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SCOTT ACT CASES

St. John Liquor Dealer Answers to New Charges at Woodstock

WOODSTOCK, Sept. 24.—(Special) —The cases of W. E. McIntyre of St. John, charged with four offences against the Canada Temperance Act in that he, that he said McIntyre did unlawfully ship liquors into Carleton county, came up before Magistrate Dibblee this morning.

Hon. W. P. Jones appeared for the inspector, and Alderman J. D. M. Baxter of St. John, and J. C. Hartley were on hand representing the accused.

After the formal reading of the charge, to which a plea of not guilty was entered, License Inspector Jones of St. John, was put on the stand. He deposed that W. E. McIntyre was a member of the firm of McIntyre and Comeau, having a wholesale license in the city of St. John. At the conclusion of Inspector Jones' testimony the case was adjourned until two o'clock. Locally there seems to be little interest in the proceedings.

BISHOP'S FUNERAL

Marked Tribute of Respect to Deceased Montreal Prelate

MONTREAL, Sept. 24.—(Special) —The side streets around Christ Church Cathedral were blocked this morning by the crowds who gathered to pay their last respect to the late Bishop Carmichael.

From 9 till noon there was a constant stream of people passing the pier. At noon the doors were closed, and the funeral takes place at two o'clock. The officiating clergy were as follows: Opening sentences, Paterson Smyth; Psalms, Archdeacon Kerr; and Principal Rexford; Lessons, Bishop DuMoulin, Dean Evans; prayers and benediction, the primate; prayers at the grave, Archdeacon Kerr.

Bishop DuMoulin was to have preached the memorial sermon next Sunday, but he has given it up, as he is too much affected.

IN FIGHTING TRIM

Young Liberals of City at Rousing Meeting Decide to Form a Club

The young men of Fredericton are with the Liberal party in this election, and are determined that York County shall pronounce in favor of Laurier and Liberalism on October 26th.

The meeting held Wednesday evening in the rooms over Farrell Bros' store, to consider a proposal to form a Young Men's Liberal Club, was a rouser in point of attendance and enthusiasm. Upwards of one hundred persons responded to the call, and after listening to brief addresses on the issue of the campaign unanimously decided to form a club.

Mr. C. H. Allen, was called to the chair and Mr. W. A. B. McLellan, Foster, Roblin, et al, so industriously stumping Ontario for their party in a brief address Chairman Allen expressed his pleasure at seeing such a large gathering and briefly explained its object. He thought that a Young Men's Liberal Club would be of great service to the party in this constituency.

AN INSPIRING ADDRESS

Mr. J. D. Phinney, K. C., was next called upon and delivered a stirring address, which was well received. He heartily approved of the proposal to form a Young Men's Liberal Club, and thought that it would be a grand thing for the young men of the party to band themselves together and make a close study of political affairs. He eulogized Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the leader of the Liberal party, and also spoke highly of Hon. William Pugsley, the minister of public works, whom he defended from the aspersions cast upon him by the Tories. He referred to Sir Wilfrid's speech at the Manufacturers' banquet in Montreal a few nights ago, when he stood up manfully and told the manufacturers that he did not propose to legislate for the classes as against the masses in the matter of duties on woollen goods. In this as well as on many other occasions, Sir Wilfrid has shown himself worthy of the high and responsible position he occupies. Mr. Phinney was very glad to see the young men of York taking an active interest in political affairs. In Mr. Brown they had an excellent candidate and one who would do his part to achieve a victory at the polls. It was true that he was not born with a silver spoon in his mouth, but he was a man of good education and would compare favorably with his opponent in every respect. His name had been received with marked approval all over the country, and it only requires good work on behalf of the party to elect him. Mr. Phinney concluded with some words of valuable advice to the young men on organization.

THE CLUB ORGANIZED

On motion of Mr. W. A. Walsh, seconded by Mr. A. E. Everett, it was unanimously decided to form a club to be known as the Young Men's Liberal Club of York County.

Chairman Allen submitted a copy of the constitution and bye laws adopted by the recently organized St. John Club, and they were gone over section by section.

There was some discussion regarding the age limit for members, which was taken part in by Messrs. W. H. McGinn, F. H. Peters, P. J. Hughes, Thomas Cain, W. A. Walsh and others. A motion that the age limit be from eighteen to forty years was finally adopted. It was also decided that provision be made for the election of honorary members.

The first seven sections of the St. John Club's constitution were adopted and the remaining sections were referred to a committee composed of Messrs. C. H. Allen, P. J. Hughes, and W. A. Walsh, to go over the same and make whatever changes may be deemed necessary.

It was decided to hold another meeting at nine o'clock this evening to complete organization and elect officers.

Before adjourning those in attendance attached their signatures to the membership roll.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

The Young Liberals of Fredericton heartily cheered Mr. Phinney's ringing defence of Hon. Dr. Pugsley, for they know that he has been unjustly traduced by the Tory muckrakers.

It was the Liberal government that gave the people cheaper postage—domestic rate from 3 to 2 cents, and to England and her other colonies the rate was reduced from 5 to 2 cents.

The Liberal government proposes to carry every man's mail in the rural districts to his very door. Free rural mail delivery is one of the greatest boons ever conferred on the country.

Mr. Hazen's Tory friends in York admit it was a great mistake to dismiss Mr. Brown from the inspectorate. They say if it had to be done it was a foolish piece of business to do it just before an election.

The local graft organ screams almost daily "Where does the money go?" Well, there is \$2,500 a year indemnity and travelling expenses for Brother Ossie, \$1,000 annual pension for Papa, and \$10,000 public printing only requires good work on behalf of the party to elect him. Mr. Phinney concluded with some words of valuable advice to the young men on organization.

Mr. Frank Smith, the Tory candidate in Carleton, boasts that nearly all the clergymen in the upper part of the county are supporting him. Perhaps they are trying to reform him, or perhaps they are like a clergyman nearer home, who would support anything in the shape of a Tory, and who denounces those who differ from him as thieves and grafters.

Senator Foraker of the United States, is the Geo. E. Foster of American politics. Foraker was billed to speak at Candidate Taft's western campaign meetings, but charges made against him in the press compelled the Republican National committee to call him off at the last moment. Mr. Foster in Canada is not permitted to appear in the same platform with his leader, for fear it would hurt the Tory party with the people.

A feature of the Liberal rally at Moncton Monday evening was a presentation in which Mr. John T. Hawke, editor of the Transcript, figured prominently, he being presented on his return from the British Isles and France with a handsome oak rocking chair by his many English and French speaking Liberal friends, as a token of his labor among them for the interests of the city and the Liberal party. But the Tories of Westmorland must not make the mistake of supposing that Editor Hawke is going to sit back in that oak rocker during this campaign, enjoying ease. The Moncton editor is not built that way, and he is already giving his opponents such hard knocks that they seem reluctant to push their campaign with any kind of enthusiasm or force.
