## BROKE HIS NECK

Young Man Instantly Killed in the Dominion Steel Works at Sydney

SYDNEY, N. S., Feb. 11.—(Special)—About 1.20 this morning, Dan McLeod, son of N. K. McLeod of this city, was killed at the steel works by becoming entangled in some belting, while working at the rolling mills. The young man was a roller turner, and while at work his hand became entangled in the belting. He made terrific efforts to free himself, but was unsuccessful, and his body was carried under the rollers, breaking his neck. Death was practically instantaneous. The body was considerably bruised through coming in contact with the rollers. He was found a few minutes after the accident. Dr. Hekindale was called, but found on arrival that the poor fellow was dead. McLeod was about twenty years old, and had been working at the steel works for some time.

## IMPORTANT MEASURE

Dr. Pugsley will Introduce Bill in Parliament Regulating Booms in St. John River

OTTAWA, ONT., February 11.—(Special)—Hon. Wm. Pugsley has given notice of his intention to introduce a measure to regulate the placing and maintaining of booms in international streams. The effect is that in the case of rivers of the international boundaries, such as the St. John river, lumbermen shall be bound to take precautions to insure that their logs shall only go into the section of the river which belong to the country in which the logs were cut. The bill although a national one will apply chiefly to the St. John river, but may also have application to the Rainy River district.

## POLICY OF SNEERS

Fredericton Gleaner took Mr. Hazen to Task for trying to Block New Brunswick's Legitimate Claims on Federal Treasury

Mr. Hazen's sneers at the efforts of the government to obtain better terms for New Brunswick from the Dominion Government, and to recover New Brunswick's share of the Halifax Fishery Award and to prevent the representation of New Brunswick being reduced, have not been favorably received by many persons throughout the province who have hitherto been ranked among his followers.

They see plainly enough that a policy of sneers is not one that is likely to build up a party, and that in the present case Mr. Hazen and his party are likely to be left in a very unfortunate position as a result of his speech of Thursday last in criticism of the speech of the Lieutenant-Governor.

It is reasonably certain that before another general election takes place this province will be in possession of its share of the Halifax Award obtained for it by the efforts of the present government.

It is also reasonably certain that in a year or less, New Brunswick will

be receiving from the Dominion Government an additional subsidy of \$130,000 a year as a result of the efforts of the present government.

Yet, when Mr. Hazen is asked what he has done to bring about these most satisfactory results he will only be able to answer that he violently opposed the government in their efforts to obtain these things for New Brunswick and that he sneered at them because they were referred to in the Lieutenant-Governor's speech.

Such a remarkable instance of a political leader digging his own grave and that of his party has never been known in this province, as that furnished by Mr. Hazen. Every one in New Brunswick is, or ought to be, anxious that this province should receive from the Dominion Government all that it is entitled to and Mr. Hazen apparently thinks that New Brunswick should have nothing, and that it is right for us to give away to the Dominion Government money which properly belongs to this province.

We are inclined to think that Mr. Hazen stands almost alone in holding this opinion.

## A TORONTO FIRE.

Thirty Persons Homeless Result of Early Morning Blaze.

TORONTO, February 11.—(Special)—Shortly before one o'clock this morning, fire broke out in the brick block of four stories, number 758-764 Queen street east. The stock in 10 cent store of J. W. Bowles was totally destroyed, involving a loss of \$8,000. The millinery store of Miss Barret was also destroyed. About thirty persons occupying apartments in the upper stories are rendered homeless.

## THE SWING OF VICTORY

Government Candidates well Received in up River Parishes—Electors taking no Stock in Opposition Bluff and Bluster

Hon. E. H. Allen, who with his colleagues has been campaigning in the upper section of the county, returned to the city at noon today, to attend a meeting of the local government colleagues, he addressed one meeting in Kingsclear, two in Prince William, two in Dumfries, and two in Canterbury. All were well attended and characterized with great enthusiasm.

At Hawshaw on Saturday night Messrs. Allen, Burden and Goodspeed addressed a meeting, which even Conservatives admit was a much larger and more representative gathering than that which assembled in the same hall on Thursday night to hear the opposition candidates. All the speakers came in for a very flattering reception.

Last night all four candidates addressed a meeting in the Orange hall at Canterbury Station. The veteran Coun. Carr occupied the chair, and the hall was packed to the doors. It was after eleven o'clock before the speech making was finished, but the entire audience remained until the close.

Messrs. McLellan, Burden and Goodspeed speak at North Lake this evening, and it is Hon. Mr. Allen's intention to join them at Canterbury tomorrow.

## MR. ALLEN ENCOURAGED

Discussing the outlook for the government in the up river parishes, Hon. Mr. Allen said that he had travelled by horse and sleigh from Fredericton to Canterbury Station, had conversed with hundreds of people, and he had failed to find the slightest indication of any revulsion

of feeling against the government.

"I have heard a lot of talk," he went on to say, "about the government having lost ground in York, that people who supported it were flocking in hundreds to the opposite ranks. I went to considerable trouble during my trip up river to find out if there was any foundation for these reports, industriously circulated during the past few months, and have arrived at the conclusion that it was nothing but bluff and bluster on the part of the opposition. They have taken no recruits from our party so far as I can learn, and can name none. Should it come down to a matter of names, however, I think I can tell of some people of considerable prominence in these districts who are no longer supporting the opposition candidates. While I do not want our friends to slacken their efforts in the slightest to secure a victory, I am firmly of the opinion that scores of Conservatives are going to give us their support in this contest, and all the indications go to show that the government candidates will win by a majority fully as large as they received in the last contest."

"Notwithstanding the Gleaner's efforts to belittle our meetings, they were all well attended and perfectly satisfactory to the candidates. The ticket has been well received throughout the county, and I want to say for Mr. Goodspeed that he has made a marked impression on the electorate. He is undoubtedly one of the most intelligent and best informed men in the county of York today."

Hon. Mr. Allen will be sworn in as provincial secretary this evening before Governor Tweedie, and will afterwards attend the meeting of the government. Tomorrow he will resume his campaign in the county.

## WISE EXPENDITURE

Government Deserves Great Credit for its Erection of Permanent Bridges and for Obtaining Increased Subsidy

The Telegraph declares that "if the local government is returned to power in March, nothing can save this province from another term of the most reckless extravagance."

This statement is quite in keeping with the absurd falsehoods which the enemies of the government have been propagating on every side ever since the last general election. It did not make the least difference whether there was any basis of truth or otherwise for their statements.

In what respect have the government been extravagant?

They have built new steel bridges to take the place of the old temporary structures which lasted from ten to fifteen years.

Were not these bridges required? They have also built new covered bridges which will last fifty years, to take the place of these that would perhaps last ten years.

They have built new wharves which were intended for the business of the country and they have made an end of large annual expenditures in many places by filling up embankments,

where temporary trestles formerly existed.

More than that, they have obtained from the Dominion Government a payment of \$375,000 on account of the Eastern Extension Claim, a claim which Mr. Hazen and his followers have always denounced as absurd and which they said never would be obtained by the government.

More than that they have obtained an additional annual subsidy for the Province of New Brunswick of \$130,000 a year, a sum sufficient to pay the interest on the entire provincial debt assuming that interest to be based on the ordinary price of bonds. These are some of the achievements of the government, achievements which the Telegraph says are likely to destroy the province by its reckless extravagance.

Mr. Hazen always ridiculed the idea of any additional sum being obtained on account of our Eastern Extension claim and he most violently opposed the arrangement by which New Brunswick is to receive an additional sum of \$130,000 a year.
