How Mr. Devlin Dropped on the Bullying Tactics of Mr. Bourassa.

ST. CESAIRE, Que., October 12.—There were Hameric scenes in this county on Saturday when Hon. Chas. Devlin, completely unexpected, turned up in support of the Gouin candidate for the provincial vacancy, Mr. Robert, and encountered Mr. Bourassa speaking in support of his candidate, Mr. Ares.

The Nationalist orators were Messrs Bourassa, Laflamme and Garceau. Mr. Robert had Hon. Messrs. Devlin and Allard, and Mr. Pelletier of Montreal. Mr. Bourassa denounced the Gouin Government in unmeasured terms as robbers and corruptionists.

At one point of his discourse Mr. Bourassa was using a favorite mannerism of his, much noticed in his contests with Mr. Turgeon, of shaking his fist under the nose of one of his adversaries, accompanying some particularly vigorous denunciation. Mr. Robert was the object of the demonstration with the fist, being seated close at hand.

Mr. Devlin sprang to his feet. "Put down your fist," he cried in commanding tones. "You have no right to threaten a respectable man in that manner. Put it down or I will put it down for you!"

Mr. Bourassa ceased to brandish his arm so close to Mr. Robert, and turned no more in that gentleman's direction during the meeting.

Mr. Devlin denounced Mr. Bourassa bitterly for making these and similar accusations without bringing forward the proofs. He undoubtedly captured the meeting, which cheered him to the echo.

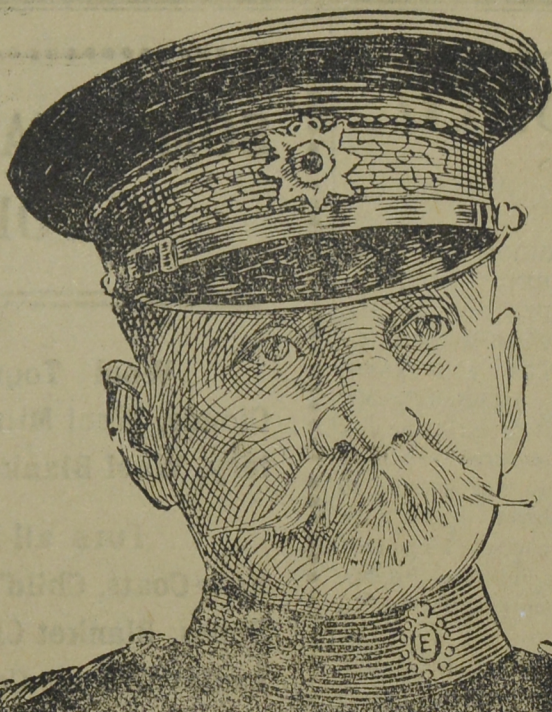

A large number of the citizens of all classes, grave and gay, mounted on fast horses, rode out some miles on the line to meet the incoming wonder."

Wants Grain-Fed Cattle.

Important proposals in relation to stock-breeding are being urged upon Alberta stock-raisers by Mr. W. F. Stevens, the newly-appointed live stock commissioner. He recommends that cattle should be marketed all the year round, and points out that this could be accomplished by grain-feeding. Meantime, indications are favorable for better prices for beef cattle, a shortage being reported from all over the world. Western Ontario, which in the past has been the principal producer of high class export cattle in Canada, is now turning its attention to the dairy business, and exporters complain that more and more of the dairy class of beef is being marketed, and this is detrimental to the industry in that province. Alberta will doubtless take all means in her power to share in the advantages to be derived from this situation.

Montreal's Arabic Newspaper.

Montreal has the only Arabic newspaper in Canada, The Ash-Shahab, of The Star. The proprietor is M. N. Zarbatany, who is also the editor; he hails from Damascus.

The paper has a very fair circulation in the city, as there are no less than 3,000 Syrians and kindred tribesmen speaking Arabic in Montreal alone. It is published twice a week. Besides its local circulation, the paper has a large circulation in Canada generally, and in the United States. Also large numbers are shipped to Syria and the neighboring provinces for distribution.

Lady Violet Can Milk.

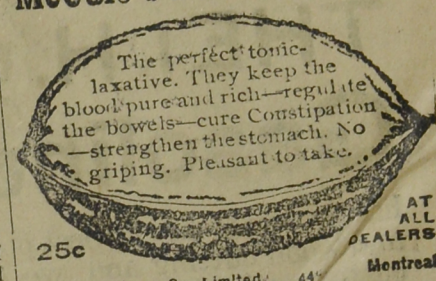
