

JENNIE WANTED TO GROW.

STOOD IN RAIN ON FOURTH FLOOR FIRE ESCAPE.

Standing in the rain on the fourth floor fire escape on No. 303 East 105th street, New York, because she wanted "to grow into a big girl," Jennie Florillo, five years old, fell through the opening to the ground and was instantly killed.

Jennie, who was small for her age, had several older and taller sisters, who have frequently told the child that she must hurry if she meant to catch up with them. When the rain came yesterday they laughingly advised her to stand under the shower which, they said, would surely add several inches to height. Jennie took their words seriously, and when the family gathered in the kitchen early in the evening she was missed.

Joseph Florillo, her father, found the window open, and outside, with the rain pouring upon her, stood the little girl. He ordered her inside, but she refused to come, pleading that she wanted to become as tall as her sisters. The father stepped forward to seize her arm. Jennie backed away from him, falling through the hole in the landing. Striking the railing at the third floor, she was hurled to the pavement of the court below, and when picked up was dead.

TO CLEAR CHICAGO OF DENS OF VICE.

LAW AND ORDER LEAGUE STARTS A CRUSADE AGAINST DISORDERLY RESIDENTS.

Chicago, June 10.—A crusade to stop the selling of intoxicating liquors in disorderly resorts and ultimately to drive these places out of Chicago, will begin when indictments against twenty-five or thirty of the keepers are returned by the grand jury to-day. Two indictments are sought against each proprietor one for the illegal sale of liquor and one for maintaining a disorderly house. The evidence was secured by detectives of the Law and Order League. The previous grand jury refused police regulations of the sale of liquor in these houses and referred the evidence to the present grand jury. It is understood indictments by each succeeding jury will follow until this illegal practice is driven out of the city.

HALF MILLION FOR INSANITY STUDY.

MILLIONAIRE PHIPPS, OF PITTSBURG, ACTUATED BY HIS INTEREST IN HARRY THAW.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 10.—Henry Phipps' gift of \$500,000 to Johns Hopkins University for the establishment of a clinic for the study of insanity, was prompted, it is said, by the plight of Harry Kendall Thaw, who was a great favorite of Phipps. Mr. Phipps thinks Thaw's case is one that should have received attention when he was young and long before it had landed him in a madhouse as a murderer.

DETROIT, Mich., June 10.—If rumors are correct Mrs. Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw and her mother, Mrs. Holman, soon will begin a quiet life in a cottage at Grosse Pointe, at Lake St. Clair. Howard Nesbitt, at present in Detroit, says he was hounded out of Pittsburgh by friends of Stanford White and that they are hampering him in getting employment in Detroit.

Howard is employed as solicitor for an outdoor advertising concern after a short stay with a typewriting agency.

"I get discharged wherever I go and the only reason is that my name is against me," he complains.

WANTED CHILD'S BLOOD.

Little White Girl Killed By Negro Wizards.

HAVANA, June 10.—In the town of Alacranes, Province of Matanzas, Victor Nakarro, a negro lad arrested on the charge of complicity in the kidnapping of Luisa Vandes, a white child, who recently disappeared from her home, has confessed that the girl was the victim of a band of brujos, or negro wizards. FORESTERS' HIGH COURT

Slow Progress Made in Respect to Readjustment of Rates.

Toronto, June 10.—After the whole of yesterday afternoon's discussion Supreme Court I. O. F. came little or no nearer the decision on the vexed question of rates than before. There was a great deal of oratory, but nothing was done. It appears that almost all the delegates have the rate problem thrashed out in their own minds, but so divergent are the views that nothing uniform can be obtained at present. So slow was the progress made that it is extremely doubtful if any decision will be reached to-day. The committee on rates brought that question down to three distinct propositions, but there is a great deal of difference of opinion regarding these. Interest in the discussion, however, never flags, probably for the reason that when the delegates return home they are supposed to make required explanations before their respective courts.

The first proposal calls for the re-rating of the members who have been paying on the scales of the rates prior to the 1889 increase. This re-rating would make these old members pay new rates just as if these had been in operation at their age of entry.

The second proposition is that recommended in the report of the supreme chief ranger. It would mean the adoption of a new scale to be paid by members who joined before 1889. One option of this proposal reduces the amount of the policy, but at the same time leaves the monthly rate the same as before.

Coupled with similar options the third proposition involves the re-rating of members on the basis of national fraternal congress basis for I. O. F. benefit at the attained age, giving to each member such reduction in his rate as such member's pro rata share in accumulated funds would entitle him to.

DEATH VALLEY SALT.

Huge Deposits of Saline Rock in the Avawatz Mountains.

Slowly, but surely, inch by inch, in the face of drought and intense heat, man is solving the mysteries of Death valley, and one by one its hitherto unlocked treasure vaults are being thrown open to add to the wealth of the world, says the Los Angeles Times. There is gold in large and in small quantities throughout the length of the valley, particularly at Skiddoo and other neighboring camps in the Panamint; there is copper at Greenwater, enough borax to supply the entire world for many a year, and now it seems probable that the district will soon be known as a large producer of rock salt.

These salt deposits are found in the foothills of the Avawatz mountains, at the southern end of Death valley and within sixteen miles of the Tonopah and Tidewater railroad. There are four distinct bodies, known as the Death valley, King, Salt basin and Jumbo salt mines. The salt appears to lie in ledge form with well defined walls, particularly on the upper or hanging side. The deposits have been well known to prospectors for many years, but it was not until the completion of the railroad that they assumed any commercial value. Years ago some of the material was freighted to the Tepeco mine for the chlorination mill in use on the property when it was mined for its high surface values of silver.

The Death valley mine consists of eighty acres, and it is upon this ground that the larger part of the present development of the deposits has been done. The showing is 500 feet wide by 1,000 feet in length, the salt being covered with wash gravel and mud to a minimum depth of ten feet. Where the salt has been most exposed to the elements it has dissolved and mixed with the mud and gravel, forming an incrustation harder even than the rock salt. The development consists of numerous

open cuts, tunnels and shafts, an penetrating the surface incrustation and showing pure salt in the faces. It is estimated that there are 250,000 tons of salt already exposed in this deposit. It is estimated that at the present time 5,000 tons of rock salt are imported into California from Liverpool and sells to jobbers at about \$16 per ton.

Public Cooking.

To buy one's own fowl or joint and watch it being roasted at a public "roisserie" at the rate of 5 cents a pound is a privilege possible for New Yorkers to enjoy. This method has all the elements of novelty to attract the inhabitants of bachelor apartments and the young couples playing at light housekeeping in limited quarters. Capon, squab and sweetbreads may be cooked here without fear of exchange for an inferior article, as the suspicious housekeeper is invited to sit down and watch her purchase being roasted on the automatically revolving spit. When done to a turn her property is delivered to her in a neat box, which she tucks under her arm.—New York Sun.

The Australian Way.

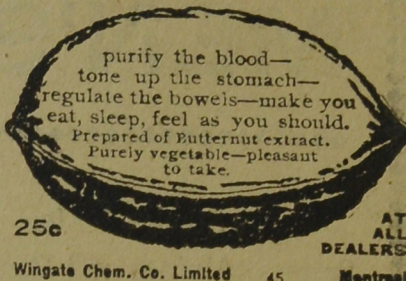

But they are not satisfied with the margin of profit, and they have decided in conference to raise the price to 14 cents. 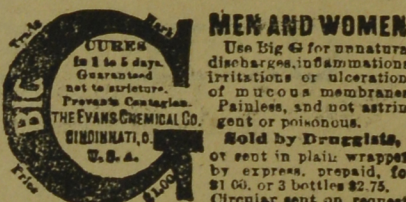
