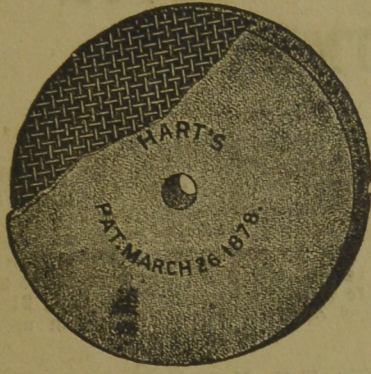
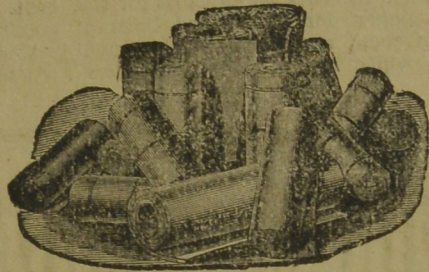

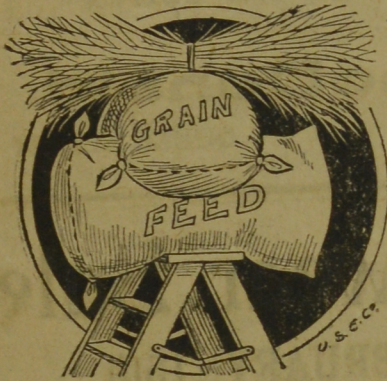

W. G. STAVERT IN CONTROL.
Sole Trustees in Affairs Of The Sovereign Bank.

TORONTO, Feb. 13.—The three trustees appointed by the guaranteeing banks to represent the allied banks in the affairs of the Sovereign Bank have tendered their resignation under an arrangement whereby Mr. W. E. Stavert, the present curator of the Ontario Bank, becomes sole trustee upon behalf of the guarantors. This arrangement was deemed advisable as it will permit the trustees to devote a large part of his time to the liquidation of the Sovereign Bank's assets. The original trustees were Messrs. Joseph Henderson of the Bank of Toronto, Alexander Laird of the Bank of Commerce, and A. D. Braithwaite of the Bank of Montreal. It is understood in financial circles that Mr. Stavert's appointment means that the rumors regarding the appointment of a curator were unfounded and that the expressed intention of the guaranteeing banks that the Sovereign would be wound up without the necessity of suspension will be carried out.

This is the third bank that Mr. Stavert has been instrumental in winding up on behalf of an association of banks. The first was the Bank of Yarmouth, and upon the completion of his duties in connection with the institution he was appointed to the curatorship of the Ontario Bank. Mr. Stavert is understood will retain his office in connection with the Ontario Bank while at the same time acting for the guarantors of the Sovereign.

MUST NOT SMOKE BEFORE AGE OF 16.

British Law Makes Sale of Cigarettes to Persons Under That Age a Crime.

LONDON, Feb. 13.—If a bill which passes its first reading in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon becomes law, juvenile smokers of cigarettes will have a hard time in indulging their appetite. The act is a government measure which amends the existing laws for the protection of children. It prohibits smoking under the age of 16, provides penalties for anyone less than 16 years old caught smoking in the streets or any public place and makes the sale of cigarettes to persons under 16 years a punishable offense.

Among other interesting features the bill establishes juvenile courts for special places of detention for children, instead of sending them to the ordinary prisons. It purposes, furthermore, that the imprisonment of children be entirely abolished.

An effort is to be made also to end the terrible waste of infant life through drunken parents tolling on their babies in bed. The return shows that sixteen hundred infants perish annually from this cause, and in the future parents will be punished for such deaths.

Burnings are responsible for almost an equal number of infant deaths and penalties are provided for persons who leave children alone in rooms with unguarded fires.

KAISER'S SON AT PARIS.

First Official Visit by German Prince Since 1870.

Paris, Feb. 13.—Prince Eitel Frederick, second son of Emperor William of Germany, who arrived here last night, accompanied by the members of his suite from Lishon, where he represented Germany at the funeral services of the late King and Crown Prince of Portugal, left Paris this afternoon for Berlin. This is the first time since the Franco-Prussian war that a member of the royal house of Prussia has come to Paris other than in a private capacity.

It is generally believed that the Prince's visit will have a good influence on the relations between France and Germany.

PERMANENT BRIDGES BUILT BY THE GOVERNMENT

Fifty-Eight Steel Bridges Already Built and in Use—
Surveys and Plans Prepared for Forty-Three
More—York County's Share

THE PRESENT GOVERNMENT HAS INCREASED THE BONDED debt of the province by \$1,992,019 during the twenty-five years they have had control. Of this increase in debt the large sum of \$1,484,152 has been expended in the construction of highway bridges and other useful public works.

Where their predecessors GAVE AWAY TEN MILLIONS of the people's money to political favorites under the guise or railway subsidies the present government is responsible for only \$367,000 paid out for railroad subsidies. The story regarding public works is altogether different. From the St. Croix to the Restigouche are to be found across every great river bridges built for the accommodation of the people. Bridges will shorten distances between two points, which facilitate travel and make life rosier and pleasanter for those who live in the rural districts have been erected in every county.

The government has constructed six great bridges across the St. John river and will soon commence another to replace the present suspension bridge at the falls. Changing conditions render a new bridge at the falls necessary, and the government always alive to the interests of the whole community, have had surveys made and plans prepared for the erection of a new bridge which will be capable of sustaining the traffic which has grown too heavy for the present structure. What is being done in St. John is what is being done in every section of the province.

Few people realize that the Provincial Board of Works has the oversight over 13,056 miles of roads on which there are 3,709 bridges, having a total length of 368,498 feet. As there are 4,861 spans in the 3,709 bridges in the province, it will be seen at once that many of these bridges are of more than one span. Under the various Permanent Bridge Construction Acts no less than fifty-eight steel bridges have been constructed, two and three in every county. Over a year ago the Chief Commissioner of Public Works ordered a survey made of the entire province, with the object of ascertaining just what bridges were necessary. When this was done plans were prepared and it was decided to proceed with those most required first.

At the last session of the legislature the government brought down a bill authorizing the construction of 48 bridges, all of a permanent character, at an estimated cost of \$881,000, the work of construction to be spread over a period of three years. The list of bridges to be provided for under this act as explained by the Chief Commissioner is as follows: In Madawaska County the bridge at St. Leonards, we propose to repair and partly rebuild at a cost of \$5,005. A new covered or steel bridge of concrete piers at St. Jacques, at a cost of \$15,000.

In Victoria County a steel bridge at Broadway costing \$6,000; at Talmont River a covered bridge costing \$3,000 at Three Brooks, a covered bridge costing \$7,000 and at Riley Brook a covered bridge of three spans costing \$7,000.

In Carleton County a covered bridge at Florenceville at a cost of \$15,000

and we propose to build at Bath a steel bridge on concrete substructure at a cost of \$25,000. In Charlotte County, at St. George a steel bridge at a cost of \$9,000 and a covered bridge at Young's, costing \$5,000.

In York County, in addition to the Fredericton bridge, there is the new steel bridge at Hawshaw, costing \$65,000, and the repairs at Patter-son's Gulch at a cost of \$3,000. In Queens County there is the new steel bridge on concrete piers at Chipman, costing \$40,000 and a covered bridge at the Narrows' Washademoak, partly wood and partly steel, on concrete piers, at a cost of \$36,000 and the Beech Bridge we propose to repair at a cost of \$1,500.

In St. John County, there is the Cushing's canal bridge, to have a new steel span at a cost of \$3,000 and the reconstruction of the present suspension bridge or the building of a new steel bridge capable of carrying the street railway at a cost of \$150,000.

In Kings County, at Titusville, a covered bridge costing \$15,000, also one at Hillsdale costing \$4,000. Then there is the covered bridge at Passadumcook, costing \$10,000 and steel bridges at Apohaqui and Roachville, each costing approximately \$10,000.

In Albert County there is the covered bridge at Saw Mill Creek, costing \$3,500 and the bridge at Mill Creek costing \$7,000.

In Westmorland County there will be the new steel bridge at Hall's Creek, costing \$15,000; Memramcook bridge, costing \$3,000. A steel bridge at Shediac costing \$15,000 and a new embankment at Hollow Creek at a cost of \$1,000.

In Kent County a new covered span at McLeod's Mill bridge, costing \$1,500 and a steel one at Cocagne, costing \$7,000 and a small steel bridge at Black River, costing \$6,000.

In Northumberland County, on the Northwest Miramichi, we have to construct six covered wooden truss spans on masonry piers, which we estimate will cost \$29,000. A covered bridge at Cain's Point, costing \$8,000, a steel bridge at Morrison, costing \$5,000 and a bridge possibly of steel and concrete at Donald's, at a cost of \$20,000.

In Gloucester County we have the Bathurst Station Bridge, which will cost of \$14,000 and the River bridge about \$15,000.

In Sunbury County there is the wooden Harts bridge, which will probably be rebuilt of steel, and masonry at a cost of \$15,000.

WHILE THE PREVIOUS ADMINISTRATION GAVE AWAY TO POLITICAL FRIENDS THE MONEY AND LANDS OF THE PEOPLE, AND ALLOWED THE OLD WOODEN BRIDGES TO ROT AWAY, THE PRESENT GOVERNMENT HAS PROVIDED PERMANENT BRIDGES OVER EVERY IMPORTANT RIVER AND GREATLY AIDED INTERNAL COMMUNICATION AMONG THE PEOPLE. THE OPPOSITION HAVE STEADILY VOTED AGAINST THE PERMANENT BRIDGE POLICY OF THE GOVERNMENT, BUT THE PEOPLE EVERYWHERE HAVE ENDORSED IT. AND WILL DO SO AGAIN, BECAUSE IT IS IN THEIR INTERESTS TO DO SO.

HARVEY STATION.

Feb. 12.—The recent storms were quite severe in this section. The roads in some places were blocked with snow for a short time, but are fairly good now. There is about eighteen inches of snow upon the ground here.

The Presbyterian churches have for the past two Sundays been supplied by Rev. Joseph McNeill, of Oueda, N. Y. The meetings in the Upper church were very small, owing to the inclemency of the weather, but at the Station, Mr. McNeill had fairly good audiences, and was much appreciated. He will return to St. John today.

Harry Little of Coburn, who was on Monday badly cut on the head while working in the woods near McAdam, was brought home yesterday. He is quite weak from loss of blood, but the wound is not considered dangerous, although very severe.

Mrs. Alex. Little of York Mills, who has been ill for some months, is not recovering as her many friends would wish.

Not very much interest is as yet being taken in the political contest, but will be warm enough before election day. The prospects for the government are becoming brighter, confidence having been strengthened by the nomination of a good ticket.

NEW YORK TO PARIS.

First Automobile Starts on Long Overland Journey.

New York, Feb. 11.—Three automobilists in a big foreign car started today on a 22,000 mile overland journey from New York to Paris. The start was made from the Pulitzer building, and the first stage of the journey will be completed at Philadelphia. From the Pennsylvania city the automobilists will strike out straight across the continent. The occupants of the car are Eugene D. Louvier, Maurice Droege and Max Hohmann. The regularly organized New York to Paris run with three French, one Italian, one German and one American entrants, will be started at 11 a.m. tomorrow. The route will be across the continent, through Canada to Alaska, across Bering Strait and thence to the French capital.

SUFFRAGISTS' STRATEGY.

Renewed Attack on British House of Commons.

London, Feb. 13.—A band of militant delegates from the "Parliament of Women Suffragists," now in session here, made a vigorous assault on the House of Commons today. Their attempt to rush the doors of the lobby, however, was frustrated by the police, who had a sharp skirmish with the shrieking women, two score of whom were arrested for disorderly conduct. The attacking party was trying to deliver to the House of Commons a resolution protesting against the Government in refusing a vote to women taxpayers.

The delegates secreted themselves in furniture vans in the vicinity of the building, and were thus enabled to get close to the point of attack before being discovered.
