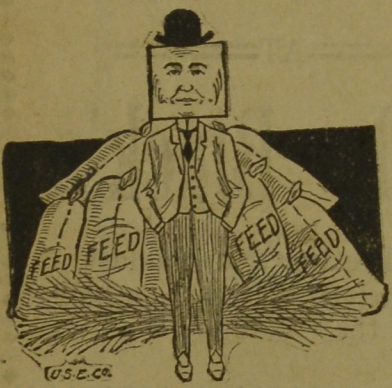

## TEN THOUSAND MEN

### Under His Employ Building the G. T. P.

MONTREAL, March 19.—There is a gentleman at the Windsor who commands at the present time no less than ten thousand men, who are working not in the cause of war, but for the extension of Canada's railway system.

All have heard a great deal of the famous McArthur section of the Grand Trunk Pacific and of the alleged delays which have taken place on that part of the Transcontinental between the city of Winnipeg, and Lake Superior Junction, a distance of 250 miles. Mr. J. D. McArthur, the contractor in question, is in the city, and his description of what he calls the most important and most difficult piece of railway building ever undertaken in the Dominion is of interest.

At first the labor situation was the most difficult obstacle they had to surmount, and Mr. McArthur declared yesterday, that he had thrown away a good part of his profits in securing men to carry on this contract, the importance of which he fully understands, as it is the G. T. P.'s connecting link between the Great Lakes and the granary of the west.

All winter long he has had seven thousand men at work, and he says that 60 per cent of the whole has been completed, and that the grading will be about finished by the end of the present year. A good part is rock cutting although fifty miles of prairie work east of Winnipeg has already been accomplished, and some sixty miles of rails have been laid down.

The greater number of this laborious army are Scandinavians while there are also a great many Italians and quite a number of Galicians, all of whom Mr. McArthur says, are good railway workers. The Galicians do not like the rock work as well as the prairie sections, but they get along very well. The contractor stated that his men had not lost a single day all winter, and in fact he had never in all his long experience in railway work seen such a favorable season for outdoor work. At first this contract was held to cost about \$13,000,000 but when they got to work there were so many changes made in the location that the con-

tract, when completed, will represent an outlay of not much less than \$16,000,000. Mr. McArthur says, however, that there will be no rebuilding of the Grand Trunk Pacific as it is now being constructed for years to come. There are he adds, a good many heavy bridges on the contract, and all of these are being spread to make the road a superior one in every particular.

In fact, Mr. McArthur states that the constructions of such great works as the Grand Trunk Pacific, the Canadian Pacific and the Canadian Northern, and the great expenditure which is being made on all of these roads, will prove the saving while the country to the south of us is suffering all sorts of commercial and financial panics. Every cent's worth of supplies are purchased in Canada, and all is going into the pockets of the Canadian people. It is a wonderful sight, he adds, to see the immense supplies that are already along the route, enough for the entire summer's operation. It is quite likely, Mr. McArthur stated, that a contract will be given out on a section to the eastward of Lake Superior Junction by the time the grading is done on his section, so that a part of his army of workers can be transferred to the next section. Besides the seven thousand men employed on the Lake Superior section, Mr. McArthur has two thousand additional on the Canadian Pacific contract, which he will complete early next fall, thus giving the G. T. P. an independent direct line from Portage la Paroisse to the banks of the Saskatchewan.

Mr. McArthur is perhaps the most extensive employer of labor west of Lake Superior, and like a great many more such men, he commenced in a very small way. Besides building the 250 miles of road between the Junction and Winnipeg, he has built about five hundred miles for the Canadian Pacific, and also completed a very long stretch of the Canadian Northern Railway into Edmonton for Mackenzie and Mann. It is understood that he has also tendered for quite a stretch of the Transcontinental which will be put under contract within the next two weeks.

### COUPLE TWICE WED.

### Baronet's Daughter Marries Divorced Husband.

London Daily Mail: The story of a lady who remarried the husband she had divorced was told on Saturday at Bexhill police court, where Robert Joseph Horton, a local gentleman, was charged with publishing a defamatory libel likely to cause a breach of the peace concerning Florence Eva Trevanion, of 77, Campden Hill-court, Kensington.

The alleged libel was contained in a letter sent by Mr. Horton to Mrs. Trevanion on February 18.

Mrs. Trevanion's counsel, Mr. Gibbs Kimber, stated that she was the daughter of Sir Daniel Cooper, the first baronet, and sister of the present baronet, and her husband was a cousin of the Earl of Strathcona. She was married to Mr. Hugh Arundell Trevanion in 1882, and there were three sons. The marriage was very unhappy, and was dissolved in 1887, on the ground of the husband's cruelty and misconduct.

Mr. Trevanion married a second wife, who died in 1900, and then Mrs. Trevanion, desiring that her sons should take their proper position in society, remarried. Mr. Trevanion three months after the second wife's death.

This remarriage had turned out as disastrously as the first, and since 1905 husband and wife had lived apart, and proceedings were now pending in the divorce division.

Mr. Trevanion, continued counsel, came to Bexhill and lived with another lady, who passed as his wife. An announcement appeared in a local paper that they had attended a bazaar, whereupon Mrs. Trevanion inserted a notice that she was not living with her husband at Bexhill.

Mr. Horton, continued counsel, then wrote to Mrs. Trevanion stating that he had introduced Mr. Trevanion and his supposed wife to his family, and asked if her notice was true. She replied that she was Mr. Trevanion's wife, and referred him to "Debbert's Peerage" and to her solicitors.

Mr. Horton replied that the information given was not what he required, adding:

Should I have no reply, I must believe you and your husband are divorced, as he represents.

The magistrates committed Mr. Horton to the Sussex Assizes, allowing bail.

### PARLIAMENT'S BUSINESS

### Bye Elections, Bill and Cigarette Question Briefly Discussed.

OTTAWA, March 19.—The bill amending the House of Commons Act was moved for a second reading by R. L. Borden. He said it provided that in case of a vacancy in the membership a writ must issue within thirty days. A constituency should not be disfranchised for a longer time than this. Ontario has a similar act.

Sir Wilfred Laurier held there was no need for the proposed legislation judging by the history of elections since Confederation. The practice was to fill all vacancies before a session of parliament began. In some cases Dr. Borden's law would work very badly. For instance a harsh and fast law would make it necessary to hold bye-elections right on the eve of a general election, and that when parliament was not sitting, so the constituency could not suffer through delay. Sir Wilfred suggested that the bill should not be proceeded with further until the Minister of Justice had a chance to get it and Mr. Borden agreed to this.

The amendment to the Fisheries Act proposed by Mr. Sinclair of Guelph was taken up in committee. The measure takes from fishery

officers the magisterial powers they now have so they may not sit in judgment on cases where they have been acting as police to catch trespassers of the law. Progress was reported on this bill.

Mr. Black of Hants continued the act on the cigarette begun by Mr. Blaine on Monday. He was against the cigarette, but could not see how it could be made illegal and the pipe and cigar allowed to flourish. However he was so strongly against the combination of the small boy and the cigarette that he would go a long way toward legislative constitution to abolish it.

Mr. Loggie of Northumberland answered on the question of cigarettes and claimed the men of Canada should have enough regard for the welfare of the boys of Canada to allow the cigarette to be abolished.

The debate was closed for the day on the arrival of six o'clock.
