A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago

Another of our old and respected citizens, Mr. John Biggs, passed away last evening. Mr. Biggs was well-known in the community, and attained a ripe old age.

BASE BALL.

THE CHICAGO CUBS.

"When a pitching staff is not in physical condition to do good work the worst possible thing that can be done is to crowd it and attempt to make the men who are going bad come in winners," said Manager Chance of the Chicago Cubs recently.

"To push the men would be to demoralize the whole staff. That is exactly the condition in which the Cub pitchers are at the present time. There is just one man in shape to pitch winning ball—Mordecai Brown. If winning now staying at the top of the race, was the all important thing for us Brown would have to be sacrificed to accomplish that feat.

"Fortunately there is no need for anything of the kind. We don't have to stay on top this early in the campaign, and I would rather go back to second, third, or fourth place as the case might be, than take any chances of injuring Mordecai Brown's arm.

"That would sound as though I did not care where we stood in the race I do; I'd like to be at the top all the time; for my own nerves I'd like to be fifteen or twenty games in the lead all the time; but I know that is impossible; the other clubs are gradually climbing up to our level and we are going to have all we can do to win out this year.

"I have seen all the clubs in the league. I know pretty well their

strength and I know there is not a team in the league that possesses the ability of the combination that represents Chicago in the National league.

"That is the reason why I would not think of sacrificing Brown now I might work him to death and keep a good hold on first place for a time, at least, but it is more likely that later in the season at a more critical place, Brown would be worked out and of no use to us, and then we might go to the board. So, at present, Brown will work only in his turn and we will trust, to luck that the rest of our pitchers round to it time to maintain our lead, but if they do not we can drop to second or third without damage. The race is too close, and once we get into our swing we can cut out a fairly wide swath.

"Another thing that has handicapped us this spring is Kling's throwing. Fraser's 'spit ball' has worked havoc with that famous line throw that has cut down the base stealing of other clubs so materially in the past. One 'spit ball' pitcher can make a catcher bad in his throwing with all the other pitchers and that is what is happening to Kling.

NOTE.—Mr. C. H. B. Fisher had also announced his candidature in the Conservative interest, but retired before polling day. The Farmer noting the event said:

At a few minutes before 12 o'clock, Sheriff Temple took his stand on a table, set for the purpose in front of the county court house, and proceeded to read the qualifications necessary for any elector or candidate, while a goodly number of electors and citizens gathered around anxiously awaiting the nominations.

Hon. George E. Colter was then nominated by Dr. J. C. Mott, of Prince William, and the nomination was seconded by Warden Pinder of Millville.

MINING DEALS.

The C. P. R. are negotiating the purchase of several coal mines at Minto, Sunbury County, and the deal may be put through in the near future. A few days ago Superintendent Downie and Col. McLean visited the coal fields and after investigating the proposition returned to St. John very favorably impressed, and it is received from good authority that the purchase will take place this or next week.

The mines cover a large area near Minto, and by securing them the C. P. R. will cancel the large expense of shipping their coal from a long distance. A track could be constructed from Fredericton to the mines, a distance of about 30 miles.

The coal is considered excellent for steam, and although the vein is not deep, it extends for miles and miles. The owners of the mines interested are not mentioned, but several of the largest mines now under lease are said to be among those secured by the company.

Col. McLean and Superintendent Downie left last night for Montreal, where it is expected the turn over will be completed.

HOPEWELL CAPE, June 18.—Negotiations are about completed for the purchase of the copper mines at Goose Creek owned by the American Copper Company. The prospective purchasers are New York capitalists and include Dr. Hugo Von Hagen who is well known in this province, having been interested in other industrial developments.

Dr. Von Hagen and party accompanied by Geo. H. Trueman and Dr. Keith, of Moncton, and Leonard Martin, of Alma, came here yesterday in the steamer Wilfrid C., on their return from a trip to the mines.

The New York men were well pleased with the mines. They intend to begin operations on a large scale at once. The American Copper Company operated the mines for several years, but no work has been done for a year or two.

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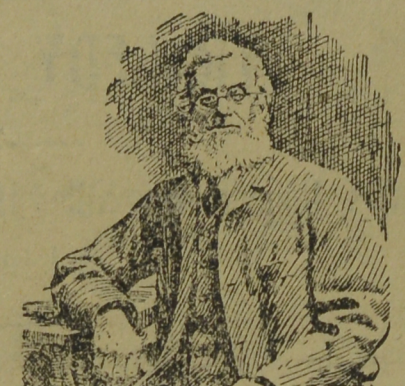
