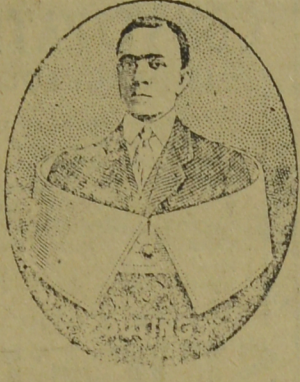

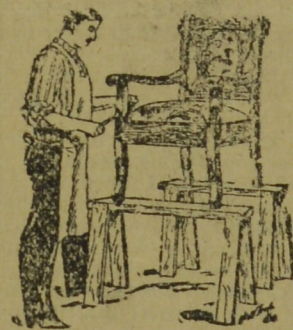

TORY SURRENDER.

Force of Public Opinion Compelled Opposition to Permit Passage of Parliamentary Estimates.

OTTAWA, June 1.—The present week promises to be a busy one in the Commons. The government will start morning sessions of the House on Tuesday, and for the balance of the week there will be but brief interludes of a few hours each day in the fight for supremacy between a determined majority and an obstinate minority.

If the opposition will persist in availing themselves of their privilege of freedom of unlimited debate allowed by the present parliamentary rules to completely block the real business of legislation, the government will at least force them to work long and hard to carry out their threat of complete obstruction. The week will probably suffice to drive home to the general public the object lesson of the present unparalleled situation, and if the force of public opinion does not bring the opposition to a more reasonable frame of mind during the week, other steps will then be taken by the government to end the present deadlock.

SATURDAY'S BACKDOWN

The fact that the opposition leader at an early hour Saturday morning yielded sufficiently to let part of the item for salaries of customs officials go through (\$1,705,000 for outside salaries) although earlier in the week positive statements had been made by Mr. Foster and other leading obstructionists, that not one dollar would be voted, indicates that Mr. Borden is already beginning to fear that the present tactics are being "overdone." However, even the backdown to that extent was largely because Mr. Borden had again temporarily taken the reins in his own hands. Mr. Foster himself was unwilling to pass the amount, but was overruled by his titular leader.

Toworrow the government will again attempt to get supply for the remaining

customs estimates. Later on the election bill will come up again and the issue now dividing the two parties will be again squarely put before the country. Manitoba Liberal members will be able to fortify their demands for some protection against the Rookin government's complete control of lists in that province by citing some flagrant instances of manipulation in connection with the new lists now being prepared.

NO MONEY FOR CHARWOMEN

One strong influence now making itself felt in the direction of accelerating the opposition's backdown is the outcry that is beginning to arise among civil servants and others throughout the country aggrieved several thousands, who are directly affected by the present stoppage or payments of federal treasury. In Ottawa, for instance, the 33 charwomen engaged in keeping the parliament buildings clean, received on Saturday \$7.50 each, just one third of the monthly salary. The laborers employed in connection with the buildings also got only one-third pay. The effect of the action of the opposition in holding up the salaries of civil servants is felt particularly keenly in cases like the above, and the way they are expressing their disgust is not calculated to impress the opposition with the idea that votes are being made by the present tactics. Conservative canvassers in the provincial election campaign in Ottawa are beginning to report that civil servants of Tory proclivities who are feeling the present pinch of lack of any ready money are declaring they will not vote for the candidate of any party so stupid as to unnecessarily hold up pressing and absolutely not-contentious items—the estimates.

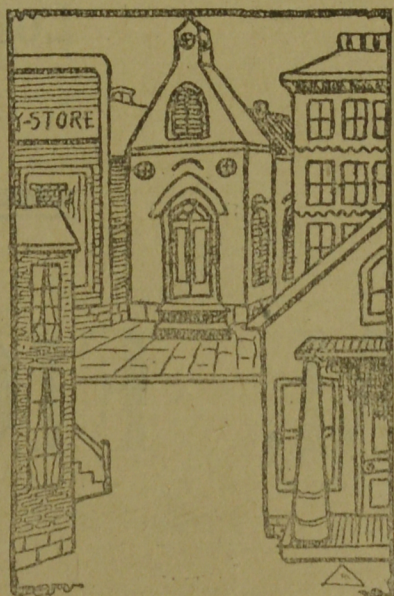
BUILDING A CITY.

How to Make a Town With Pasteboard, Scissors and Paints.

When it is cold and rainy and the little ones are tired of playing nursery games, let them try their hands at building a city—yes, building a city. Now, don't look incredulous, for it can be done, and in one day too.

Supply yourself with all the empty pasteboard boxes you can find about the house, a pair of scissors that your mother has thrown out of her work-basket (they'll do to cut pasteboard and paper), a tube of library paste, your box of water colors and a soft lead pencil. Then set to work.

The architectural designs should be first drawn on scrap paper; then follow them on the pasteboard box sides,

cutting out carefully and putting together with thin paper and paste. All doors and windows must be cut and completed before joining the four sides

of a building. The roof goes on last. After the paste has dried thoroughly begin tinting with water colors. Some of the buildings should be made to resemble brick, others stone and still others frame. As soon as the tints are dry the bricks, stones, boards and shingles may be brought into shape with the lead pencil.

A large table in the center of the room will answer for the city's site. If the builders do not like a level site, they may have as many hills as desired by laying small pillows about the table and covering with a bedspread, smoothing it over the ups and downs made by the pillows to give a good surface on which to place the houses.

A public square may be laid out with the public buildings, such as stores, a church, a courthouse, a schoolhouse and a public library, grouped about it. Arrange the residences along streets opening into the public square. On account of the uncertainty of "pillow ground" it would be more satisfactory to keep the table surface flat and hard for the city site; then there will be no danger from a careless little hand or arm resting against the hillside to tumble the houses into the hollows below.

An interesting Deed.

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House, Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D., 1898, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of September, 1908, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale.

For any performance or entertainment requiring a clear stage for a one night stand, \$ 35 00
The same for each successive evening performance 30 00
The same for each Matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, motion pictures, entertainments, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind where any foreign talent is employed and for all colored minstrel performances where any foreign talent is employed, each night with scenery 30 00
The same as above without scenery 25 00
The same for course of three to five consecutive nights with scenery, per night 27 00
The same without scenery per night 23 00
For one week stand with scenery 135 00
For the same without scenery 120 00
For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for

light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainment, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind, being local talent only, and having no paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel performances and having no foreign talent, each night with scenery 15 00
For the same without scenery 10 00
For each matinee, local talent only 7 50
For each political meeting 15 00
On the Sabbath for religious or temperance meetings, one meeting 10 00
For two meetings same person, same day 15 00
For rehearsals for afternoon 3 00
For rehearsals for evening 5 00
For each motion picture entertainment owned and operated by residents of the city, per night 20 00
The same for three to five consecutive nights, per night 18 00
For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 10 00
Passed and enacted the Seventh day of April, A.D., 1908.
