lifeless form, with a bitter, cutting blizzard straight in their faces, and the thermometer twenty degrees below zero.

What there was in his own experience that filled him with a madness to alleviate distress, no one knows. He not only had a genius for living for mankind, but a passion for it. The demands upon his strength, the sympathy and money of this man are beyond belief. He was approached by individuals of every grade of society and his aid asked in every undertaking of "very nature and size."

A perfectly strange woman walked into his office one day, at a time when his banks were threatening that they could not carry him any more in justice to the public, a time when his own worries were greater than most people can stand; and this woman told him she had furnished a large rooming-house and had made some payments on her things, but that owing to the panic, people had left rooms vacant on her hands, and to meet the payments was impossible and her creditors were about to crush her. She had never traded with Mr. Hennessey, her furniture and all else having been bought of a rival house, and furthermore, Mr. Hennessey was not enlarging his social acquaintance intentionally, nor was he mauling himself dear to the public for any reason, such as wanting to find any public office but once never tried for an office but once, and then he resigned his State senatorship before his term was out.

But here was a woman, who, on a small scale, was suffering the same possibilities he was himself, and she needed help. An Appreciative Article on the Life and Work of a Distinguished Frederictonian

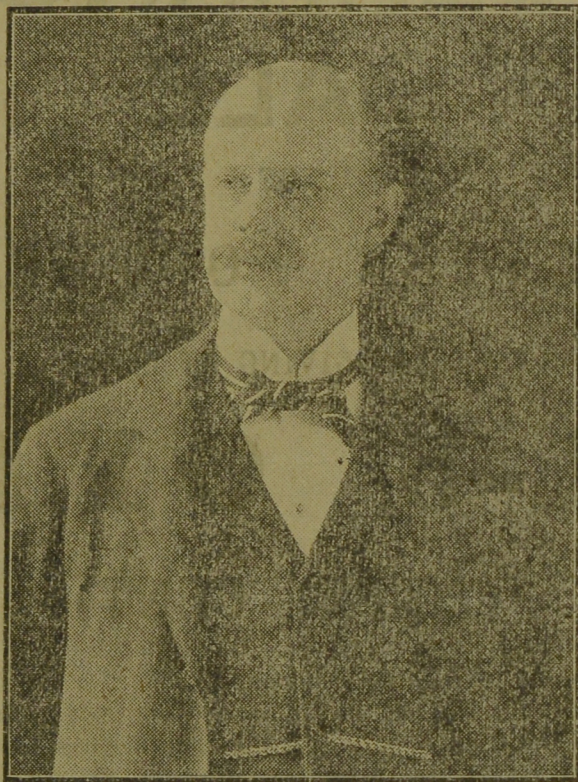

One afternoon in Butte when I was out with a Very Little Boy, we came upon a man sitting quite still. If I noticed the man at all it was vaguely to remark to myself that he looked rather tired and that his overcoat was not especially becoming. But the boy ran up to the man and offered his hand, saying, "Good-bye, Nice Man!"

Feeling the weight of these little manners upon me, I corrected the child. "Say, 'How-do-you-do,' Dick—not good-bye." But instead of

genius of Mr. Hennessey. Mr. Hennessey's genius lay in living this life for the good of his fellow-men as well as for the good of himself. Mr. Hennessey, during the years that his fair dealings his tireless labors and his unflinching sympathies made for him the centre of the greatest mining camp in the world, rose from a young man with one apple and the sense of humor, to a position as clerk in a small dry goods shop, much involved and backed by another strong and gone-away citizen of

obeying, me, the Very Little Boy walked back to the man who has sitting quite still, and put his baby arms around his neck and kissed him—a thing I have never known him to do upon meeting any stranger before—and again almost with stubbornness mixed in with his pretty, childish sweetness, he repeated with a significance, he was innocent of, "I say good-bye, Nice Man!"

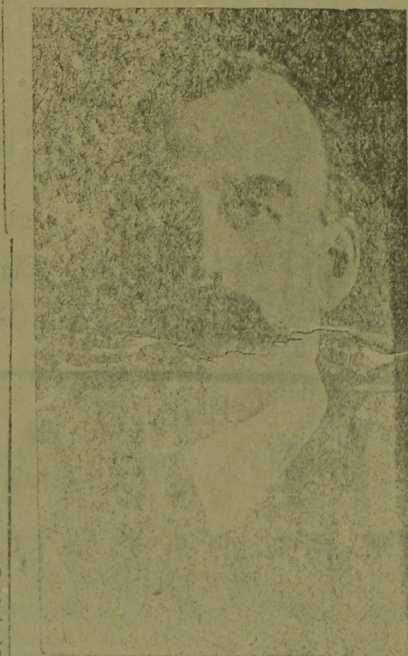
The next day when this man was on his way to an early service at his church, he dropped dead on the side walk, and I found that we had spoken with the biggest man in the states, and that we had without knowing what we did, said "Good-bye, Nice Man!" to Daniel J. Hennessey.

Before coming to Butte I thought I had become familiar with its celebrities, all of them. I had heard of Senator Clark. I had a feeling of having heard somebody saying some thing, in passing, about a person named Heinz and I was very sure indeed that I had heard of one Mary McLean. But until I arrived at Butte, I had never heard of Daniel J. Hennessey.

Some years ago a young man with exactly fifty cents in his pockets, the glowing love of humanity in his soul and the necessity of making his own living and making it quickly, struck a crude, smoky, brutal mining camp which consisted of cabins, saunas, and mine dumps thrown all over a cluster of hills. Mr. Hennessey had come where he belonged, he had come to Butte, where he was destined to be the very heart of the people and the mainstay of the industrial, social, political and Christian life of the United States. He walked up the main street of the camp, looking for something to eat that he could afford to buy. Presently he saw a fruit vender whose apples appealed to him, and he selected two, supposing, of course, that the price would be five or ten cents. But things in this camp were different from what he was accustomed to, and to his as

tonishment the Italian said twenty five cents apiece. The humor of the situation delighted the young man, and looking around, he saw a child standing alone on the corner. He handed the little person one apple and ate the other himself. And this is the keynote of a remarkable character.
