

OLD TIMES RECALLED

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton
Twenty-six Years Ago

(FARMER FILES, AUG. 23, 1882.) The various departments of Mount Allison College and Academies, Sackville, will resume work on Friday. Mr. Arthur Edgecombe and Miss Maggie Howie, of this city, are pupils in the latter.

On Monday evening the Cricketers and Curlers at Mr. Hazen's office, presented Mr. M. J. McLaughlan with a flattering address, read by Mr. T. C. MONEY AND BOOZE.

Were Agents Used In Carrying Colchester
Last November for the Tories

Letting Light in on Methods of Stanfield's Friends.

Following is some of the evidence in the trial at Truro, N. S., of one Bayne, charged with irregularities on behalf of John Stanfield, the Tory M. P. elected last November in the Colchester federal bye election.

ROBIE FAULKNER'S STORY

Robie Faulkner sworn, said: I saw Bayne on nomination day and got \$30 in cash and got a case of flasks from him. I got the money in the Stanley Hotel and the liquor from him back of the hotel. He wanted me to work for Mr. Stanfield. He said I would "be with him" in the election.

Mr. Power—"What were you to do with the money and liquor?"

Objectioned by Mr. Ritchie and amended to "what did he say?"

Ans.—"He said to use the liquor for the election and to put the money down into my trouser pocket. I did not use the money for election purposes. He did not use the word 'vote' in my case, but well I suppose that is what he meant."

Long objection and interruption by Mr. Ritchie.

SENATOR'S SON THERE

Bayne gave me the whiskey from a grip just around the corner of the Stanley Hotel, Senator McKay's son, (W. P. McKay) was with Mr. Bayne just before I got the liquor. I got more liquor from him at Five Islands the night before election—6 or 8 flasks and a long bottle. The long bottle was for his own personal benefit. The rest was to be handed out. I saw Bayne fill up a grip of whiskey for Sutherland in the hotel.

FILLED TWO GRIPS

Sutherland is a brother of mine. Mr. Bayne asked one of us if we had a grip with us, I said no, my brother had one. He told me to go out and get one. I did so and he filled them both. We got two cases of whiskey between the two of us. He wanted to know if I could handle any whiskey for Mr. Stanfield down there. I said "yes" and he gave it to me. I voted at that election.

To Mr. Power—When I met Bayne and I lead him to believe I was going to vote for Stanfield, he knew I had not been a supporter of Stanfield's party hitherto.

GRIPFUL OF BOOZE

Sutherland Faulkner of Five Islands swore, I met Mr. Bayne and W. P.

McKay on nomination day and got a gripful of booze.

Money was not mentioned between us, I got the liquor the same place Robie got his. I got whiskey twice, Nomination day, I got 24 bottles, I got about half a dozen bottles from Bayne at Five Islands the day before election. It got away from me. Some of it was stolen from me. I told my brother to get me some money, but he did not. I am a voter. Sandy McDonald was in the room with Bayne and Geo. E. McLellan at the hotel when I got there. Bayne said there was some booze there and if we wanted some to take it I took a parcel of it off the floor.

HE GOT MONEY TOO.

Bayne Morrison sworn, He saw Mr. Bayne nomination day and had some conversation about the coming election—what the chances were for Stanfield. I think he said there was some money for that district—Polling district No. 19, Five Islands. I got some money from Mr. Bayne in the Stanley. There was a roll of dollars, probably twenty. He told me to make the best use of it I could in Stanfield's interests.

TREATED THE BOYS

I treated the boys every time they came along. I got a letter from Mr. Hal, secretary and agent of the Conservative party here, to Mr. Bayne. I burnt that letter. It told me to call on Mr. Bayne. I called on Mr. Bayne because it was reported he was "The Man Behind the Run" for that district. I got some liquor from Mr. Bayne at Five Islands the day of the election or the day before. There were a number of asks—not very many.

I got \$25.00 from Mr. Bayne at Five Islands election day. He said I was to use it in. I got it in Corbett's Hotel. He told me before I left Truro there was to be some more money coming. He said I would get it on election day, and I got it between 12 and 1 o'clock.

He called me into a room and handed it to me done up in a parcel, with an elastic band around it. He apparently had faith that I could pull them in or he would not have given me the "dough."

STEEL SHIP LAUNCHED.

Splendid Schooner Leaves Ways at New Glasgow—All Home Made.

The whole population of the Maritime Provinces have been aroused with a new interest by the launching a short time ago of the first steel sailing vessel built in the provinces down by the sea. They see in the occasion a revival of the shipbuilding industry of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The launching was witnessed by a large crowd, who assembled on the bridge on the adjacent streets, on the river bank, and in the historic yard from which scores of vessels have been launched in the brave days of old, when the wooden ships of Pictou County were seen on every sea. Among those present were Lieutenant-Governor Fraser, Premier Murray and many leading men from various parts of the county.

The new schooner is a handsome vessel, and J. C. Macgregor, who has been the moving spirit in her construction, was congratulated on all sides upon the splendid showing that had been made by New Glasgow workmen. It was also a matter for congratulation that the vessel was "home-made" in practically every part. The large quantity of steel used in the building was almost altogether the produce of the Nova Scotia Steel Co. They supplied everything that was within their capacity. All the rivets, some 40,000, came from the Starr Manufacturing Co., Dartmouth. The canvas came from Yarmouth; the rope from the Rope Works in Dartmouth; the blocks, from Parrsboro. The spars are of Oregon pine from Oregon. All the rest of the wood, except a little teak, which is required in all steel ships, is the product of Pictou County.

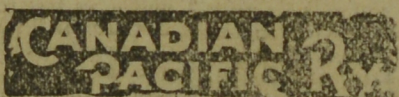
The schooner was built by the L. Matheson Co., iron founders, for J. W. Carmichael & Co., Mr. James C. Macgregor is practically the head of both of those concerns, as well as a director of the Nova Scotia Steel Co. The schooner is intended for the coast lumber trade between Canadian ports and the United States in summer, and in winter time she will carry pine from the gulf ports to the West Indies.

Or Coupon, if surrendered to Canadian Northern Railway Station Ticket Agent at Winnipeg will be honored for Free Ticket to Canadian Northern Railway Stations to and including Kamauk or Swan River. West of those points Tickets will be issued FREE to Kamauk or Swan River and at rate of One Cent a Mile beyond.

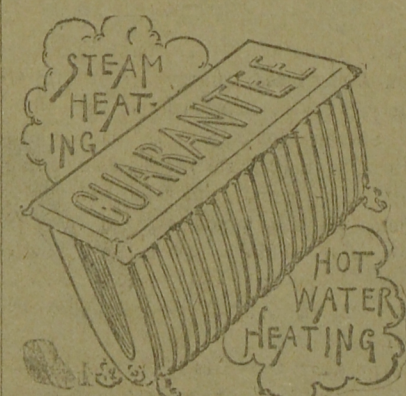
