WANDERERS WON EXHIBITION.

Defeated Shamrock Team by 13 to 7 in New York.

NEW YORK, March 17.—One of the most brilliant exhibitions of hockey ever seen in New York was played at the St. Nicholas rink to night between teams representing the Wanderers and Shamrocks of Montreal.

The game resulted in a win for the Wanderers by a score of 13 goals to 7. The first half saw the score at 4 to 4 for Wanderers.

The largest crowd of spectators that has ever seen a hockey game in New York witnessed the struggle between the two sides in what was nominally an exhibition match, but which bore all the marks of championship encounter.

The feature of the match was the fine exhibition of goal keeping put up by the Shamrocks' goal keeper, Billy Nicholson. Riley Hern, the Wanderers' custodian, also made a good showing, but in one mix-up near his own net, was knocked out and had to be carried to the dressing room to be revived.

Shamrocks were the first to score. The forwards had worked the rubber into the Wanderers' end of the sheet and Morrison wound up with a shot that scored. Ten minutes afterwards Small, the Wanderers' cover point, after taking the puck nearly the whole length of the rink, wound up with a shot that put the score even. Russell and Stuart each scored in close succession for Wanderers, and then Campbell scored for Shamrocks.

Scoring at this stage of the game became rapid and the teams crossed over with the figures standing at 4 to 4.

In the second half play became faster than in the first period and became rough also. Hern was laid out in a scrimmage and then Mallen opened the scoring of the second half by skating almost down the whole rink and beating the Wanderers' custodian. Stuart tried to trip the player and was sent off. This was the first penalty of the match.

Mallen scored another goal soon after the first one that he had obtained and Morrison followed with another a few minutes later.

This score brought the Shamrocks within two goals of the Wanderers' score, but before the end of time Russell had scored two and Small one.

Leach, of Pittsburg, the fleet outfielder of Pittsburg's ball club, who has been leading the hold-out brigade in the matter of salaries, this evening attached his signature to Pittsburg contract, and will leave for the South tomorrow evening with the Pittsburg team. This would seem to leave Gibson, the London, Ont., man, who was with Leach on the idea that greater salaries should be paid, out in the cold, as Gibson has not been heard from, nor has he intimated that he will be in line anyway. Swacena, another of the hold-out brigade, is still in St. Louis, and Leach was the first to break over, as it is now conceded that Wagner, the king of infielders, does not want more money from the Pittsburg club, but is sincere in his determination to leave baseball alone for a whole year, and spend his time raising chickens, auto riding, and attending his bank director meetings. Leach saw Wagner on his arrival in Pittsburg today, and was advised to sign.

"Mr. Gibson will come right out of those Canada woods and sign his contract before tomorrow night or we are through with him. He is not a fast enough player for us to lose sleep over," said President Barney Dreyfuss, of the Pittsburg team, last night.

PRACTICAL DRESSING SACK.

If a woman would enjoy the luxury of wearing a negligee, she would best pay close attention to her throat, which, if not already round and white and pretty, should be made so with all possible dispatch, for the negligee of the hour has no collar whatsoever and, moreover, is often pointed at the front and quite as often at the back.

Very smart little tea jackets are made up from a few yards of all over cluny or valenciennes lace mounted over rose or emerald, azure or shade. Even more effective are some of the chiffons over figured or brocaded silks, their ribbon garnishings being of the pompadour design on a ground matching the chiffon. On some of the lace jackets one finds used to trim the neck and front is so arranged and cut that it falls over the shoulders and forms a portion of the sleeve drapery, while other draped sleeves are allowed to part over the top of the arm to reveal a silk and lace under-sleeve.



However, the plain colors of pale shades of pink, blue and lavender must not be forgotten, as they admit of pretty trimming in the way of lace and insertion. The dressing sack illustrated may be made with a standing or rolling collar. The pattern is cut in seven sizes—from 32 to 42 inches bust measure.
