THE TORY REVOLT.

There is no let up in the Chatham World's campaign against the further association of Premier Hazen and Mr. Morrissey. Nor is there any anticipation of Mr. Pinder laying aside the little axe he has sharpened for active use in the same direction. Mr. Hazen, so far has tried to win out of sight the rebellion in the ranks of his supporters, but instead of diminishing it is gaining volume and force.

Mr. Pinder, so his intimate friends say, is ready to wreck the government unless Mr. Morrissey is deposed, and room made in the cabinet for the York M. P. P., and Commodore Stewart, in his Chatham World grows quite hysterical dealing with what he seems to think is an unholy combination.

These gentlemen naturally cannot understand how Mr. Hazen can keep the Chief Commissioner in the cabinet after the latter had assisted in electing an opposition member to the legislature, and a great many other people, including some of the government's friends in the legislature sympathize fully with the attitude of Mr. Pinder and the Commodore.

Mr. Hazen may treat with scorn and derision the revolt which, for the present has as its chief mouthpieces the gentleman from Nackawick and the Chatham journalist, but he will find that it has taken deeper root in his party than he imagines.

Mr. Hazen must realize that even within his cabinet circle the revolt has supporters, and the time is not far distant when he will be compelled to recognize the trouble in his ranks, and suppress it if he hopes to retain his full support in the legislature.

If he succeeds in choking off the trouble till the legislature meets, it is bound to assume an acute phase then, for Mr. Pinder, who is a political engineer of no mean capacity, and is aroused to action by the personal insult to his standing in the party, through his throw down when the cabinet was formed, is a gentleman that never forgets and never wears in anything he undertakes.

As a sample of Commodore Stewart's attitude towards the Premier, the Chief Commissioner and their present relations, the Chatham World, in its last issue says:

"It is no disgrace to be beaten in fair fight, and one who is beaten by treachery gets a certain amount of sympathy if he shows a manly resentment, but there is nothing but contempt for the victim of treason who lacks enough decision of character to punish the traitor. Plouted, spurned, betrayed, made an object of derision for the Dominion, and still with his arms around the neck of the offender, pooh!"

THE NEW SPEAKER.

Hon. Mr. Marcil, who is to be speaker of the House of Commons, is a French Canadian, who first came into prominence as a journalist in Montreal, and since entering the political field he has greatly enhanced his reputation as a very clever man. During the last parliament he served most acceptably as deputy speaker of the Commons, and in the recent federal campaign his services were in great demand as a stump. He visited several constituencies in New Brunswick, and rendered great assistance to the Liberal cause.

Mr. Marcil is a native of St. Scholastique, Quebec, is 48 years old, and entered the newspaper field when he was twenty years old. He ran twice unsuccessfully for the Quebec assembly, first in Gaspe in 1897, where he lost by only eleven votes, and again in the Magdalen Islands, the same year, losing by only forty-two votes. Mr. Marcil was first returned to the House of Commons in Bonaventure in 1900 and was re-elected in 1904 and 1908. He is easily one of the leading orators of parliament, and his natural promotion from the speakership will be to the cabinet, where his friends anticipate seeing him before many years if the Liberal party remains in power.

CURRENT COMMENT.

The snow plow contractors should have been to work on the sidewalks Saturday evening. People going to church on Sunday had only a trail to walk in.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has lost his fine motor car, destroyed in an Ottawa fire. It was a present from his distinguished friend, Lord Strathcona. The Premier will have to finish his outings on foot or on the street cars or in a cab.

Now it is said that Mr. Hazen's "Uncle Harry" will finish his work at Minto, seeing that coal royalties are collected. In the face of his pro-

fessions of economy, Mr. Hazen keeps on creating new offices for his friends—and incidentally his relatives.

The electors of Westmorland vote on the Scott Act next Friday, Dec. 18, whether they will retain the Act or resort to the license law. The Scott Act advocates have a large number of stumblers in the field, and are putting up a very vigorous campaign.

Mr. W. B. Snowball seems to have made one member of the Hazen government take back water in the stampage business. Mr. Maxwell's deliverance was made on the stump in the Carleton bye-election, and he takes refuge behind that old time excuse that he was misreported.

Mr. Vroom, Dominion fruit inspector, says he can think of no reason why the St. John river valley could not grow as fine fruit as the Annapolis valley. He had been at Fredericton several times at the Fruit Growers' Association exhibit, and he was much impressed by the superior quality of the apples shown.

Governor Fraser of Nova Scotia, is to attend the commercial travellers' annual dinner at the Royal hotel, St. John, Thursday evening, and there is pretty sure to be some fun. The inimitable Ralph March, president of the association, will be in the chair, and Mr. A. E. Massie of this city, will hold down one of the vice chairs. It is said that Governor Tweedie and Governor McKinnon of P. E. I., will also be present.

The pilgrimages of Messrs. Pinder and Young, M. P. P.'s to Chatham and St. John were not the only ones these gentlemen have recently made, to forward the conspiracy against Mr. Hazen. They journeyed out to Harvey one morning, where they found Mr. Thomas Robison, M. P. P., in full sympathy with their effort to force Mr. Morrissey out of the government, and failing that, to attack the Premier himself.

Mr. J. Piermont Morgan made a record trip on a special train, which he hired to take him from Chicago to New York, to fill an important business engagement. The distance was covered in seventeen hours and one minute, or an hour better than the fastest train time on the New York Central. The special made fifty-eight to sixty miles an hour for the entire distance, with six stops to change locomotives between Chicago and New York. It is estimated that the trip cost the financier \$100 an hour.

An ardent friend of the Hazen government in his fervor for the race horse importation, declared that after the farmers had bred from these animals, their steeds would be so swift in coming to market there would be no further need for the development of flying machines. This is rather a sanguine view, but it indicates to what extent the government's friends have been deceived by the race horse policy, which seems to have been originated behind the back of the medical commissioner for agriculture.

Hoopstick by Fiddlesticks, one of Mr. Hazen's spindle legged Kentucky race horses was purchased for the sum of \$90, his board in Kentucky is costing some \$15 a month, so that by the spring he will have eaten grub to the value of his own precious carcass, and it will cost the government probably \$30 more to get him here. That will bring the total cost of Hoopstick by Fiddlesticks up to \$210, and all his brothers and sisters will incur a similar expense, which the people of New Brunswick will have to pay, simply because somebody persuaded Mr. Hazen that he should import race horses, although he had no legislative authority to make any such purchase.

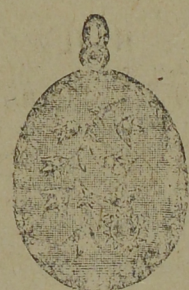
