AROUND THE MARKET.

The appearance of the market this morning with its numerous wagons laden with the products of the farm, is an indication that the autumn season is at hand. Green vegetable and apples are very plentiful and were in fair demand. The forestallers were on hand in force, but owing to the vigilance of Chief Winter and Sergt. Phillips they had little chance to operate. Potatoes sold at \$1.60 per barrel and turnips at 60 cents. Butter brought 25 and eggs 24 cents. Apples from 50 to 75 cents a bushel. Cucumbers two cents a dozen, corn 12 cents, green beets and beans 25 cents per peck, lamb \$1 and 75 cents per quarter. Blueberries 80 cents per pail.

A GOOD SHOWING

Discount was Allowed on \$48,000 of City Taxes

City Treasurer Golding today announced that up to Thursday night, when the discount period on city taxes expired, the sum of \$48,000 had been collected in on the year's assessment. Last year the sum of \$47,900 was paid in on an assessment of \$69,000, while this year the assessment is \$73,000, so that in reality the showing is not quite so good as made last year. While the majority of those who failed to come to the search are small ratepayers, a few big fellows have crept into the list. The latter could easily scare up the money but are holding back as a sort of protest at what they consider an unfair assessment. A gentleman who holds a judicial position paid his taxes in time for the discount, but handed the city treasurer a protest in writing against his assessment. The amount collected by the city treasurer on Thursday was \$17,943.72 add on the previous day he handled about \$13,000. The city account at the Bank of New Brunswick is reported to be in a more healthy condition at the present time than it has been at any time during the past two years.

RIVER RISING.

There is still about five million feet of lumber at different points along the river below Grand Falls, and at the Douglas boom there is about two million feet yet to be rafted. Mr. Scott will likely leave for Perth on Monday to look into the situation.
