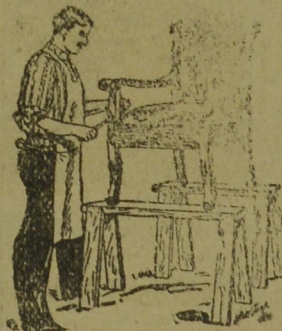

A CRUEL CLAUSE OF THE LICENSE ACT.

One clause of the License Law which has been persistently put forward as one of its most admirable features is that an order may be obtained from the police magistrate forbidding the sale of liquor to any person who wastes his means or endangers the happiness of his family by drinking liquor. Just think of it! After the government's partner, the rum-seller, has absorbed his victim's property, beggared his wife and family, soaked out of him all his manhood, and destroyed his prospects for time and eternity, this beneficent provision of the License Act comes into operation and permits the poor wretch to be held up to ridicule and contempt of his fellow citizens. "The Scott Act" has no such provision as this," the liquor people triumphantly exclaim. It certainly has not. It prohibits the sale of intoxicants to him before he has reached the depths, and while there is yet hope.

But would this much vaunted clause be effective in preventing the poor drunkard from getting intoxicated? Not at all. All who have had any experience of the working of the License Law know that for every licensed saloon there is at least one low unlicensed dive which obtains its supplies from the saloon, finds a refuge, and he can obtain liquor while he has a cent in his pocket, or an article to pawn. Let all thoughtful citizens consider well whether they are willing to exchange the Scott Act for a law which contains such a cruel and hypocritical clause as the one cited above.

THREE BURNED TO DEATH IN FIRE.

Woman and Two Children Died in Burning Pittsburg House-Husband is Missing.

PITTSBURG, March 2.—One woman and two children were burned to death, the husband and father is missing, two houses were destroyed, and a third badly damaged by a fire that broke out on the second floor of 3110 Brockton avenue, Saturday morning.

The dead: Mart Bauchauk, ten years old, found in corner of yard. Christine Bauchauk, four years old, found in a smouldering mattress; Mrs. J. Bauchauk, mother of the two children, found burned to a crisp. J. Bauchauk is missing.

The bodies of the woman and child were not found until after the fire had been extinguished.

J. Bauchauk, the husband and father seeing the sleeping room filled with smoke, became excited and leaped from the second storey window. He has not since been seen.

It is reported that he ran to the rear of the building in an effort to save his wife and children, and it is feared he was also burned to death.

A 12 YEAR OLD HERO.

The following from the Students' Journal, of St. Mary's College, Vancouver, B.C., gives that paper opportunity to point with pride to one of the boys of its preparatory department of last year, who is a relative by marriage of Mrs. P.C. Keegan, formerly of this city.

(The item is copied from the Wallace Times, of Idaho, where young Keegan has since been residing.)

Lawrence Keegan, the 12 year old son of Mr. F. W. Keegan, proved himself a hero Sunday afternoon at Medical Lake, when, with a crowd of men standing near, but none offering help, the little fellow plunged into the water and saved a drowning man.

According to the report from Medical Lake the act was one of rare bravery, the little fellow having to wrestle with a struggling man far his superior in weight and strength.

Lawrence, who is well known in Wallace, returned to the city yesterday afternoon.

"The fellow went to dive in," explained Lawrence, "but pretty soon he began hollering that he was drowning. There were a lot of people standing around there and none of them offered to help the man, so I threw off my coat and went in after him. I got to where he was just as he was sinking the third time. His

face was all black. "I dove in under and caught him by the hair."

"I got him to the surface and then began to call for some one to come and help me, but the people on the shore all stood by and looked on till finally a boat came."

"I was good and tired when the boat got there and my clothes were so soaked that I had a hard time keeping on top; and the water was mighty cold too."

Lawrence is regarded as an exceptionally good swimmer for a boy of his age. He lived for a time at Vancouver, B. C., where he had lots of practice in the water, and also had some experience on the Atlantic coast.

When he made the rescue he was fully dressed, except being coatless. He even wore his shoes.
