A NEEDED BRIDGE

Mr. Norrad Presents a Claim Worth Consideration

Bloomfield Ridge, Feb. 4th. To the Editor of the Herald: Sir: A bridge is much needed across the Miramichi river at a point about eight miles above Norrad Bridge, (known as the Palmer place), on the road leading to Salmon Brook, Rocky Brook, the Sisters Brook, Clearwater Brook and the Dungarven river. On these streams are lands owned by different parties, The Miramichi Lumber Co., The Railway Co., and the Government Lands, and it is very difficult getting across the river in the Fall and Spring, and especially when the ice starts. The site for a bridge at this place is favorable, the river being about 275 or 300 feet wide and all kinds of lumber being handy and it is to be hoped the Government will consider this matter as it is the wishes of the people in general.
