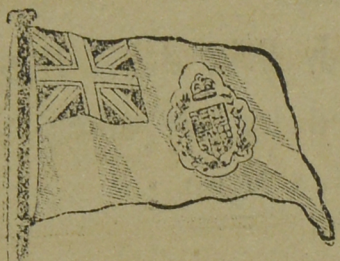

TORY HYPOCRISY

Mr. Hazen and his friends attack the government policy of providing for more permanent bridges throughout the province but in the legislature they failed to vote against the proposition.

Indeed opposition members including Mr. Fleming put in strong plea for a new bridge at Bath in his county, yet he is assailing the government in this campaign because they are adding to the public debt by erecting more permanent bridges.

What do the electors of York think of this plan of opposition attack?

Will the Tory candidates in this constituency declare that the government should not have constructed the new steel bridge at Hawkeston for the accommodation of the up-river parishes?

Are they prepared to assert that the government should not have provided for the erection of a new steel bridge at Fredericton?

Do we understand Mr. Fleming as objecting to the \$150,000 expended in the construction of the Woodstock bridge, or the Hartland bridge?

Does Mr. Hazen desire to go on record as opposed to the construction of the new steel bridge at Oromocto, and is Mr. Maxwell opposed to expending a large amount for a new bridge over the falls at St. John to replace the present suspension bridge now in decay?

All these great public works require money and it is not available from current revenue.

The government has had to take authority from the legislature to borrow money for the construction of permanent bridges, the opposition assented to the proposition, yet they have the temerity to attack the government for increasing the public debt.

Such hypocrisy and double dealing is unworthy of any party, but it is the course Mr. Hazen and his friends have pursued and are pursuing, and the electors of New Brunswick will give these gentlemen their answer on March 3rd when they vote in overwhelming numbers in commendation of the government's course in constructing useful public works demanded by the people.

TORY ALARM

The bumptious little police court lawyer at Ottawa has given the whole Tory snap away.

The attack in Parliament on Dr. Pugsley, the local government and its candidates, is an open confession that the Tory opposition in this province have abandoned all hope of carrying the elections, and are sending out a cry of distress.

It was a very brave piece of business to attack the Minister of Public Works when he was hundreds of miles from Ottawa, and the political ghouls who exhibited their nastiness dared not make their accusations in the presence of the gentleman whom they tried to discredit.

All the scurrility which Mr. O. S. Crockett has been dishing up in the local Tory organ for months was let loose in Parliament, when he stood up on his little legs to attack gentlemen who were absent and thus unable to notice his falsehoods, which however were given prompt and absolute denial by the premier, who must feel the humiliation of having to even listen to the diatribes of the little fellow soon to be returned to his former obscurity.

The presence of Dr. Pugsley in New Brunswick to take a hand in the provincial election was the signal for the Tory attack in Parliament, and the malignity of it is proof that Mr. Hazen's friends recognize certain defeat in the present campaign.

The minister of public works, as an elector of New Brunswick, and as the late premier whose administration and whose personal acts are being misrepresented and maligned has a perfect right to take a hand in the provincial elections, and he has also a perfect right as New Brunswick's representative in the federal cabinet to resist with all his power the Tory effort to take possession of the provincial government.

He is here for that purpose and the fact that the Tories realize his prestige and influence in the fight is made clear by the yelping which some of their number indulged in in parliament in his absence.

Let them yelp and howl like a pack of wolves, disappointed at the certain prospect of defeat, but let them abandon their campaign of deceit, and falsehood.

Dr. Pugsley will be with the local government to the end of the campaign, as it is his right and duty to be and every true Liberal in New Brunswick will assist him in his efforts to prevent the government of this province from falling into the hands of the Tory party.

Later when the opportunity comes to rid parliament of such obnoxious political adventurers as attacked the minister of public works in his absence, the constituencies now misrepresented by such men will promptly do their duty, and return worthy Liberal members to Parliament.

A VALUED RECRUIT

Liberals are lining up all over New Brunswick in support of the local government. The latest distinguished recruit is that veteran journalist, Mr. Michael McDade, who in the last provincial campaign rendered Mr. Hazen splendid service in organizing his party in the various constituencies and securing candidates, but Mr. McDade is first and foremost a Liberal and when he discovered that Mr. Hazen and his friends were really running a Tory campaign, while courting Liberal votes he decided that his place as a Liberal was at the back of the Liberal local government, Mr. McDade, in an exhaustive communication to the press gives his reasons, unanswerable ones, for his present support of the government.

CURRENT COMMENT

It really looks now as if Mr. Hazen will not have a dozen supporters in the next legislature.

Premier Robinson spoke at St. George Thursday evening, and was given a very flattering reception.

O. S. Crockett and Geo. W. Fowler recognize defeat for themselves in their constituencies when the federal election comes around, and are discharging their nastiness in parliament before their opportunity passes.

When Mr. O. S. Crockett stood up in parliament and declared that Hon. E. H. Allen was promised the collectorship of customs in this city as a condition of accepting nomination in York, he stated what he knew to be a deliberate falsehood.

It is said that in a certain district in this county, when the Tory ticket's nomination papers were presented to members of the party for signature, they absolutely refused to sign their names until Mr. Pinder's name was struck off.

"Strike Mr. Pinder's name off the list or we will not sign the opposition nomination papers," was the ultimatum which met Tory canvassers in one of the most important sections of this electorate, and they struck it off. It was humiliating to the party and deadly for Pinder, but there was no help for it.

The York Tory candidates have failed to discover any reaction against the government in this constituency, and the personnel of their ticket is so discredited and unpopular, that they have absolutely no hope of success. They have already discovered that the campaign of bluff and bluster will not work with the intelligent York electors.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson took occasion in parliament to remind Mr. Geo. W. Fowler of a few things, and to warn that famous land dealer of his insecure political position in New Brunswick. Mr. Logan of Cumberland also had a few words with Mr. Foster who, although dismissed from New Brunswick, continues to poke his meddlesome nose into the affairs of this province.

Mr. Foster came down to New Brunswick in 1898, called the Moncton Tory convention and declared that the pending provincial elections must be run on Dominion lines, but he whines now because the Liberals insist that the present campaign is one between Liberals and Conserva-

It did not take Sir Wilfrid Laurier long in parliament to properly characterize the misstatements of Mr. O. S. Crockett. THE CAPITALS WON

Defeated Marysville Crescents in good Game at the Arctic Rink

The Fredericton Capitals added another to their long list of victories in the provincial league hockey match at the Arctic rink last evening, the score standing eight to one in their favor. It was one of the fastest and cleanest games seen here this season, and was much enjoyed by the large crowd of spectators who witnessed it. Capt. John D. MacDonald, who has been on the shelf since the Capitals and Victorias crossed sticks here a few weeks ago, was back in his old place at cover point last evening, and did his part towards achieving a victory. Williams and Oren, who were lately under suspension, were also into the game last evening. There were some changes in the Marysville team, and they made a much better showing than they did on the last occasion when they faced the Capitals at the Arctic rink.

The Capitals simply put it all over their opponents in the first half landing the rubber into the net no less than seven times, while the Crescents came in for a shut out. In the second half the Crescents put on more steam, while the Capitals appeared to take things rather easy. The score in this half stood 1 to 1, which gave the Capitals a total of 8.
