

WARD-REID WEDDING

King and Queen Present at Swell London Affair

LONDON, June 23.—With King Edward and Queen Alexandra smiling approval from their private gallery, Jean Reid, daughter of Whitelaw Reid, the United States Ambassador to Great Britain, was married this afternoon in the chapel royal of St. James Palace to the Hon. John Hubert Ward, brother of the Earl of Dudley, and equerry-in-writing to the King. The ancient chapel, one of the few remains of the old palace of the Tudors, in which Queen Victoria and several of her daughters were married, was prettily decorated with flowers for this the most fashionable of recent weddings in London.

A great crowd assembled in St. James Square to watch the arrival of the bridal party and the King and Queen, and other members of the Royal family, who, by their attendance at the chapel and the subsequent reception at Dorchester House, the residence of Ambassador Reid, paid a compliment to the American Ambassador and his daughter, seldom accorded even to the members of the English nobility. The invitations, which were limited to less than one hundred, on account of the smallness of the church, set the time of arrival at 2.15 p.m., and by that hour all the guests had found their seats.

A few minutes before three o'clock King Edward and Queen Alexandra, accompanied by their suites, drove up from Buckingham Palace, and proceeded at once to the royal gallery, where the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and Princess Patricia already had arrived.

The Rev. Edgar Sheppard, canon of St. George's Chapel, Windsor, where the King and Queen attend services, when in residence at Windsor Castle, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. Wm. Grosvenor, rector of the church of the Incarnation, New York, a church of which Mr. and Mrs. Reid have been members for many years, and the Rev. Hiers Claughton, rector of Rutton-Brentwood, cousin of the groom.

The bride's dress was of soft white satin, trimmed with old rose point lace, given her by her grandmother. The fronts of the skirt and waist lace, which was caught up with tiny white rosebuds and orange blossoms.

were practically covered with this. The court train was of the same material as the dress and, like it, trimmed with rose point lace. The veil too had a lace centre and edging, and was held by a wreath of orange blossoms. The bride wore but three pieces of jewelry, and these all were old fashioned brooches, the wedding presents of King Edward, Queen Alexandra and Mr. Ward.

Miss Jennie Crocker, of San Francisco, a cousin of the bride, attended her, and was the only bridesmaid. There were also in attendance five little children, two boys and three girls, all in quaint costumes of blue and white.

Major George L. Holford, equerry-in-writing to the King, supported Mr. Ward.

SOMETHING ABOUT THE BRIDE.

Miss Jean Whitelaw Reid, is the only daughter of the Hon. Whitelaw Reid, American Ambassador to England since 1905, and editor-proprietor of the New York Tribune. Her mother is a daughter of Mr. D. O. Mills, of New York. Mr. Whitelaw Reid, who is one of the most popular Ambassadors ever sent from Washington to London, has been United States Minister to France, and was Special Ambassador to this country for the Coronation of King Edward in 1902.

Although Miss Whitelaw Reid will not become a peeress, like so many other of her compatriots—such as the Duchess of Roxburghe, Lady Curzon, Lady Essex, Lady Newborough, and Lady Suffolk—she is nevertheless marrying a very able and charming man, who is, moreover, a capital sportsman. Mr. John Ward is the only remaining bachelor brother of Lord Dudley, and not long ago he celebrated his thirty-eighth birthday. It will be remembered that he was the very energetic Press Censor on Lord Roberts's staff in South Africa, discharging his invidious and difficult duties with a very minimum of friction and trouble. He has been an Equerry-in-Order to the King for the last six years, and he is, it may be noticed, generally in attendance on His Majesty at the principal race-meetings, for Mr. Ward takes a great interest in the sport of kings.

AGRICULTURAL COM.

Initial Meetings Were Held at Woodstock

WOODSTOCK, N. B., June 24.—The agricultural commission held its first public meeting in the town hall here yesterday afternoon with a fair attendance of farmers and business men. Besides the members of the commission, H. P. Timmerman appeared to watch the proceedings for the C. P. R. Mayor Balmain occupied the chair.

After a few words of greeting from the Mayor, Hon. Mr. Landry briefly addressed the meeting, complimenting the county as one of the most beautiful spots of the province. It was not the intention of the commission he said, to induce any politics in their work. When the Hazen government assumed the reins of power they had decided to ascertain what features of their predecessors' agricultural policy were good and worthy of retention, and also what might be added thereto. In order to get the information at first hand this commission had been appointed to go over the province. He greatly regretted the fact that our part of Canada is far behind the rest of the Dominion in agricultural matters, and ascribed the cause largely to the prevalent notion that only those who can do nothing else are fitted for farming. The commission had sent out a great many circulars all over the province asking information and from the replies thereto and the results of their own investigation he hoped to be able to formulate an agricultural policy which would be generally beneficial and acceptable.

Commissioners Hubbard and Fisher, as well as replies from several delegates concerning queries in the printed form, an apple growing and also an forms. There was a lengthy discussion on sheep raising. It seemed to be the opinion of the majority that a compulsory dog tax should be enforced.

H. P. Timmerman and J. Frank Tilley made brief addresses, after which the meeting adjourned.

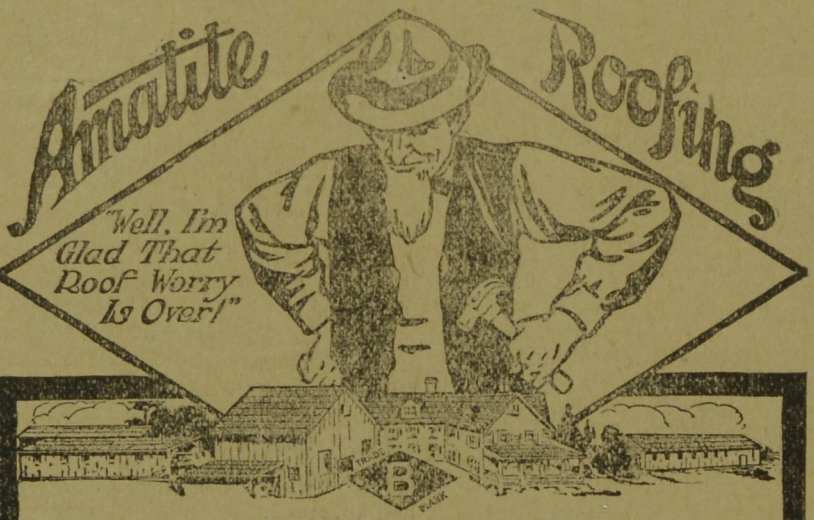

A WESTERN VISITOR

Relative of Hon. L. P. Farris who Resides Among the Mormons

After twenty-one years away from home, seventeen of which have been spent as a citizen of Salt Lake City, W. S. Farris of White's Cove, Queens County, a second cousin of Hon. L. P. Farris is on a visit to his old home on the shores of Grand Lake. Mr. Farris arrived in St. John a few days ago from Salt Lake City accompanied by George A. Smith of Harvey, York County, who also has made his home in the Utah capital. Both have prospered there. While in St. John Mr. Farris has been visiting his brother, Randolph Farris. Some months ago Mr. Farris expressed his intention of coming home on a visit and Mr. Smith made up his mind to accompany him so they journeyed together, leisurely enjoying the sights of the cities through which they passed. They have been away since June 6 and will return together about five or six weeks from now.

Speaking to a Telegraph reporter yesterday, Mr. Farris said that before going to Salt Lake City, he spent three years in Denver. In Salt Lake City he has established himself in the tea, coffee, and flavoring extract business, is a manufacturer and is also interested in mining. Mr. Smith is engaged in the transfer business.

Mr. Farris said he was surprised to find prices of groceries, dry goods, boots and shoes and other staple articles higher here than in Salt Lake City. He also was disagreeably impressed with the St. John streets and says there is a striking comparison between them and those of his adopted home. There the streets are paved in the entire business portion and they are kept scrupulously clean.

Salt Lake City, he said, has now 100,000 to 110,000 population and is growing rapidly. At present buildings to cost \$20,000,000 are under construction. In five years Mr. Farris believes there will be a population of 200,000. The city is 4,800 feet above sea level, the air is excellent and there is no chance for consumption there. The city depends chiefly on mining and farming and is the trade centre for Utah, Nevada
