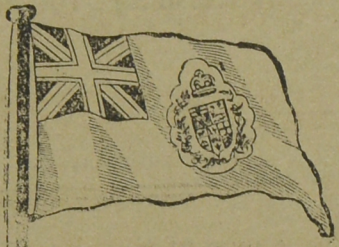

A CHANGE OF TUNE

Mr. Hazen has been making a political speech up in Restigouche, and it is noticeable that he made no condemnation of the International railway, in the construction of which that constituency is so deeply interested.

Mr. Hazen's changed attitude, however will not deceive Restigouche electors, who are quite familiar with the Tory leader's bitter opposition to the road, and his continued attacks on the government for assisting the enterprise.

Mr. Hazen is looking for support for his candidates in Restigouche now, but he should have thought of that when he was assailing the International railway in the legislature and in other parts of the province.

He has added the bond guarantee for the railway to the provincial debt, although the province will never be called upon to pay a single dollar in that behalf, and he attacks the government for its efforts to build the road. Yet he has the hardihood to ask the electors of Restigouche to send two men to the House to assist him in turning the government out.

Mr. Hazen's appeals will be made in vain, and his candidates in Restigouche, Stewart and Culligan will be lucky if they save their deposits.

That constituency has faithfully stood by Hon. C. H. LaBilloy in every election since 1882, and he has proved a true and zealous friend in its behalf. No man in public life in New Brunswick stands higher in the public esteem than the Chief Commissioner of Public Works, and with his colleague, Mr. Currie, a man of high character and good business record, Mr. LaBilloy will win a sweeping victory on March 3rd.

NORTHUMBERLAND

Three of the present government candidates in Northumberland were supporters of the opposition in the last election, and Mr. Loggie, M. P., who headed the opposition ticket in that constituency five years ago, is supporting the government in this election.

Another notable fact. A few evenings ago Mr. T. W. Flett of Nelson, whom the opposition wanted on their ticket until he refused to grant their financial demands, spoke at a government meeting, in support of the government candidates.

Hon. J. P. Burchill, who was beset by the opposition to take a place on their ticket, and who has been represented as indifferent to the government, will stump for the government candidates.

These are a few incidents pointing to the defeat to which Mr. Hazen's friends are going in Northumberland, and there is a corresponding slump from the Tory party in almost every constituency in the province.

The fine old county of Northumberland on March 3rd promises to return a full government ticket.

THE JURY FEES

Coun. Goodspeed, during the recent session of the York Municipal council, was not so much concerned about how much money a contest for the legislature would likely cost him, as he was to find out about the alleged discrepancy in the jury fees' account. He moved for an investigation, and secured a committee, the majority of whom are Tories, but the thing was shunted over till next July, some gentlemen interested desiring that the enquiry should not be held before the provincial elections.

Coun. Goodspeed, however, purposes to follow the matter up, and his attitude thereon, is the primary cause for the insinuation that he has sub-

scribed a sum of money to corrupt the electors of York.

It is a mean, underhand, despicable spirit of revenge, and of course is without substantial basis.

Fancy any party with the malodorous Pinder as one of its candidates, suggesting dishonorable tactics in a gentleman of Coun. Goodspeed's clean character and reputation.

AN EXCELLENT APPOINTMENT

The selection of Hon. D. J. Purdy of St. John for a seat in the local government without portfolio will commend itself to the people of New Brunswick and will be especially pleasing to the Liberal party in which the honorable gentleman has been a consistent and sturdy worker all his life.

By his own efforts Mr. Purdy became one of the leading business men of St. John, he was honored by frequent election to the city council and for two terms has been one of the city's effective representatives in the legislature.

He is a man of strong common sense, of excellent reputation, of great business shrewdness and capacity and these qualities, with a wide political experience will prove of great benefit to the province in the new position to which he has been called.

A COWARDLY CHARGE

Mr. Hazen and his friends are charging the misappropriation of public monies against the government, but in their places in the legislature they did not have the courage to take that course or demand an investigation. It is only in their slanderous press, and in the back settlements that they dare intimate that the public funds have been dishonestly handled.

It is a cowardly sort of campaign, but will fail in its object.

Every dollar of the provincial revenue has been honestly expended and accounted for, and Mr. Hazen knows it, yet his emissaries, like Mr. Pinder, and his organizer, Hubbard, will continue to insinuate dishonesty and graft without the smallest particle of evidence to sustain the charges.

CURRENT COMMENT

The young men of York will rally to the support of Allen, Burden, McLellan and Goodspeed.

The opposition election campaign in this city is reaching alarming proportions. When a government is assailed by such talent as Alms House Keeper Thomas, Capt. J. D. Perkins and W. H. Jonah. Something awful is going to happen.

There will be something doing in St. John political circles Friday evening, when Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Hon. H. A. McKeown and the city candidates are to address a public meeting in the opera house. The little fellows who have been slandering the minister of public works in his absence will probably receive some well deserved attention from that gentleman.
