NEW ONTARIO TRAGEDY

Seven Members of One Family Including the Mother Perished in Flames

NEW LISMEARD, Ont., Feb. 11.—Seven persons were burned to death by fire which destroyed the dwelling of Lawrence Haacke, on north side of Wab's River yesterday morning. The victims were his wife and six children. The children's ages range from an infant up to a girl of eleven years.

The house is a small building, twelve by fifteen with one room down stairs used as a sitting room, and one upstairs as a bedroom. Behind this is a kitchen. Haacke got up at 9.30 and kindled a fire in the front room and then went outside to get some kindling for the kitchen stove. The rest of the family were in bed. While lighting the kitchen stove he heard his wife scream and rushing in, discovered that the front part of the house and stairway were on fire. He immediately ran out and summoned his brother-in-law, Mr. Fretl, who lived next door and they got a ladder and put it up to the only window upstairs. When they broke the window a flame shot out and they were badly burned themselves especially Haacke, who was at the top of the ladder. By this time the screams of the mother and children had been silenced.

An alarm wassent in, but when the firemen arrived the building, which was of frame and tar papered inside, was burned to the ground. The body of the baby girl, two years old, was first recovered and laid on a blanket near by. The body was very slightly scorched, due to the fact that it was wrapped in blankets when the fire was raging. The body of the next youngest boy, five years old, was charred almost beyond recognition. The mother and newly born babe were next recovered. The mother's limbs were burned off. Then came the bodies of two little girls, aged eight and ten years. The last one recovered was that of the eldest girl, eleven years old. The seven bodies were all recovered an hour after the first alarm of fire had sounded. The family are well known in Toronto, where Mrs. Haacke's parents live, and where they all lived for a time after her marriage.

RELEASED FROM JAIL

Judge Hanington grants Order In Cases of four Moncton Liquor Dealers

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 11.—The Moncton liquor dealers confined in Dorchester jail under sentences of 30 days for violation of the Scott Act, have scored again.

Before Judge Hanington here yesterday afternoon argument was heard in support of orders for habeas corpus and the convictions were quashed in four cases.

The cases were ex parte Patrick Gallagher, O. S. Legere, Azed Landry and Daniel Madden. In the case of Gallagher, Judge Hanington held the accused was entitled to be discharged from imprisonment on the ground that the order of the supreme court refusing to quash the conviction hadn't been taken out and served on the magistrate who made the conviction.

WOMAN'S SUICIDE WAS DELIBERATE.

Paid Her Bill. Made All Arrangements for Burial. Then Poisoned Herself.

New York, February 8.—"I should like you to feel that it is the surrender of a proud, strong soul." In these words, penned to a friend yesterday, Mrs. Cleo A. Walton, of San Francisco, explained a suicide planned with gruesome deliberation. Having paid her bill at the Hotel Lagrange, selected a casket, arranged for the cremation of her body and summoned the police, coroner and undertaker, the woman swallowed poison, and was dead when those called to her apartments arrived.

Mrs. Walton was the widow of a Mr. Walton, whom she married in Denver. She was 43 years of age, and possessed of womanly beauty. Thrown upon her own resources by the death of her husband, she set up a dressmaking establishment in San Francisco, and prospered, until the earthquake, which, she had said, impoverished her.

A letter to her physician read: "I am more than sorry that our acquaintance has been so slight that you will look upon this last act of mine as a brainstorm. I should like you to feel that it is the surrender of a proud, strong soul to the inevitable. I have the opportunity of going into business here, and I am sure have the attributes within myself that makes success. I have always succeeded in whatever I have undertaken, and I am not afraid to compete even in New York. It is my unalterable conviction of the absolute utility of all things that makes the effort useless, even though I attain the success for which I should start. I could not bring a single hope into my life or joy to my heart so wherefore the struggle. All whom I have ever loved have passed on before.

"I have made arrangements for the disposition of my remigins. Will you please see that my wishes are carried out, and after everything is over write to my sister and tell her about it? I am sorry to have to trouble you, indeed, pitiful that one cannot even die without being a nuisance."

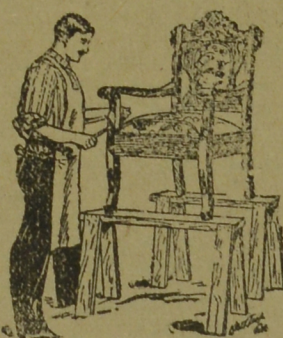
