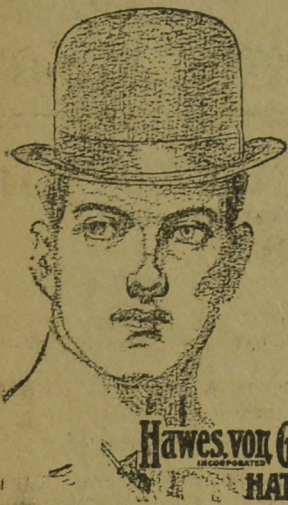

NON-ABSTAINERS WHO VOTE AGAINST LICENSE

To the Editor of the Herald:

Sir: There are men in this city not total abstainers, who are strongly opposed to the licensed saloon. They will vote against it on the 30th inst. and they have no apology to make for so doing. Is not such a course inconsistent? The advocates of license say so. The would-be saloon keeper says so and shouts "hypocrite" at them. The Licensing Committee says so and dipping its pen in righteousness marks opposite the names of such men the word, "Pharisee!"

Put these men have good and sufficient reasons for opposing license. While they have in moments of weakness patronized the bar, at their best moments they wish it a thousand miles away and would give a good deal if they had never contracted the habit of even an occasional glass. Moreover, their sensibilities have not become so blunted that they are forgetful of the welfare of others. Some of them have boys of their own whom they would like to shield from the licensed saloon, believing as they do that in proportion as the saloon is given a legal status and made respectable it becomes more dangerous to young men. They know the kind of men who would become licensees, should the Scott Act be repealed. They know that the influence of the saloon is bad, its atmosphere is bad and its associations are bad. They are morally certain that if licensed saloons are to be opened in the various wards of this city—four in each ward for the first 1000 inhabitants—many young men will be ruined and they fear their own sons might be among that number. There are some of the reasons why they will vote to sustain the Canada Temperance Act.

If there be inconsistency in the

course this class of men pursue it consists in this that, knowing what they do, they will not have any dealing at all with the liquor business. But they are not inconsistent when they vote against an institution the evils of which they know too well.

ASSESSORS' OFFICE,

City Hall, Fredericton, N. B.

The Board of Assessors of Taxes for the City of Fredericton in the present year, hereby require all persons liable to be rated, forthwith to furnish to the Assessors true statements of all their real estate, personal estate and income; and hereby give notice that blank forms on which statements may be furnished under the City Assessment Law can be obtained at the office of the Assessors and that such statements must be perfected under oath and filed in the office of the Assessors, within thirty days of the date of this notice.

Taxpayers who fail to comply with the terms of the City of Fredericton Assessment Act, 1907, as above set forth are not entitled to appeal from the ratings which may be made by the Board of Assessors in the Assessment Roll of 1908.

The Assessors' Office will be open from 9.30 a. m. to 12.30 p. m. and from 2 to 5 p. m., on every lawful day of the ensuing thirty days; copies of the Act and blank forms will be given out there and will be mailed to applicants upon request.
