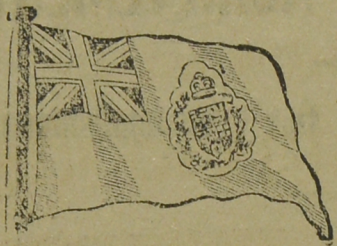

THE OUTLOOK

The prospects for an overwhelming government victory throughout New Brunswick at the polls on March 3rd, are growing brighter every day.

Mr. Hazen's campaign begun over a year ago, and continued with a great flourish of trumpets and accompaniment of idle boasting, has suddenly petered out, and the government's stock is rapidly rising in every constituency in the province.

The cry that the Tory leader was enlisting able men under his banner in every constituency, while the government were unable to secure suitable candidates is dissipated by the stern facts.

In every constituency in the province the government party has nominated a splendid class of representative men—candidates who are recognized as leaders in their respective counties, while in two constituencies at least, Mr. Hazen has been unable to muster tickets, and in several counties his nominees are merely put up to prevent the government candidates being elected by acclamation.

Nobody pretends to believe for instance that Messrs. Curless and Manzer are nominated in Victoria with any expectation of success, or that Mr. Hazen has any hope of making even a decent fight in Gloucester, or Restigouche, or Kent, or Albert, or St. John county.

In York not more than one of the opposition ticket is taken seriously, and all will be beaten. In Queen's Mr. Farris and his colleague are counting on a record majority; in Westmorland the size of the government majority will scarcely be less than 1,000, and so on throughout the various constituencies.

There is no county in which Mr. Hazen can count success as a certainty; there are more than half a dozen constituencies in which the government candidates are already as good as elected. And the government's chances of success will improve every day until March 3rd.

The opposition campaign has practically collapsed for lack of honest basis.

The slanders circulated by the leader and his friends have been met and flattened out; the hollowness of Mr. Hazen's pretences, the deceitfulness and dishonesty of his canvasses, have been shown up, and the thinking people of New Brunswick have settled down to the conviction that the government will be sustained by practically as large a majority as they had in the last legislature.

AN UNPATRIOTIC COURSE

One of the greatest causes for resentment which the people of New Brunswick have against Mr. Hazen and his party is their opposition to the government pressing for and securing the claim for a larger subsidy from the federal treasury.

In the legislature and throughout the country, the opposition leader and those associated with him had nothing but sneers for the government's successful effort to add \$130,000 a year to the provincial revenue, but the matter was pressed home with such force and persistence by the local government, that it was ultimately successful, and already the educational and other services of the country are receiving the benefit of the enlarged revenue, which enabled the government to increase the provincial grant to the school teachers, to make provision for aged teachers by means of a pension system, to devote an additional \$5,000 a year for the development of the University and to materially aid other departments requiring increased grants.

The additional subsidy of \$130,000 a year is nearly sufficient to pay the interest on the public debt yet if Mr.

Hazen's sneers at the government's efforts to secure that handsome amount, had balked the enterprise, the province would have been poorer to the extent of that amount.

Mr. Hazen has been a destructive and not a constructive politician, and he cannot point to one good service he has rendered the province during the five years he sat in parliament, and the nine years he has occupied a seat in the legislature.

MR. HAZEN'S ALARM

Mr. Hazen, who has been talking so confidently of carrying the province, and has been forming his new ministry in his mind, is forced to abandon outside engagements and is making a stumping tour of Sunbury, to stave off threatened defeat.

The nomination of Dr. Peake and Mr. Thurott, both strong and popular men, the abandonment of Messrs. Hazen and Glasier by former supporters, and the general outlook for defeat of the opposition ticket, have convinced Mr. Hazen that his seat is absolutely in danger, and he has hastened to Sunbury, to repair, if possible, his failing fortunes. Mr. Hazen is anything but invincible in Sunbury and he can be defeated by steady, persistent work by the government's friends. They have excellent candidates, the work of organization is proceeding rapidly, and the prospects of government victory in that constituency were never brighter.

CURRENT COMMENT

Hon. E. H. Allen will speak at the government committee rooms in this city at 7.30 this evening.

The government quartette in York can put it all over the opposition candidates in speaking ability.

The electors of York smile a smile of incredulity and amazement when they hear of Mr. Pinder wanting "honest government."

The government ticket in York is receiving great encouragement in their canvass of the constituency, and things never looked better for a rousing government victory.

Mr. R. W. McLellan, in his public addresses shows a knowledge of political issues, most creditable to his intelligence and satisfactory to his party friends.

Those who are foolish enough to declare that Premier Robinson is an inexperienced politician are pointed to the fact that he has been a member of the legislature two years longer than Mr. Hazen.

King's county Tories refuse to be bound by any agreement that will ensure a pure election in that constituency. They started in by demanding of Dr. Pearson, who wanted to be a candidate, the sum of \$1,000 for the election campaign.

Mr. Hazen has shown such consideration for the farmers of this province that wherever possible he has kept farmers off his tickets. Even in the distinctly rural constituencies of Queen's and Sunbury none of his candidates are farmers.

Mr. Hazen condemns the \$8,000 a mile bond guarantee to the International railway, yet he and his entire party in the legislature voted to guarantee the bonds of the St. John Valley railway to the extent of \$15,000 a mile. That's consistency, isn't it?

The Messrs. Smith of Blissville, Sunbury Co., who strongly supported Mr. Hazen in the last election, are against him this time. They are influential men, giving employment to a number of people, and their support of the government ticket is alarming Messrs. Hazen and Glasier.

Liberals of New Brunswick admire the good, clean Liberal record of Hon. C. W. Robinson, the respected Premier of this Province, they appreciate the splendid service he has rendered his party for many years, and they are not going to vote him out and put Mr. Hazen in his place, to form a Tory government in Fredericton, that Sir Wilfrid Laurier may be driven from power at Ottawa.

Mr. E. M. Macdonald, M.P. for Pictou, the genial "Ned" who made many friends here while campaigning for Mr. Gibson, is put forward as likely to be Nova Scotia's next cabinet minister. Mr. Macdonald in parliament last week made a slashing reply to one of Mr. Foster's cynical utterances, and was warmly congratulated for the effective manner in which he did up the ex-finance minister and land speculator.

THE MARATHONS DEFEATED

Capitals Won Easily in Fast Game at the Arctic Rink

The St. John Marathons were defeated by the Capitals in the Provincial league match at the Arctic rink last evening by a score of 6 to 2. There were a few penalties imposed by the referee, but the game was not a rough one in comparison with the exhibition put on the boards by the Capital and Victorias a short time ago. The Capitals played without Capt. MacDonald, Williams or Oren, otherwise the result of the game would not likely have been so favorable to the visitors. The Marathons had almost a brand new team on the ice, and they dealt out a pretty stiff brand of hockey. They skated well, handled their sticks skillfully, and kept the Capitals moving moving pretty lively all the way through. Simpson, a recent importation from Amherst, was probably the star player for the Marathons. He kept himself well into the game, and although he managed to avoid the rough spots he succeeded in scoring both goals for his team.

Archie Babbitt played cover point for the Capitals, and certainly acquitted himself with credit. Musick as usual played a star game, his work being frequently applauded by spectators. Morrison at goal, also put up a splendid game. Stuart did most of the scoring for the Capitals, and had several good opportunities to add to the list, but did not appear to take full advantage of them.

The Capitals scored four in the first half, and three in the last half, but the Marathons protested the final goal on the ground that it had been made after the time of the game had expired. The matter was investigated and it was found that the timers had allowed the play to continue half a minute or so overtime, and the goal was made just at the close. At any rate they gave the visitors the benefit of any doubt which may have existed over the matter, and called the score 6 to 2.

A crowd of some eight hundred spectators witnessed the game, and all appeared to be well satisfied with it.

Sandy Staples of this city officiated as referee, and while some of his decisions were not well received by a portion of the audience, he was certainly actuated by a desire to be fair to both teams. At any rate nobody can accuse him of showing partiality to Fredericton.
