CONTRADICTS PRINGLE

Methodist Clergyman Says Moral Tone of Dawson Improved.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 20—Rev. J. R. Seymour, for two years pastar of the Methodist church at Dawson and for many years a worker in the various camps in British Columbia, gave an interview today in which he left the impression that the stories of immorality in the Yukon brought down by Rev. Dr. John Pringle were wholly for political ends. The opinion he said, was prevalent in Yukon that Dr. Pringle considered himself ill-used by the Liberal party and would take the stump against it. He considered that the moral standard in Dawson was quite as high as in any place of the same size in British Columbia. The police were exercising an oversight and seeing that the laws were properly enforced. The dance halls had all been wiped out by the council.

METHODIST CONFERENCE

Variety of Business Transacted Friday Afternoon.

MONCTON, June 20—At yesterday afternoon's session of the Methodist Conference the invitation to meet at Woodstock next year was accepted. Rev. Dr. Stewart moved, seconded by Dr. E. Evans, a resolution heartily acknowledging the great work the British and Foreign Bible Society had done and having heard the Rev. Dr. Campbell, the district secretary, upon the subject, records with great pleasure with the interest awakened and splendid work done by the Canadian Bible Society, and strongly appeals to the congregations under its care to sustain by gifts and prayer this most valuable ally of the Christian church.

Brethren Bell, Jewett, Stebbings, Gould, Rowley and Morris were recommended to go to college, and it needed they are recommended to receive special grants from the educational fund.

A new organization has this year been created in connection with the N. B. and P. E. Island conference to be known as the Laymen's Association. After some preliminary remarks from Rev. C. E. Manning of Toronto the following officers were elected for the year:

1st Vice-Pres.—J. Hunter White, St. John.

2nd Vice-Pres.—John J. Weddall, Fredericton.
Sec.-Treas.—R. Duncan Smith, St. John.

Also five laymen to compose the executive committee, J. M. Palmer, Sackville; G. R. Sangster, Moncton; C. A. Sampson, Fredericton; James Myles, St. John; A. E. Hamilton, St. John.

In order to carry on more effectively the work of this association committee of three was elected from each district with power to organize auxiliary societies in every church in their respective districts.

Those for the Fredericton district are J. M. Lemont, Howard Rogers, and Thos. Boulton.

MEMORIAL SERVICE.

At four o'clock the order of the day was reached (Memorial Service). This was one of the most solemn services of the whole conference.

The districts were called and the following ministers were named as having passed to their reward: Rev. Dr. Chas. H. Paisley, dean of theology in Sackville Academy, who after attending three services on the Sabbath, before the dawn of another day his Master, whom he was so glad and willing to serve, called him to his reward. Rev. Dr. Bracken was another who was named from the Sackville district. A brother whom to know was to love and one who was ever time or place and one whom Mother ready to lend a helping hand at any time will miss greatly, though his name will never be forgotten.

From Charlottetown district the name of Wm. Dobson, D. D., a man well known to all Methodists and all so to a host of friends of other denominations. After all the districts had been called, an opportunity was given the brethren to add their words of love and words of cheer given them at different times by one or other of the departed brethren. DOHERTY CLEARED

Evident Miscarriage of Justice in Murder Trial.

SUMMERSIDE, P. E. I., June 20.—The second trial of Alonzo Doherty, who shot and killed Joseph McMillan, who was at the time walking with a young lady on the roadside, ended yesterday, with a verdict of not guilty on the ground of insanity, after the jury was out two and a half hours.

The judge ordered prisoner to be placed in custody until the pleasure of the lieutenant governor be made known.

The judge charged at length, putting the evidence fairly before the jury. They had to consider the facts of the prisoner putting the revolver in his pocket on the fatal night, and walking along the railway track until he met the deceased returning with the girl, and that three shots were fired, although the victim fell at the first discharge of the revolver.

Then as to the plea of insanity, the judge thought the evidence very slight.

Notwithstanding this, and the able cross-examination of Attorney General Palmer, who designated the crime as deliberate, cowardly and atrocious the jury inclined to mercy and

A FINE MOTOR BOAT

Natty Craft Built and Equipped by Frank Whelpley

A fine motor boat, built by Frank Whelpley, the seventeen year old son of Mr. Charles W. Whelpley, was launched in the river on Thursday evening, and has since attracted much attention. Last fall it will be remembered young Whelpley underwent a critical operation in a Montreal hospital for appendicitis, and not being in robust health last winter, his parents did not consider it advisable to send him to school. Not wishing to idle away his time, and being anxious to own a motor boat that would travel with the best of them, he started in to build one himself, and succeeded beyond his most sanguine expectations.

After completing the hull he sent away and procured a six horse power motor, which he installed without assistance. The craft is of splendid design and finish, and has accommodation for about twelve persons. Her motor runs as smooth as clockwork, and it is said that she can outlast any craft owned in this locality. She is 22½ feet in length, is of light draft and behaves well in the water. Frank is naturally delighted with her and is receiving many congratulations upon his success as a boat builder.

Master Whelpley constructed a smaller motor boat two years ago, so that this is not his first venture in that line.

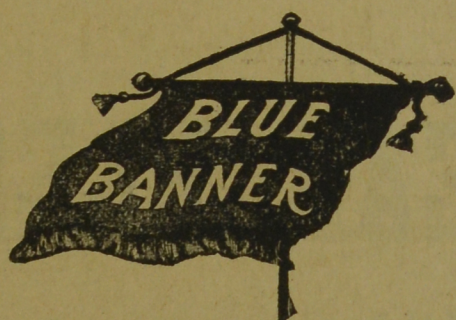
