TOOK POISON ON FLOOR OF EXCHANGE.

New York Man Killed Himself in Wall Street Where He Dropped His Fortune.

New York, February 11.—Declaring that he had lost a fortune in Wall street through duplicity, E. C. Brooks, who came from the West a wealthy man a few years ago, killed himself in an annex of the Produce Exchange by drinking poison. He was found unconscious on the floor by a clerk of the exchange, and died before a physician arrived. A bottle which contained the poison with which Brooks ended his life, was found lying by his side. In his pockets the police found several notes, among them one in which he named several men whom he charged with being responsible for the conditions which caused him to end his life.

Another note read "In case of my death my name is Edward C. Brooks, 134 West 126th Street. Communicate with my brother Clifford Brooks, 18 Week road, Hempstead, England.

Entries in a diary showed that Brooks had sustained severe losses, one recorded loss aggregating \$20,000 in a single day in Wall Street.

Within the past two days Brooks had made application at the Exchange for employment, even asking to be put to work as a porter or a laborer. He was about fifty years old.

50,000 IN WANT IN PHILADELPHIA.

Terrible Suffering in the Kensington Mill District — Measures for Relief.

Philadelphia, February 11.—An appeal for aid for destitute people in the Kensington mill district of Philadelphia, one of the greatest industrial centres in the world, was made at the meeting yesterday at the Central Labor Union.

The union listened to the plea of a delegation of textile workers who claimed that from 35,000 to 50,000 men, women and children in the Kensington District are in need of relief. One delegate said:

"I suggest that there be a demonstration to show the thoughtless citizens of Philadelphia where they would best use their spare funds. The other day one body raised \$4,000 to send to Africa for heathens. Another sent shiploads of flour to the starving people of Russia. Cannot this city also prevent starvation in its own limits?"

A committee was appointed to investigate the matter.

WHO WAS PHARAOH?

Jewels Found at Thebes May Decide the Question.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—There is great interest here in the announcement made yesterday of the finding of jewels of the wife of Seti II, Dr. Wallis Budge of the British Museum and other Egyptologists in London have received news confirming the report of the find. The discovery, said an expert, is a further triumph for Theo-

dore M. Davis, who is backing the excavations in the Valley of the Kings. The importance of the find lies in the fact that though the actual mummy of the Queen has not been found, the bracelets, the huge gold earrings and elaborately worked rings with other accessories will tell the story of her life. They may disprove the claims that Rameses II. was the Pharaoh of the Exodus and enthrone Seti II, and his Queen as the rulers with whom Moses talked.
