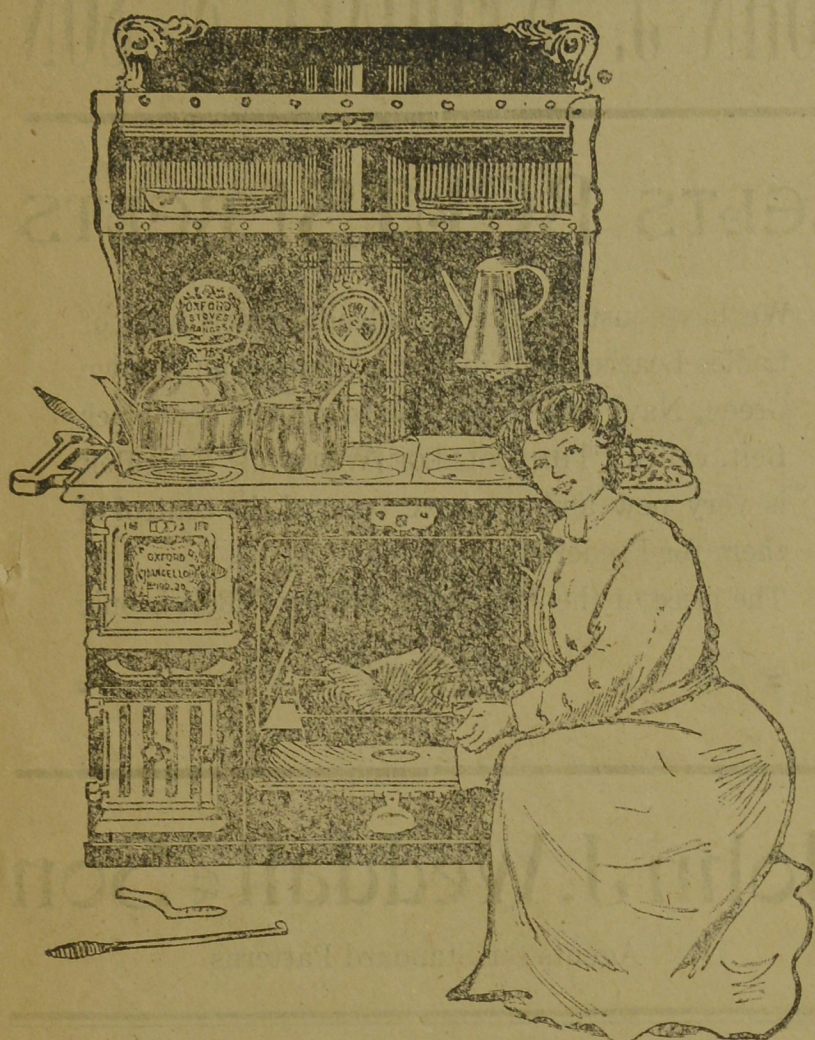

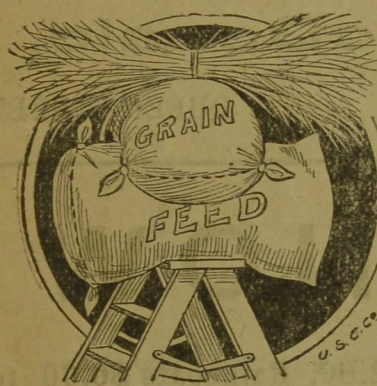

IGNOMINIOUS SURRENDER.

Dr. Thompson's View of British Diplomacy.

OTTAWA, Feb. 29.—Dr. Thompson, member for Yukon, roused the House from its lethargy last night with a speech full of strong comment upon the relations between Canada and the mother country. On motion to go into supply Mr. Sloan raised the question of pelagic sealing, and urged that steps should be taken to prevent the destruction of that industry by the operations particularly of Japanese. Dr. Thompson followed with a survey of the diplomatic negotiations which had taken place between Great Britain and the United States in relation to Canada, and declared that the record was one of ignominious surrender of Canadian rights. Canada had looked after her own protection, and had helped Great Britain. England's friendship for the United States was such that she was prepared, apparently, to sacrifice Canadian interests every time to those of that nation. It was a position of

subserviency which Canadians could not continue to occupy. The time had come when Canada should have a navy of her own, and when she should be placed in a position of equality with any other nation. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in replying to the discussion acknowledged that there were anomalies in the position which Canada occupied in relation to Great Britain, but they had no grievance whatever. With regard to the situation on the Pacific coast he believed British diplomacy had been far seeing, and that the matter of their relations with Oriental and Caucasian races a system would be evolved which would be satisfactory to all. The question of pelagic sealing was a complicated one, but the matter was engaging the attention of the government, and in the meantime he was not prepared to make any statement. Mr. Fielding hoped the impression would not go abroad that there was any considerable section in Canada who did not desire to remain within the empire. The House afterwards went into supply, and the opposition continued their obstructive tactics.

TAX BACHELORS SAYS GEN. BOOTH

To the Selfishness of the Age the Great Commander Attributes the Lowest Birth Rate Record

LONDON, March 2.—"All bachelors should, in my judgment, be taxed, if not absolutely compelled to marry. Men who are unable to select a wife for themselves should apply to the Salvation army."

Gen. Booth, the founder and commander of the army, is moved to say this by the declining birth rate, which, according to figures, just given out for 1906, was the lowest since the civil registration was established in England and Wales, and the tendency to shirk marriage. Of the cause Gen. Booth says:

"The root of the difficulty lies undoubtedly in the selfishness of the age, for which there is only one remedy—namely, the love and service of God and the recognition of his claims. Among the contributory causes I would name the abominable housing conditions in many of the large cities, and, indeed, many of the villages, and the insensate attempt to employ women, especially married women, to do men's work."

The annual report for 1906 of the registrar general of births, marriages

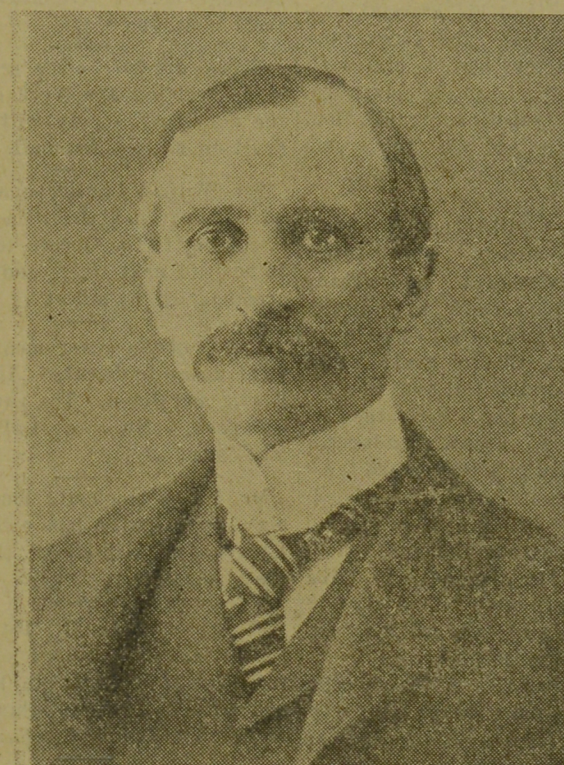
and deaths in England and Wales has just been issued in the form of a blue book. The birth rate was 27.1 in 1,000, the lowest rate recorded since civil registration was established. The total number of births registered during the year was 935,081.

In 1876 the birth rate was 36.3 in 1,000, and since then has steadily fallen to its present rate, which is 1.6 in 1,000 lower than the average of the preceding ten years.

The death rate during the same year was 15.4 in 1,000, or 1.4 lower than the average for the preceding ten years, the total number of deaths was 531,281.

People do not marry so young nowadays. Ten years ago, fifty-nine bridegrooms out of every 1,000, and 188 out of every 1,000 brides were under the age of twenty-one. The 1906 returns show forty-eight bridegrooms and 155 brides out of every 1,000 to be minors.

The average age of those marrying however, was not very high, being 28.45 years in the case of the men, and 26.37 in the case of the women.

ANARCHIST KILLED WHILE ATTACKING CHICAGO'S CHIEF.

But Not Before Wounding His Prey in Hand with a Dirk.

CHICAGO, March 2.—An unsuccessful attempt to assassinate George M. Shippey, chief of the Chicago police department, was made as the officer was leaving his residence this morning.

The chief, his son and his driver, Jas. Foley, were attacked by two men with revolvers. Young Shippey and the driver were wounded. The chief returned the fire, killing one of his assailants outright.

The chief, it is reported, was stabbed in the right arm during the affray. The attack is supposed to have been made by an anarchist, following the recent activity of the Chicago police after the tragedy at Denver.

Harry Shippey is seriously hurt, but Foley will probably recover. The chief's wound is trivial.

FIRE AT CHIEF'S SON.

The assailant entered Shippey's home while the chief and his son were alone in one of the rooms. The man is said to have handed Chief Shippey a letter, which the chief opened and began to read.

Almost immediately the anarchist drew a revolver and fired at Harry Shippey. The boy fell to the floor and his father grappled with the assailant.

Foley, attracted by the shooting, rushed to his employer's aid. As the servant entered the room the anarchist broke from the chief's grasp, aimed deliberately and shot Foley twice.

Again the chief closed with the man, and the latter turned on him with a knife.

Shippey attempted to grasp the weapon and received a deep cut on the hand. The official then succeeded in reaching his own revolver and fired shot after shot into the would-be assassin's body.

The attack on the chief is believed to have been inspired by the recent activity of the Chicago police following the killing of Rev. Father Leo Heinrichs, a Roman Catholic priest, who was shot by an anarchist in Denver while the priest was administering the sacrament to his slayer.

CONSPIRACY DISCOVERED.

Immediately following the tragedy in Denver attempts were made to trace the crime to a conspiracy hatched in Chicago.

The local police discovered that the society of Italians formed here had been issuing inflammatory literature aimed at clericals, and also that several local clergymen had received threatening letters.

Yesterday while the funeral of Father Leo was being held in Paterson, N. J., details of police guarded several of the Roman Catholic churches here. Especial precautions were taken in the Italian quarter, where

officers in citizens' clothes scrutinized every worshipper as the congregation entered. Later the officers moved to the altars and stood guard over the priests as they conducted the services.
