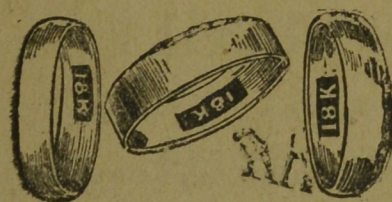

ILL FATED TRAIN.

Maritime Express Met With Two Accidents in her Run from Montreal.

Locomotive, Pullman and Driver in a Ditch in Restigouche--Only One Person Injured.

MONCTON, May 14.—(Special) — For the second time since leaving Montreal yesterday, the Maritime Express was derailed this morning, second accident taking place near Millstream, when the whole train was derailed, three cars and the locomotive being laid on their side in a ditch, and the fireman badly hurt. The first accident took place at Bagot, when at a switch, the locomotive of the train was derailed and several hours delay occasioned. Five miles west of Millstream, N. B., shortly after eight o'clock this morning, as the train was running along about 30 miles an hour, the locomotive left the rails and was followed by the entire train. The Pullman cars, Bellechasse and Gloucester, the dining car Yamaski and the locomotive turned over into the ditch and lay on their sides. The other cars left the rails but remained standing. Despite the fact that there were a number of passengers in the derailed cars, none were hurt, the only injured being Fireman Coulombe. Canine was the conductor. The passengers and mails are being transferred.

FOUR MEN DROWNED.

Sad Fatalities at Shives Mill, Campbellton.

CAMPBELLTON, N. B., May 14.—A sad drowning accident occurred here yesterday afternoon about three o'clock, when four men were drowned. Five men, in the employ of the Shives Lumber Company, were engaged in repairing the chain in the mill slip, in a boat about 120 yards from the shore. While attempting to drop anchor, it slipped and knocked a board out of the side of the boat, which immediately filled and sank. Only one of the party, Henry Sav-

CANADIAN BRIEFS.

A Gas Leakage--Prisoner Acquitted--Attempted Murder and Suicide--Contracts Awarded.

TORONTO, May 14.—(Special) — At a government test yesterday, Robert King & Co's gas meter registered double the quantity of gas actually consumed, and the company has been charged for twice as much gas as it should have been, dating from January 20th, 1906 up to the present time. The meter had been passed by the regular government inspector.

Douglas B. Finlay was acquitted on the charge of stealing \$1,300 from his employers.

Contracts amounting to nearly \$80,000 have been let by the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway commission.

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 14.—A Filipino named Matsema, a late arrival from Cuba, brutally slashed Salo Rivier, the wife of a Portuguese friend, yesterday morning, and attempted to commit suicide by cutting his throat. Both are in the hospital.

WINNIPEG, May 14.—Real estate assessment for the year totals a hundred millions, an increase of nearly seven millions over last year.

EDMONTON, Alta., May 14.—A contract for 700 miles of long distance telephone material has been awarded by the public works department to the Northern Electric Company of Montreal and Winnipeg.

THE ISLAND MURDER.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., May 14.—(Special) — The murder at Misericorde, is still the talk of the province.

Although Docherty declares that he can give no reason for his deed the general opinion is that jealousy was at the bottom of it.

While Stella MacDonald and McMillan were walking along the railway track on Sunday night, on their way to Misericorde they saw a man coming toward them, his head bent down.

"Look there is Alonzo," said Stella. "Do you think he will shoot me," said McMillan. "I will stand in my boots as long as he will shoot," the girl replied. are beyond question.

This conversation may indicate that Docherty had previously threatened McMillan. The boys of the village would tease the latter about the girl, and he would be jealous of any one paying attention to her.

Stella, since the shooting, has been in a half hysterical condition, and is constantly weeping, maintaining she was not to blame. "What could I do alone with him there after he had shot Joe. I was afraid he would shoot me if I started to run away." When Docherty returned to Stella's house after the tragedy, he threatened to kill himself. "But the girl coaxed the revolver from him. It was she and her aunt induced him to go to the priest's house before day-break, and tell him the story. The purity and probity of the girl

THE PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

Minister's Travelling Expenses, Coach Hire and Typewriting Matters Discussed.

The meeting of the Public Accounts Committee this morning was devoid of any startling incidents or acrimonious discussion. Mr. Pinder was in good humor and got in some criticism here and there over items in the travelling expenses of ministers.

Mr. Smith, the chief examiner, seemed to be in good fighting trim, but was less outspoken in laying down a policy for the government. Probably a lengthy conversation which he had with Mr. Fleming just prior to the meeting may have had some influence on his course of action. The absentees were Messrs. Prescott and Woods.

Criticism this morning was levelled principally at the travelling expenses of ministers, charges for typewriting and extras drawn by officials.

Chairman Pinder took exception to several small items for law books in the Attorney General's department. He was inclined to think that the books were bought for the Attorney General's private use.

Mr. Smith thought it might be necessary to purchase the books, but they should remain the property of the province.

The Attorney General's coaching bill, amounting to \$117, was criticized by Mr. Smith, who thought it rather stiff, considering that it only covered a period of four months.

The contingencies account for the Attorney General's office showed a reduction in comparison with the previous year and Mr. Smith took occasion to congratulate the Auditor General on the saving made.

In discussing the contingencies for the Agricultural Office, Mr. Pinder suggested that Mr. Peters be again called, but Mr. Smith thought it was unnecessary.

OFFICIALS' EXTRAS.

Mr. Smith found fault with a payment of \$7.20 to Mr. R. W. L. Tibbitts for a certified copy of an Act granting aid to certain railways.

Chairman Pinder said that it seemed to him that officials received extra pay for everything they did except drawing their salaries. He would like to know what the salaries were for.

An account of Lottie Kain for typewriting for five months for Premier Tweedie, came in for some criticism from Chairman Pinder.

Chairman Pinder did not know why Mr. R. W. L. Tibbitts should receive \$150 for comparing the laws.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois said that it was not part of Mr. Tibbitts' regular duties to compare the laws.

Chairman Pinder wanted to know if he did the work after hours.

Mr. Smith was under the impression that it was the duty of the clerk of the executive council to compare the laws.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois thought it would be well to make enquiries in regard to the matter.

On the item of \$231.86 to the Newcastle Field Battery, Hon. Mr. LaBillois remarked that he thought some economy might be practised.

Mr. Smith said it seemed to him like a useless expenditure.

Auditor General Loudoun said that the expenses were now kept in the city, and the expense of firing the salute this year had been greatly reduced.

COST OF TYPEWRITING

Mr. Smith thought that a great deal of money might be saved the province on the item of typewriting. It seemed to him that there were a sufficient number of stenographers in the employ of the government to do all the work. He noticed that it cost \$140 to report the evidence in the Restigouche election case.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois thought that the whole expense incurred in the Restigouche election case was a waste of money.

Mr. Smith said that he noticed that Miss Gertrude McDonald was paid \$130 for reporting the evidence. He wanted to know if she was not a regular government stenographer in receipt of a salary.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois said that was true, but it was not part of her duties to report the proceedings of an investigation.

Mr. Smith figured up that the expense of the Provincial Secretaries and Receiver General's department was \$300 less than last year.

The Auditor General stated that there was one official less on the staff.

Chairman Pinder said that he thought that the staff of the board of works office was too large. He remembered when three men ran the whole department.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois said that all the members of the staff were over worked at the present time.

Chairman Pinder wondered what the Solicitor General was paid his salary for.

Mr. Smith—For attending to the business of the crown.

Mr. Pinder—He charged extra for that.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois said he thought the Solicitor General should be paid a larger salary.

Chairman Pinder and Mr. Smith concurred in this.

THE OTTAWA CONFERENCE

Mr. Pinder did not know why Premier Tweedie should be paid \$50 per day for attending the Interprovincial Conference at Ottawa.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois said that the conference was a very important one, and resulted in the province getting an increased subsidy.

Mr. Pinder—Were we not entitled to it?

Hon. Mr. LaBillois—Yes, but we had to fight for it. He went on to say that Messrs. Pugsley and Tweedie for several months gave their whole time to the affairs of the province.

Mr. Smith criticized Hon. James Barnes bill of \$300 for travelling expenses while a member of the government.

The Auditor General pointed out that he received the usual allowance which a minister without office was entitled to.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois said that Hon. Mr. Maxwell was now being paid at the same rate.

Chairman Pinder observed in the elections account an item for 125,000 envelopes purchased early last year. It seemed to him that they had been purchased in ample time for the elections.

In discussing Factory Inspector McMullin's account, Mr. Smith thought it was very reasonable considering that he travelled all over the province.

The items in connection with the Forestry Convention, amounting to \$1,181.05, were examined and passed. Hon. L. J. Tweedie and Hon. F. J. Sweeney were paid \$250 each for expenses of a trip to Washington in connection with this matter.

Chairman Pinder observed that the Surveyor General had followed the method adopted by Hon. Mr. Tweedie in making up his travelling expense account.

LADY DALY DEAD.

Sister of Royal Bank President and Wife of former Nova Scotia Governor.

HALIFAX, May 14 (Special) — The death occurred this morning of Lady Johanna Daly, wife of Sir Malachy Daly, formerly Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, after an illness extending over a year. She was a native of this city, daughter of the late Sir Edward Kenny. One of her sisters, Madame Kenny is in the Convent of the Sacred Heart, Montreal. Rev. George Kenny, Montreal and T. E. Kenny ex-M.P. of this city, president of the Royal Bank are brothers.
