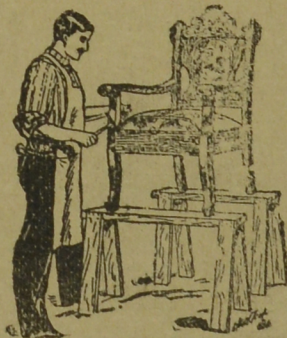

To the Editor of the Herald:

I have read with interest "an appeal to reason" which appeared in the Gleaner of Friday, signed by "Citizen A." There are some things in that article with which I agree, for instance, I agree that Scott Act or no Scott Act is not a question to be treated with indifference and that personal abuse should be avoided. But I cannot agree with him when with the modesty that always characterizes the total abstinence party, he claims for that party alone, all the virtues of purity and philanthropy and at the same time with a true christian charity that always marks the fee-total fanatic he ascribes to those who dared to differ from him all the vices of selfishness and indifference. I agree with him, if he deserves his side to win, that people should not choose "the side which evidences the stronger argument." It is rather difficult to make out to whom his next question is addressed, as few people feel inclined to vote for what they do not want, but the last paragraph of the question is worth a little notice. It runs thus, "if conditions will not be bettered what good reason have you for supporting license?" Let us see some of the advantages we enjoy under the Scott Act as now administered and some of the advantages we hope for under a good license law.

UNDER THE SCOTT ACT.

We have the uncontrolled sale of liquor.

The secret den where drunkenness is unchecked and where as much liquor as possible is sold to the drunkard.

Poisons, soul and body destroying sold as liquor.

Blackmailers and spies of both sexes under the guise of members of fee-total associations.

Social splits, quarrels among neighbors and distrust of each other.

The loss of personal freedom which is supposed to be the birthright of every British subject.

Hypocrisy, perjury and lying about liquor.

Will "Citizen" deny any of the advantages which I claim we enjoy under the present system? Of course he will deny any and all of those I claim for the license system. Now I come to a startling portion of "citizen's" letter, or it would be startling if anything connected with the Scott Act were not so appallingly inconsistent. I quote verbatim: "Don't be a hypocrite, be fair with your own conscience. Remember that no license does not mean Thou Shalt not Drink." Is this Scott Act teaching? It is certainly Scott Act effect, but I scarcely expect to hear that "Citizen's" brother fee-totalers have thanked him for his candor. In conclusion I would like to ask, why we Canadians have to look to the United States for examples in legislation. Is not the example of the Mother Country good enough for us?

KILLED WIFE IN LOVE.

Kentucky People Plead for Turner, Wife-Murderer.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 21.—On the plea that Edward Turner, condemned wife-murderer, has been reared in a God-less community, seventy-five citizens of Breathitt county, Ky., have sent letters and petitions to Governor Patterson of Tennessee, pleading for a commutation of his death sentence. Turner, who formerly lived in Breathitt county, is sentenced to hang on February 27. The plea of the petitioners is that the prisoner, brought up in a Godless community, never had an opportunity to know right from wrong; that his parents died when he was very young; that the wickedness of his wife unbalanced his mind, and that he killed her, not because he hated her, but because he loved her.
