CITY SCHOOL BOARD

Trustees Transacted Only Routine Business at Yesterday's Meeting

The monthly session of the School board was held yesterday, with Dr. Atherton in the chair, the other members present being Sheriff Sterling, Ald. Weddall, Mrs. Clark and Mrs. Lynch.

The business transacted was largely routine, owing to the absence of several of the trustees.

Secretary Sampson reported respecting truancy and general unsatisfactory attendance of late in several departments.

In all the schools the grading was completed last week, and the results will shortly be made known.

Eighty-three applicants underwent examination for admission to the High school, and probably the results will be known early next month.

The formal resignation of Miss Lillian A. Burr, primary teacher in the York street school, was accepted, and the secretary was instructed to convey to Miss Burr the Board's appreciation of the excellent work she has performed for the public, and every good wish for her future.

A number of applications were read from teachers in different parts of the province for a position on the city teaching staff. These will be considered and a selection made at a special meeting to be held next month.

An application was read asking for an increase of salary, and action was deferred.

A letter from the health inspector called for cleaning the w. c. of one of the schools.

It was felt that the Board should have a better rate of interest from the banks for overdraft account, and Sheriff Sterling was able to report improved terms, equal to the city arrangement with banks.

After order for payment of salaries and a number of accounts, the Board adjourned.

MANUAL TRAINING.

List of Those Who Have Completed the Course at Normal School.

The training course for special teachers of this subject closed yesterday. There was no public ceremony apart from the exercises of the general students, but a fine display of drawing, cardboard and raffia work and woodwork testified to the ability of the students. Several original designs by the students were carried out in wood and metal and much taste was displayed in this execution.
