ROBINSON'S LAST DAY

Government Will Resign this Evening and tomorrow Governor will Invite Hazen to Form New Administration.

Speculation as to Personnel of New Cabinet does not Include any York Member.

ST. JOHN, March 19.—(Special) — eral. Premier Robinson and Surveyor General Sweeney arrived at noon from Fredericton. Hon. E. H. Allen went through to Moncton. It is believed that Mr. Robinson will this evening place the resignation of himself and colleagues in the hands of Governor Tweedie, and that Mr. J. D. Hazen will be called upon tomorrow morning to form a new government. It is thought here that the personnel of the new government will not be announced before Monday. Speculation of course is busy with the names of the probable cabinet members, but there is considerable uncertainty as to Mr. Hazen's choice. One slate given out this morning was as follows: Hazen—Premier and attorney gen-

eral. Fleming—Provincial Secretary. Morrissey—Surveyor General. Maxwell—Chief Commissioner of Public Works. Dr. Burrique—Commissioner of Agriculture. Grimmer—Solicitor General. Woods and Prescott without portfolio. Clarke—Speaker. This is probably as near correct as any of the guesses yet published, but it does not take into account McLeod, who was here yesterday urging his claims for a portfolio, and failing that, the speakership. However, it is not thought here that the York M. P. P. will land either of these plums, but will have to rest content with private membership, and perhaps the deputy speakership for the present term.

WHEN STANLEY BUMPED INTO SELOUS.

A Canadian Editor Recalls a Hot Time at the Colonial Institute.

William Blakemore of Victoria, B. C., editor of the Westward Ho! a new and very interesting Canadian magazine—with the only fault that it is sent through the mails rolled in a flat envelope is a British fish journalist not long resident on the coast, but already enjoying a good footing there. In his magazine Mr. Blakemore is running some articles on "Men I Have Met," and as he has met many famous men the articles are peculiarly interesting. In the current issue Mr. Blakemore gives his impression of Henry M. Stanley. "It is not a little singular," he says, "that I should first have met a man who has earned a reputation for heartlessness amounting to brutality when he was paying a visit to the humble cottage near Rithin, North Wales, where his aged mother lived. She had not seen him for nearly thirty years when he has left the roost to seek his fortune in the wide, wide world. How many things had happened since then? For him years of poverty, struggle, obscurity with a sudden meteoric emergence, and a world-wide reputation; for her half a lifetime of patient waiting. "I was spending my summer holiday at Llandudno, and had ridden out to Ruthin where I met Mr. Stanley at luncheon at the Rectory. First impressions are always the most lasting, and I see him now as I saw him then, a man slightly under medium height, well built, indeed remarkably like a smaller edition of President Roosevelt, he had around face, close cropped dark hair turning to gray, a small iron-gray moustache, and rather a beady eye. His manner was stiff, and suggested aloofness and in difference. Without being a good talker he was interesting because he had seen so much, and during lunch he spoke quite freely of his experiences. He was greatly impressed with the possibilities of South Africa, and had evidently been in close touch with most of those marvelous natural resources which have since attracted world-wide attention. "Safely locked in a vault at Halifax, N. S.," Mr. Blakemore reminds us, "is the diary of Lieutenant Stanley, who accompanied Stanley on a trip about which there has been so much discussion. No one has ever seen the contents of this diary, which is sealed. Lieutenant Stanley, when depositing it with the members of his family, stipulated that it should not be opened during Stanley's lifetime. But although a considerable time has elapsed since his death, nothing has been heard of it, and I think it may safely be concluded that the story of the bloody deeds which characterized the expedition will never be known in its entirety. "An account is also given of an encounter between Stanley and F. C. Selous at the Colonial Institute in the early nineties—an incident not heretofore published. Selous had given an account of his travels with Livingstone and of his experience shooting great game. The chairman asked Stanley to move the vote of thanks, which he did numbly, thereupon proceeding to say that hunters like Selous were destroying the finest game in the world and decimating the ranks of the noblest animals in creation. He deplored such laughter, and suggested that instead of applauding any man for killing lions, tigers and rhinoceroses, there should be a fine of twenty-five pounds a head for animals so slain. Rising under the influence of tremendous excitement, with his fingers twitching Selous literally scuffed Stanley," says Mr. Blakemore. "He declared that he had never killed big game or anything else for the mere luxury of killing that he had made it his first business to kill for food for himself and the natives, that wherever he had gone, even to the unexplored recesses of the Dark Continent either alone or in company with Livingstone he could go there and he received with kindness and hospitality. He did not have to plough his way across the continent with Gatling guns because he could not shoot with a rifle and walked up to where Stanley sat and addressing himself directly to him, in low impressive tone he said: "I have never shed one drop of human blood in all my travels, can Mr. Stanley say the same?" "This incident is an epitome of Stanley's character and Stanley's African history. Nothing can ever gloss over the fact that he marched to his triumphs through seas of blood, and that where the sainted Livingstone went single handed and secured the confidence and affection of untold thousands of the husky natives, Stanley had to fight his way in and out, and trench himself behind artillery."

THEY'RE AFTER STEWART

MONTREAL, March 19.—In his capacity as trustee for the united banks, which took over the affairs of the Sovereign, W. E. Stavert, has today entered an action here against D. M. Stewart for \$110,000, for losses incurred in certain transactions while Mr. Stewart was manager. Mr. Stavert is suing on behalf of the Bank of Montreal, Canadian Bank of Commerce, Bank of Toronto, Dominion Bank, Bank of British North America, Standard Bank of Hamilton, and the Eastern Townships bank.

AFTER FIFTY YEARS.

SAMPLE TORY TACTICS.

Borden Organ Misrepresented Item of Public Expenditure to the extent of \$300,000.

OTTAWA, March 19.—Considerable amusement was aroused here today by a flaring three column heading in the St. John Telegraph, as follows: "Intercolonial expert paid an enormous sum." "Nearly \$350,000 cost of reorganizing bookkeeping system of railway." This caption was over an Ottawa despatch reporting Hon. Mr. Graham as saying, in answer to a question by Mr. Foster, that the cost of re-modelling the accounting system on the Intercolonial amounted to \$343,084. The statement made by Mr. Graham was that the work which has done at schedule prices, had cost a total of \$43,084, just three hundred thousand dollars less than the amount stated in the Telegraph's despatch. The work for which this money was paid extended over a period of a year and a half and engaged the attention of thirty expert accountants in connection with the Intercolonial and seven in connection with the P. E. Island Railway. In addition to reorganizing the whole system of bookkeeping on an up-to-date business basis complete examination was made into an operating expenses, including the reports of the railway on car service and general operating included. Deputy Minister Butler declares that the saving accomplished by the reform already exceeds the cost entailed, forty-three thousand, not nearly \$350,000.

THE STOCK MARKET.

Bull Movement Interrupted by Wall Street Weakness.

MONTREAL, March 19.—(Special) —The bull movement has been interrupted by a weakness in Wall Street, but declines have not been important. Nova Scotia Steel is only notably weak at 53 1/2.
