YUKON MURDER.

HODGIN'S INQUIRY IS DEFUNCT.

Charges Being Withdrawn and Admitted False, the Investigation Comes to an End.

OTTAWA, June 18.—The Hodgins inquiry by a special committee of the house finally expired at 6.35 this evening, though the obsequies will not take place until Tuesday. It has been on point of death several times in the past few days, the chief prospective mourners being the Conservative members of the committee and the house, whose sympathetic feelings towards Major Hodgins have undergone rapid changes since that gentleman's frank withdrawal of all charge and imputation against the National Transcontinental Railway commissioners and their engineers. They will now be able to put on complete mourning and give vent to their agonizing sorrow over another imaginary scandal soon to be laid in the graveyard.

There was a long discussion this afternoon from three o'clock, when the committee met, until after five as to what course the committee should pursue. Messrs. Lennox and Barker, the Conservative members of the committee, maintained the attitude of yesterday, that the inquiry should go on notwithstanding the withdrawal by Major Hodgins and his counsel of this charges and imputations and the withdrawal from case of the major's counsel. In fact their language might be fairly described as rather cool in his references to the major when a little while ago they and their colleagues of the house were regarding in a very favorable light. Messrs. E. M. MacDonald and Carvell who with the chairman constituted the Liberal members of the committee quite ably upheld the view they had maintained since Major Hodgins withdrew his charges, namely that nothing remained but a difference of opinion as to the classification and that was a matter the committee could not decide, its settlement being provided for before the arbitration tribunal. The latter body consisting of the chief engineers of the Transcontinental and G. T. P. was they pointed out, already at work and had power to call in a third man in case of failure to reach an agreement.

Nothing now to investigate. At 5 o'clock the chairman, Mr. Geof. frion, M. P., who had hitherto been silent, raised a laugh by asking if he could say a few words which he proceeded to do by giving his view of the situation. The reference to the

LYING PRESS SCORED.

Just before adjournment Mr. MacDonald stated that some members of the press had sent out absolutely misleading and garbled reports of the evidence and proceedings. In future cases of that kind if there was any way of proceeding against the gentlemen who sent out such statements he proposed to take it. Mr. Carvell and himself had been misrepresented among other things as having from the beginning prejudiced the case. They could show this to be absolutely untrue. He would leave it to the other honourable gentlemen on the committee to say whether they had not endeavored to deal fairly and equitably in the case and whether these misrepresentations were not absolutely unwarranted.

Mr. Carvell said that so far as he had been able to read the newspapers the most vicious attacks had come from the Maritime Province papers. He concurred in Mr. MacDonald's views. Hon. Mr. Parent, chairman of the Transcontinental Railway Commission, also protested against the unfair nature of some reports, particularly in a Quebec City paper.

PICKED A WINNER

Cumberland Liberals Nominated Mr. J. L. Ralston for Parliament.

AMHERST, N. S., June 18.—The largest political convention ever held in Cumberland county met yesterday afternoon in the parish hall to nominate a Liberal candidate to contest the county in the next federal election. Every district in the county was represented by a full number of delegates.

Hon. A. B. Etter called the convention to order at three o'clock and stated the object of the meeting. On motion of Ex-warden Livingstone and Councillor Stonehouse, the nomination was unanimously tendered H. J. Logan, M. P. The motion was adapted by a standing vote. Mr. Logan was deeply affected and regretted that owing to throat and ear trouble he could not accept. His general health is good, but the physician has positively ordered a temporary withdrawal from active strife. He was going to step down into the ranks and fight for the candidate nominated by the convention.

Mr. Logan made an eloquent address and appealed to the Liberals to organize at once. With work and organization the victory would be assured.

Hon. W. T. Pipes, Attorney-General of Nova Scotia, and E. B. Paul, M. P., also spoke, declaring they would use their best efforts to elect the choice of the convention.

The nominating committee appointed presented to the convention the names of J. Layton Ralston, C. A. Lusby, J. H. Livingston, K. C., E. B. Paul, M. P. P.

The three latter gentlemen retired in favor of Mr. Ralston. The convention waited on him and tendered him the nomination. When he entered the

hall the enthusiasm was indescribable cheer after cheer being given. It was some minutes before he could be heard. He thanked the convention for the honor tendered him. He did not seek it, and thought of declining when entering the hall, but the reception was such that he could not say no. He would go in to win.

A resolution of thanks to Mr. Logan for services rendered was adopted unanimously.

Hon. A. B. Etter has been elected county president of the party. A resolution thanking A. D. Ross, editor of the Daily News, for services rendered as secretary of the party, was passed. Mr. Ross resigning after ten years' service.

B. S. Corey was appointed in his place. The convention closed with cheers for Laurier, Logan and Ralston.

J. L. Ralston, the candidate nominated, is a cousin and law partner of H. J. Logan. He is only twenty-six years of age, but has one of the largest law practices in the county. He is a brilliant man and has won a high name in his profession before the supreme court of Nova Scotia and the Supreme Court of Canada. He is also a splendid speaker and a hard worker. The nomination was most acceptable to all of the party.
