of the west.

QUEBEC BRIDGE DISASTER.

As might be expected, the Conservatives seek to make political capital from this regrettable disaster. The facts are that a section of the iron work collapsed, and the government is now engaged in an investigation to place the blame where it properly belongs. A commission of investigation has the matter in hand, and nothing will be left undone to fix the responsibility where it belongs. In the meantime, the assurance of the Prime Minister has been given that this great national enterprise is only delayed, and that work will proceed as quickly as the nature of the accident will permit.

NEW CABINET MINISTERS.

Sir Wilfrid lost no time in filling the vacant cabinet positions, and he has been fortunate in securing the services of men whose record is clean and who will bring additional prestige to a cabinet which today is the pride and admiration of the people of Canada. Hon. Mr. Graham as leader of the Ontario Liberals, has made a reputation for himself of which any man might feel justly proud and his services will redound to the credit of the Dominion. Hon. Mr. Pugsley, is not so well known in the western provinces, but in New Brunswick he stands for progressive government, and the people of that province feel that they have contributed one of their most intellectual men to assist the premier in his arduous duties.

DIED LIKE A HERO.

Further Details of the Desperate Fighting at Casablanca.

PARIS, Sept. 9.—The government today announced that it was convinced that the serious conflict in which eight Frenchmen were killed near Casablanca, occurred Tuesday, Sept. 3rd, and that Vice-Admiral Philibert's cable message of yesterday referred to the same engagement. Major Prevost, of the Foreign Legion, was killed in the thick of the fighting which raged at Sid Moums, where the Moors attacked the French flying column as it was returning from Littlehills, where bands of the enemy had been dispersed. As the Moorish horses galloped to the front, chanting hymns, the French lines were quickly formed to receive the shock. Major Prevost, who was in front of his men, said: "Courage, my children," and then turning once more to the battalion of the Foreign Legion, which he had led so long, the major cried: "Forward, my children, forward." At that moment a bullet pierced Prevost's heart.

The fighting then became desperate, the opposing Moors and legionaries saw-sawing backwards and forwards about the body of the major, the men of the Foreign Legion refusing to abandon their beloved commander. Under the clash of bayonet and sword, when men were falling right and left and the field was covered with riderless, maddened, wounded horses, the legionaries held their ground until they succeeded in carrying off Prevost's body.
