CANADA BANQUET.

Canadians of London Honored Earl of Crewe Who Spoke on the Dominion.

LONDON, June 5.—The Canada Club last night banqueted the Earl of Crewe, Lord Strathcona presiding. Lord Strathcona eloquently proposed "The Dominion of Canada and the Governor-General," and expressed assurance to Earl Crewe, who, as being keenly imperial, would, equally with his predecessors, do his utmost to unite the different parts of the Empire.

Having paid a tribute to Earl Grey, who had been given invaluable support by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, he referred, amid applause, to the Quebec Tercentenary, and also emphasized the spaciousness of Western Canada, where there was room for millions from the United Kingdom.

The Earl of Crewe, in responding, expressed regret that his duties prevented him from going to Quebec. During the last 300 years Canada had

undergone all the experience which went to make up the life of a great nation, and now stood in the forefront of the civilization of the world. There only remained for Canada to develop literature and art worthy of her activities. He assured Lord Strathcona his services to the Empire would never be forgotten. He also mentioned the mission of Mr. Mackenzie King, who had made many friends here.

Hon. Charles Russell, in proposing the "Health of the President," humorously pointed out that Canada had not yet won the Derby. If Lord Strathcona put himself in the hands of the Earl of Crewe, who would probably find him a "likely one"—(laughter)—they might again see the heading in the papers with a new significance "Strathcona's Horse to the Front." (Applause).

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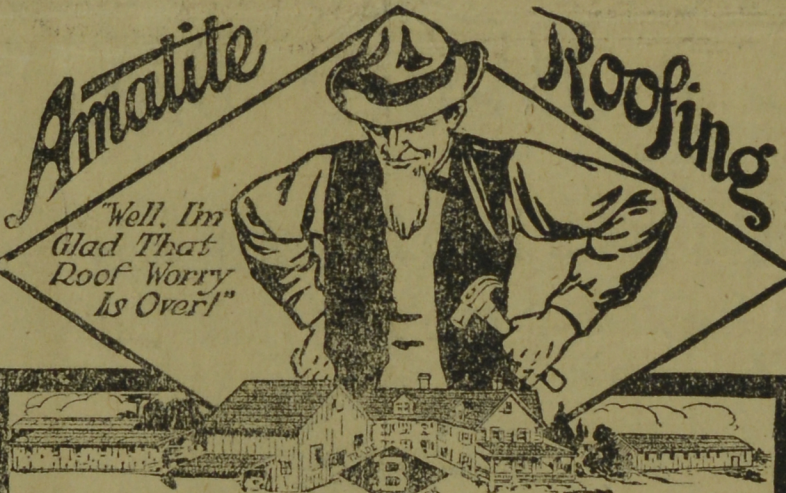
