

INTERNATIONAL STREAMS

Some Details of Important Measure Dr. Pugsley has Introduced in Parliament for Lumbermen's Protection--G. T. R. Terminals at St. John

A reporter of the Sun interviewed the Hon. Dr. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works regarding a bill which he has introduced into parliament, entitled, "An act relating to international streams." Dr. Pugsley stated the object of the bill was to enable the Dominion Government to have better control over the Canadian portion of rivers forming the boundary between Canada and the United States. It provides for no sheer booms to be attached to the shore or into the bed of any international stream without the same being first approved of in a license granted by the Minister of Public Works. It also provides that the licensee on such terms and for such length of time as he may deem it advisable. It also provides that if any person places or maintains any such sheer boom or other boom on the Canadian side of the centre of the main channel of any such river where it joins the boundary line without such licenses, he would be subject to a penalty of not less than \$100 and not exceeding \$1,000 for each day that such boom is maintained.

This measure the Minister said, would prove very beneficial to mill owners upon the St. John river and probably upon other international streams, because now it is possible for persons to erect piers and booms on the American side of the river and by means of sheer booms attached to the Canadian side so divert logs flowing down the river, intended for mills lower down, into such booms on the American side as is the case at Vanburen on the St. John river, and so cause a great delay in inconvenience and loss to mill owners lower down the river.

The effort of the bill will be to

prevent this being done unless a license therefor has been granted, and the Minister of Public Works would be able either to refuse the license, in which the playing of the sheer boom on the Canadian side will be illegal, or he may impose such safeguards and conditions as will protect Canadian mill owners.

He also wished to discuss with them the matter of the possibility of providing permanent facilities of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Courtney Bay. Dr. Pugsley said that he had been waited on by Mr. Hays, the president and Mr. Morse, the general manager of the G. T. P., since the visit of the latter gentleman to St. John. They were both greatly impressed with the advantages which Courtney Bay would afford for terminal facilities provided the bottom was of such a character that it could be dredged without too great expense.

He had also desired to meet the members of the provincial government upon the question because the province owns the foreshores upon the eastern side of the bay, and it would be necessary for the government jointly with the city to make a conveyance of such foreshores in case the terminal facilities for the G. T. P. were to be provided there.

He had a very satisfactory interview with the Premier and several of his colleagues upon the subject and they had expressed a willingness to make such conveyance.

The subject of having borings made in order to test the character of the bottom had also been discussed, and the government had expressed its willingness to join with the city in bearing the expense of making such soundings.

Setting aside \$30,000 annually to provide a Sinking Fund, which will pay off, within fifty years, the General Bonded Debt, outside of that for bridges.

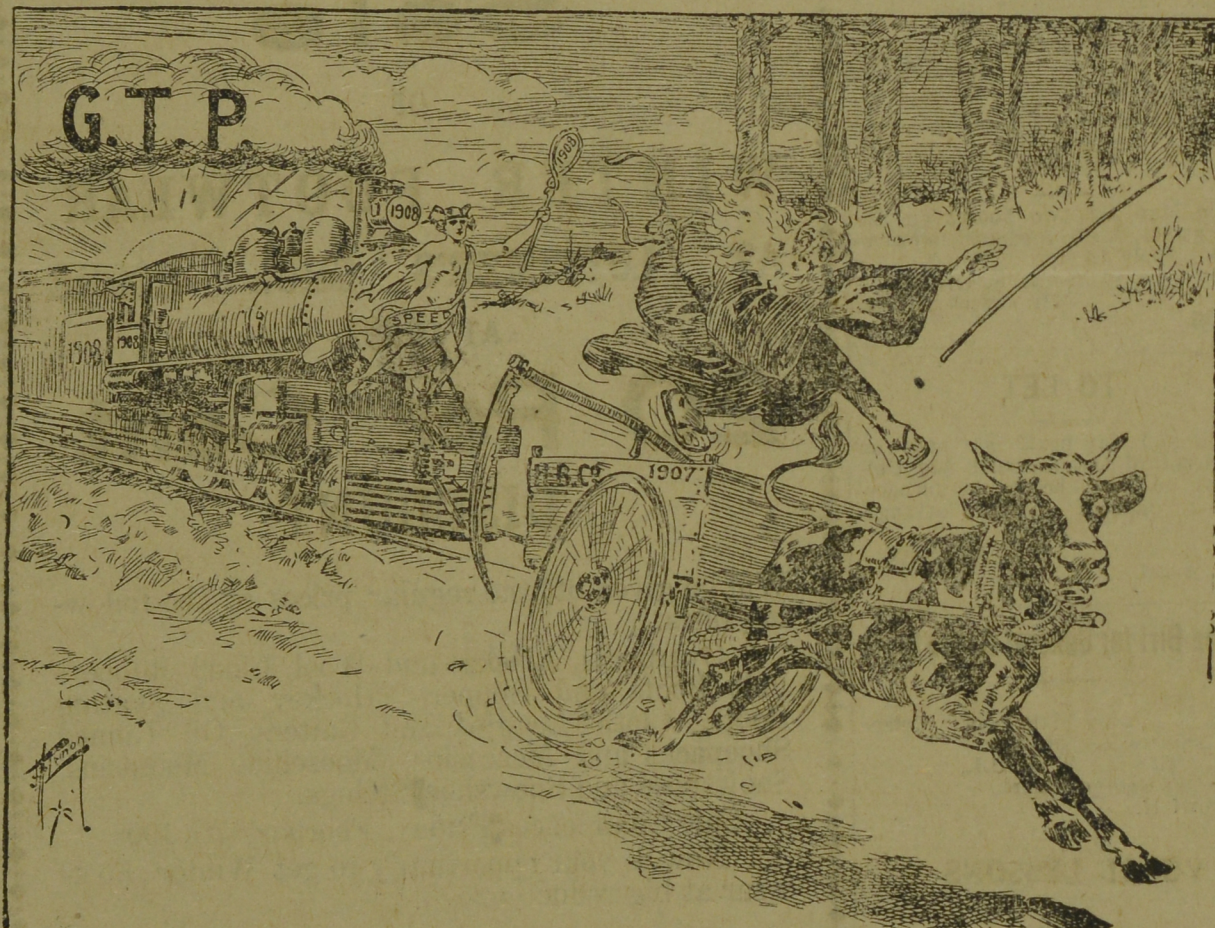

ROBBERS TERRORIZED TOWN.

They secured \$12,000 by dynamiting and Wrecking a Bank.

Rich Hill, Mo., Feb. 13.—Securing \$12,000 in cash after dynamiting and totally wrecking the \$9,000 building of the Farmers' and Mechanics' Bank in this city, five bandits, heavily armed, terrorized the town here early today, and after exchanging shots with several armed citizens escaped to the rough country south of here. No one was injured by either the shots or the explosion. The dynamiting of the vault of the bank awakened the town, and the population hurried to the bank building. Many arrived in time to see the robbers rifling away. Some of the citizens opened fire, which was returned by the fugitives.

Cashier J. W. Jamison said the thieves had secured all the available cash in the bank. The building was completely wrecked and many neighboring structures shattered by the explosion. The sheriff of the county organized a posse, but as the robbers secured a good start, there is little prospect of their being overtaken.
