

OLD TIMES RECALLED

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago

(FARMER FILES, APRIL 20, 1882.)
Rev. Messrs. Wadman and Crawley exchanged pulpits last Sunday morning.

Rev. A. J. Mowatt is to officiate at Richmond, Carleton county, next Sabbath.

Conductor D. McQueen of the New Brunswick railway has resigned and gone west.

The Metropolitan has gone to Montreal to attend a meeting of the Anglican Synod.

Mr. John H. Reid has gone to Louisville, Kentucky, to purchase a stallion for breeding purposes.

Mr. A. F. Randolph returned Friday evening from his trip to England.

Conductor McPeake of the Grand Southern railway, is spending this week with his friends in this city.

Crossing the river is becoming precarious and the water is rising fast. Navigation will likely be open in a week.

Messrs. J. A. Vanwart, and James Dever returned Friday from Winnipeg, where they had been sojourning for two months.

The Fredericton Brass Band has been engaged to furnish music for the Rowing Club's bonnet hop on the 24th of May.

Col. W. S. Morris of Chatham, was in the city this week. He leaves Chatham almost immediately to reside permanently in Winnipeg.

Wm. Price of Woodstock, has been awarded the contract for moving St. Paul's church. The work is to be completed before the middle of May.

Captain Duncan and Engineer Johnson have gone to Swan Creek to get the steamer Florenceville ready to commence work as soon as the river is navigable.

Commencing tomorrow the western train will leave this city at 9 a.m. instead of 9.15 a.m., as formerly. The trains for St. John will leave as usual at 7 a.m. and 2.15 p.m.

Messrs. Taylor and Thompson of Sheffield, have been awarded the contract for erecting the proposed new bridge across the Hammond river in King's county. The price is \$2,750.

Edwin Street of Burton, Sunbury Co., was very seriously injured one day last week while unloading logs, one of which fell on him, injuring him severely in the back and internally.

Mr. Edward Jack, C.E., delivered an entertaining lecture in the class room of St. Paul's church, Tuesday evening, subject: "The Conquest of Constantinople by the Crusaders."

The generous subscription of \$4,000 has been added to the list for rebuilding the Baptist church by Mr. A. F. Randolph, who was absent from home when the old church was destroyed.

Prof. Max Sterne and his lady have taken up their residence at the pleasant village of Marysville. The choir of the Methodist church there, which embraces excellent ability, will be a feature of the services under the professor's control.

A double tenement belonging to the estate of the late James Mara, King street, was slightly injured by fire at noon on Tuesday. The steamer "Alexandra," and the hook and ladder company responded very quickly to the alarm. The loss is covered by insurance in the Commercial Union, Mr. J. L. Inches agent.

William Craig's house on the cross road, leading from College road to New Maryland highway, was entirely destroyed by fire Saturday evening. The fire caught from the chimney, and nearly all the furniture was burned. There was an insurance of \$600 on the building with Mr. John Black. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. Craig in his misfortune.

His Honor Lieut. Governor Wilnot and his private secretary, H. Wilnot, left for Ottawa Monday afternoon. The secretary expects to return about the 1st of May, but His

Honor will be absent some time longer.

"Hands all Round." Mr. Tennyson's new national hymn, has been set to music. His Honor the Lieut. Governor received a copy from the author, through the secretary of the Royal Colonial Institute, and forwarded it to Mr. J. H. Williamson, leader of the Fredericton Brass Band, who is arranging it for the band, by whom it will be played on Her Majesty's birthday.

Messrs. Thos. H. Colter and Moses L. Palmer, lumber operators, have dissolved partnership, as will be seen by reference to our advertising columns. Mr. Palmer retires from the firm, and Mr. Colter assumes all liabilities and will discharge all debts. They have had much success during the past season and have got out 2,000,000 feet on the Aroostook for Messrs Hayford & Stetson.

At a special meeting of the city council last night, Alds. Macpherson, Burchill and Wilson were appointed to compose the water commission, who shall have charge of the introduction of the water and sewerage system under the vote of the citizens and act of the legislature. The commission will immediately secure the services of a competent engineer to make a survey and recommend the most feasible system after which the the commission will proceed with all possible despatch.

The examinations for admission of attorneys commenced on Tuesday morning and were concluded on Friday evening. The examiners were the Attorney General, Hon. D. L. Hanington, O. Gregory, Hazen, Barry, Mullin, Carleton, Teed and Chapman will not be sworn in until Trinity term, as their time of study has not yet expired. The others were sworn in on Monday and Tuesday.

Col. Marsh, our affable police magistrate expects to move into his new quarters in the Officers' barracks next week. The "long room" has been fitted up for court purposes, and will furnish ample space, and is light, airy and conveniently situated. What formerly was Collector Street's private office will be His Honor's sanctum, and the room to the rear may be used for private consulting, etc. The furniture of the court room is in keeping with the genial surroundings, and all the arrangements are such as will meet the requirement of the court, and its officers. We may congratulate the city council on the change, and especially Col. Marsh, who will find his military as well as his legal enthusiasm quickened and inspired by the memories of the locality must awaken. CAMPBELLTON CIVIC ELECTIONS.
Campbellton, April 21st.—Nominations for mayor and councillors took place here on Tuesday, 14th inst. when Dr. Murray was re-elected mayor by acclamation, as were also councillors W. H. Miller and John M. McLean. At large, A. McG. McDonald and Daniel Richards for ward one, and J. F. Andrew and Maxwell M. Mowatt for ward two. Three candidates were nominated for ward three, and the election which was held today resulted in the return of H. M. McLennan and Malcolm P. Moores as councillors for that ward.

Councillors Miller, McLean, Andrew, Mowatt, and McLennan were members of last year's council. The other three members of last year's council did not offer for re-election. Considerable interest was manifested by the citizens generally in the selection of mayor and council-

lors this year, and the result of the election is regarded as a strong endorsement of the progressive policy of last year's council, as well as the personnel of its members.

LOG CAR RAN AWAY.
Killed Nine Men on Susequahanna Railroad.

ELMIRA, N. Y., April 24.—A special to The Star-Gazette from Ralston, Pa., says: A work train on the Susequahanna & New York railroad, near Laquin, Pa., was wrecked yesterday morning by a runaway car which dashed into the train after descending a steep grade. Eight lumbermen were killed outright, or died later while being taken to a hospital, and fifteen were seriously injured. The wreck occurred on the Laquin Lumber company's log road, leading up into the mountains, about twenty-six miles from Ralston. The men were riding on the log train, which was being pushed up the steep ascent by the engine. A log car ran away and came down the grade at terrific speed toward the train. An attempt was made to reverse the engine on the log train to avoid the shock of the collision, but the runaway car crashed into the cars before anything could be done. The engineer and fireman and those in the train who were near the engine escaped injury.

GRASPING THE LEVER.
Engineer Rigger Killed on C. N. R. Near Roblin.

ROBLIN, Man., April 24.—A Canadian Northern locomotive drawing a freight train on the Edmonton main line jumped the track in a cutting about four miles east of Roblin yesterday morning and rolled over, crushing Engineer Edward Rigger to death. The fireman jumped and escaped without injury. The engineer met death at his post. When removing his body it was found that his hand was still tightly grasping the throttle. Ten cars loaded with wheat following the locomotive were derailed, and considerable wheat was spilled on the track. Mr. Rigger was a single man and lived in Dauphin. He was formerly a resident of Winnipeg.

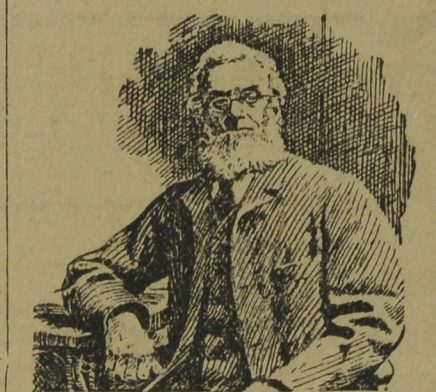
