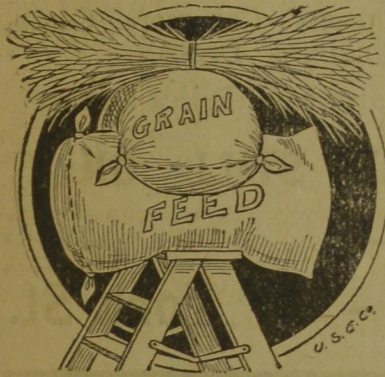

THE POLITICAL OUTLOOK

Tory Boasting of 1903 Recalled—Hazen not sure of a Dozen Followers in the next Legislature

The Telegraph publishes an extraordinary article, in which after abusing the government to the extent of almost a column, it proceeds to give its view of the situation.

It says that the campaign at this time finds the government "facing an aroused province with its prestige greatly diminished as compared with 1903, without effective campaign material, with tickets weaker in every constituency than its tickets were five years ago."

It is singular that the government can be any weaker than they were at the last election, because the organ then told us that "The revolt against the Tweedie-Pugsley corrupt rule was gaining force every day." The organ told us that "every indication points to the defeat of the government," that "the campaign shows bright prospects in all parts of the province."

Yet these bright prospects resulted in the government carrying thirty-six seats, and the opposition only ten. The Telegraph tells us that "the government has gone back and the opposition which was weak in 1903, today has excellent tickets in the field everywhere."

Yet the organ of the opposition in 1903 said: "The names of the opposition candidates are known. It is fair to ask the electors whether these are not men of influence and standing in their respective counties. No one can say that these candidates are not thoroughly representatives of the various interests of the country. Every fair man must admit that from this crop, a ministry can be organized, superior in ability and character to that which now rules this province."

Now the organ of the opposition, the Telegraph, proceeds to disparage these men and to say they were a weak lot. This surely is an insult to the men who sacrificed themselves to run for the opposition at the last general election, many of whom are now opposition candidates.

The Telegraph winds up its article with the following extraordinary

statement by way of prophesy.

"In Charlotte, St. John city, Kings, Queens, York, Sunbury, Carleton, Victoria, Northumberland, Kent, Westmorland, St. John county, Albert and Restigouche, the government cannot be sure of carrying a single seat. Unless the reports from every section of the county are altogether too rose-colored, the government is certain to be beaten and beaten badly. If work is kept up in every constituency until the last methods are lawless beyond precedent, we are about to have a change of government. The province needs it sadly."

According to this statement there are only two counties in the province, Gloucester and Madawaska, in which the government has a chance of carrying a single seat.

It is really kind of the Telegraph to permit the government to have a chance in these two constituencies. Of course this is all brag and bluster, such as we have been treated to ever since the campaign commenced. The utmost hope of the opposition is to carry twenty-four seats out of forty-six, which would give them rather a narrow margin on which to form a government. This, however, is only a hope which is entertained by some of their sanguine talkers. They have not the slightest expectation of carrying a single seat in York, Albert, Gloucester, Madawaska, Queens, Restigouche, St. John county, Victoria or Westmorland; they think they may possibly carry one seat in York, Albert, Gloucester, Madawaska, Queens, Restigouche, St. John county, Victoria or Westmorland; they think they may possibly carry one seat in Kings, but after the disclosures of the other day in regard to their liberty fund, that expectation is absurd.

Mr. Hazen will do well if he goes back to the house with nine followers behind him as he did in 1903.

But is Mr. Hazen sure of going back to the House, and what about Mr. Fleming?

LIBERALS VS. CONSERVATIVE

Mr. Hazen's Attempt to rope in Liberals to his Support Signally Failed—In his whole list of Candidates there is not one Straight Liberal

The electors of New Brunswick can now see the utter insincerity of Mr. Hazen's pretending that his campaign was not to be run on federal lines, he hoping thereby to secure a few Liberals in various parts of the province into voting for him.

There is not in the whole list of candidates on the opposition side a single man who can claim to be a straight Liberal, with the solitary exception of Mr. Morrissey of Northumberland, who it appears has not cast a Liberal ballot for the past eight years.

The fact that a man calls himself a Liberal does not make him one unless he has shown by his conduct that he is one, and that he is acting with his party.

This attempt of Mr. Hazen's to steal Liberal votes is quite in line with the rest of the campaign, but fortunately that bubble has been pricked, and now we shall have a

straight note on federal lines all over the province.

Any Liberal who votes for the opposition is voting against his own party and against the government at Ottawa.

Is any man simple enough to suppose that Mr. Hazen is anything else than a most determined enemy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's government?

If Mr. Hazen should be put in power, a thing of which there is not the least probability, the influence of his government would be used to weaken and destroy the influence of the government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in this province.

There was a time when a few Liberals did seem to be inclined to follow Mr. Hazen, but fortunately since the present campaign began these electors have, to use a baseball expression, "got on to his curves," and the leader of the opposition will receive no Liberal support on the 3rd of March next.

A HEARTY DEFENCE

The speech of Dr. Pugsley in the budget debate as admitted by every one to be the ablest ever delivered by him in the Legislature.

Even those who are opposed to him politically have to admit the talent he displayed in meeting the points made by the Opposition. Dr. Pugsley does not pretend to be the financial man of the Government, but his exposition of the condition of the finances was masterly and effective.

But his greatest achievement was his complete justification of the conduct of his Government with respect to the International and New Brunswick Railway and Coal Company.

If one might judge from the speeches of the Opposition it would appear as if they thought it was a very great wickedness for the Government to assist these two important enterprises which are likely to do so much for the resources of the province.

Dr. Pugsley was able to say that what the Government did for them was not more than its duty and was absolutely necessary unless the province was to take a backward step with respect to the utilization of its resources.

The New Brunswick Coal and Railway Company, which has acquired the Central Railway, is a line which will be of the greatest advantage, not only to the districts through which it passes and the city of Fredericton, but likewise to the city of St. John. It will form a part of the grand Transcontinental route of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

The advance of \$30,000 to assist it, at a time when the whole enterprise was in danger of failure through lack of means, is precisely similar to the advance made to the Canadian Pacific Railway by the Government of Sir John A. MacDonald, which saved that line from ruin and placed it in its present prosperous and useful condition as the greatest of American railways.

With regard to the International Railway, the action of the Government in assisting that important enterprise has been most praiseworthy, and now that line will open up a beautiful country to which there has been hitherto no access, and which in the course of time will become one of the most populous districts in the province.

The only government which would seem to suit the Opposition is one that will do nothing for the province, but that is not the kind of government that is under the Premiership of Hon. L. J. Tweedie, and the Attorney General Pugsley is the last man who would be likely to be a member of such a do-nothing administration.
