

OUTRAGE DENOUNCED.

Hon. Messrs Robinson and McKeown Used Justifiably Strong Language in Condemning one of the Legislature's Final Acts.

The legislature Friday evening went into consideration of a bill to incorporate the Legere Corner Water and Light Co., which has been recommended to the favorable consideration of the House by the corporations committee.

Hon. Mr. Maxwell said that it had been suggested in the corporations committee that the names of Messrs. Foster, Thibideau and Leger be added to the bill, as incorporators. He did not notice that the amendments to that effect were recommended in the report or that it had been added to the bill. He moved that the names of these gentlemen be added.

Hon. Mr. McLeod seconded the motion.

Mr. Robinson was considerably surprised at the amendment moved by the member from St. John. Several amendments made by the corporations committee had been accepted after careful consideration, and he hardly knew what course to take. He had no communication from the people sought to be added and no request whatever from those gentlemen to be included in the bill. They did not live at Legere Corner and had no property there, and he could scarcely understand the action of the committee in seeking to add names to the bill at the request of a man who had no particular interest in the place whatever. There was a petition from the inhabitants strongly in favor of the bill, and in undertaking to add the names which they did to the bill, they were adding persons who were opposed to the whole thing, and it was not in the interests of the bill or the objects sought to be obtained, that they should be added to it. The locality might at some time become part of the city of Moncton, and ample provision was contained in the bill for the taking over of the property at any time on most favorable terms.

The Hon. Mr. Maxwell said that the matter had been given careful attention and there was an honest and sincere desire to assist the measure. Had there been the slightest objection raised by Mr. LeBlanc, to the inclusion of the three gentlemen named he (the speaker) would not have raised the question at all.

Mr. C. M. Leger said that there was no desire on the part of these three gentlemen to come into the company at all. On the contrary they were opposing the bill.

Mr. McKeown said they were told that these gentlemen would come in but the gentlemen themselves said they would not. Mr. Sumner said that if these gentlemen wouldn't put up the money he would put it up for them. If the company was incorporated they could buy stock in it, but to include them as incorporators, without their consent was hardly

calculated to make the proceedings harmonious.

Dr. Sormany said he was opposed not to the men who sought to be added, but to the project of adding them. It had been said that Mr. LeBlanc did not object to these gentlemen coming in, on the contrary he was opposed to it, at least he said so.

Mr. Leger asked if the legislature had power to add the names of persons as incorporators to a company without their consent. On the question being put, that the bill be agreed to it was carried.

Mr. McKeown asked whether having regard to the vote just taken it was proposed to make any change in the board of provisional directors of the proposed company. He was astonished at what had just happened. The spectacle of a responsible government taking the course they had at the bidding of a defeated candidate, was about the most flagrant example of the exercise of partizan politics it had ever been his lot to witness in the course of nearly twenty years' experience in that chamber. It was the most disgraceful exhibition of partizanship he had ever seen. Here was a case of a village which had been scourged with typhoid fever, caused from impure water in consequence of which many homes had been devastated, and men who lived in the place, and who had just been added to that bill as incorporators, would do nothing at all to assist in getting pure water. The promoter of this bill came forward and expressed his willingness to take the whole burden upon himself and his family, but at the behest of the defeated candidate for that district, he was to be balked in his good intention. Rather than that bill should go through this defeated candidate was prepared to put up the money himself, and he regretted that in a bill of that nature, the government could not rise above the petty partizanship which had characterized their action ever since they got onto the treasury benches.

Hon. Mr. Hazen said that there was not the slightest reason for any exhibition of feeling on the part of hon. gentlemen opposite. The facts were that a charter of incorporation was sought for the exercise of a public franchise by members of one family. There was not a single other person mentioned in the bill. He would not have voted as he had done, but for the fact that Mr. LeBlanc had consented to the addition of the names of these three gentlemen. It was very important that a matter of that sort in the interests of the community should not be vested in one family alone.

After some further discussion the House divided on the third reading which was carried by 16 votes to thirteen.

STRANGE DEATH OF WEALTHY MERCHANT.

N. Y. Police Investigating Sudden Death of a Rich Bostonian.

NEW YORK, May 30.—An investigation was begun today into the circumstances surrounding the mysterious death of Charles M. Holmes, a wealthy Boston leather merchant, last night. Mr. Holmes died in the lobby of the Hoffman House, where he was a guest, immediately after his return there in a taxicab from a visit to a house in West Forty-seventh street. He had been taken suddenly ill during the visit and was hurried back to the hotel before a physician was summoned.

After his death the police took into custody Hugh Fitzsimmons, the driver of the taxicab; Mrs. Clara Moore, of 120 West Forty-seventh street, in whose apartments Mr. Holmes was stricken; Josephine Wells, Mrs. Moore's maid; and Frederick Moorehead, elevator man in the apartment house in which Mrs. Moore lives. Moorehead and Miss Wells assisted Holmes to the cab.

Two detectives were standing at the entrance of the Hoffman House last night when a cab dashed up and a grey-haired man was helped out and half-carried, half-dragged to the lobby of the hotel, where he died a moment afterwards, after he had been recognized by the employees of the hotel. The cabman, who had been detained by the police, was taken into custody, and accompanied the detectives to the Forty-seventh street house, where Mrs. Moore and the maid and the elevator man was found. Mr. Holmes' body was given into the custody of a coroner.

Mr. Holmes had been at the Hoffman House since Wednesday. He had made the hotel his headquarters on monthly business trips to New York for many years. He was sixty-five years old.

WARFARE IN IRELAND.

Peasants In Mountains — Farmers Defy the Constabulary.

A state of affairs bordering on revolution prevails in some parts of Ireland at the present time. In the mountains of Roscommon the peasants are in arms, and have fortified the entries against the police. One hundred constabulary are encamped near Boyle, County Roscommon, but have so far made no attack. Recently they made a demonstration against the mountaineers, but retired without effecting anything.

The correspondent of a London paper wrote regarding this:

"The mountaineers claim the withdrawal of the police as a victory. I have just returned from the district. When I went there last night I found things blazing on the hilltops and squads of men galloping about, evidently planning a great midnight demonstration in honor of the event. At the entrance to the mountain fastnesses I was met by several young peasants mounted on ponies, who surrounded me, and, after a short conversation, being satisfied that I was not in the service of the Government or the landlords, passed me through. Some moments afterwards the long toot of a horn came from this vantage, and was answered from the hills and along the route.

"The signal evidently ensured a free passage, for there was no further hindrance, but hearty salutations were shouted from the hedges by rough-bearded men (and amazonian women).

"A man who was evidently a leader of the tenantry declared that he hoped for a cessation of hostilities soon, but added that the peasants would fight to the last for their hearths and homes if the 'eviction brigade' came along.

"The wives and daughters of the farmers seem even more determined than the men on keeping the struggle alive, and the women were foremost in the fray at the recent attacks on the constabulary."

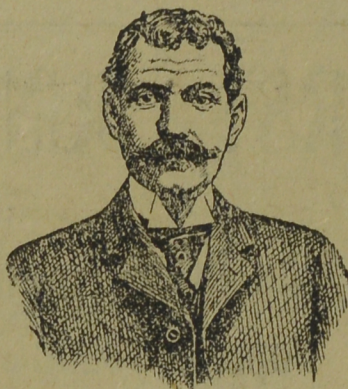

Witty Canadian Barrister's Plea Carries Weight With the Jury.

There have been many witty Irish-Canadians in the legal profession. Chief among these was Mr. James O'Reilly, who was the Crown prosecutor in the case against the murderer of D'Arcy McGee in 1868. But Mr. O'Reilly had not always such stern matters to deal with and was known as the most brilliant wit at the Kingston bar. He was once employed by the plaintiff in a breach of promise case and, as his client was ugly, he saw that he must make a practical appeal to the jury.

TO MAKE HER TALLER.

The Clothes a Little Woman Ought to Wear.

Just back from Paris, the tiny mite of a woman was airing her views on clothes.

"The American dressmaker takes too little account of height, but lays all the stress on weight," she said. "Her clients are apt to be divided into two classes—stout and slender. The slender little woman of five feet gets about the same treatment at her hands as the slender young amazon of five feet seven or eight."

"A makes bow at the back of the neck is a wonderful improver to little persons. It adds height marvelously."

"Then there is the shoulder. Peel of my shoulder seam. It corresponds exactly with my shoulder line, but let it be a fraction of an inch too long and I am no longer petite, but a dwarf."

"Heavy, coarse materials are only for the tall. Fine, smooth surfaces are for us. And there is this about the skirt: Fullness should begin at the hip, not below it; otherwise the skirt becomes a mere flounce instead of a thing of lines. Between the waist line and the hips the skirt should be perfectly fitted."

"The hat for a small person is more becoming if it hatches the uppermost part of the costume. If the bodice is a tint, the hat should be of the same complexion. In the case of a very small woman, waist and skirt of different tones or colors are not to be thought of. Even the gloves do their part in making or marring the picture. White ones with dark gowns dwarf the height, and so, too, do capes and other fussy shoulder arrangements. Trimmed skirts and braided effects are also ruled out."
