TO SPEAK TONIGHT

Candidate Goodspeed will Attend Rally at Government Committee Rooms

Coun. Clarence N. Goodspeed, one of the government candidates for the legislature, is in the city today, and will be the chief speaker at a rally to be held at the government committee rooms this evening. Coun. Goodspeed is not only a clear and forcible speaker but he is beyond a doubt one of the best informed members of the York County Council. At the January meeting of that body when a motion was made to reduce the grant to the Victoria Hospital, the institution found a valiant defender in Coun. Goodspeed, and his speech on that occasion had considerable to do with defeating the resolution. Coun. Goodspeed has always been an active worker in connection with exhibitions held in this city, and is deserving of the hearty support of the electors of this city. The friends of the government should rally in force to hear him this evening.

MR. ODBUR MORGAN DEAD.

Mr. Odbur Morgan, formerly of Upper Hainesville, died at his home on York street this morning, after a lingering illness, brought on by cancer of the stomach. He had been a resident of this city for twelve years, and was well known and highly respected. For upwards of thirty years he has carried on business as a dealer in firewood, and was thoroughly honorable and straightforward in all his transactions. He was sixty-four years of age, and leaves a widow but no children. He is survived by two brothers, Mr. C. B. Morgan, caretaker of the parliament building, and Fred Morgan of Upper Hainesville, and two sisters, Mrs. A. J. Hoyt of Millville, and Mrs. John Dunlap of Upper Hainesville. The funeral will take place at 2.30 p. m., tomorrow, with services by Rev. A. A. Rideout. Interment will be made at the Pickard burying ground, Douglas. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the funeral arrangements.

PURITY IN POLITICS

Opposition Committee Rooms Invaded by Delegation of Clergymen

As previously stated in the Herald delegation of clergymen, representing the Social and Moral Reform Association, invaded the opposition committee rooms yesterday afternoon, and presented resolutions calling for a pure election. Brief addresses explaining the object of the movement were made by Bishop Richardson, Rev. Father Carney and Rev. J. W. McConnell, who composed the delegation.

Mr. A. D. Thomas, who acted as chief spokesman for the opposition party, strongly approved of the proposal to conduct the election without those subtle influences, which sometimes cut quite a figure in political contests, and closed by moving a resolution endorsing the proposal made by the clergymen, and authorizing the appointment of a committee of twenty-five to confer with a like number from the Liberal party.

Rev. Dr. McLeod, speaking for the opposition party, seconded the resolution, and took advantage of the opportunity to offer a few remarks. He spoke of the election of 1900, when he had been a candidate, and claimed that the party to which he belonged ran a pure election on that occasion. On behalf of one of the opposition candidates in the present contest, (presumably His Worship the Mayor) he could promise that he would do everything in his power to carry out the principles of the Social and Moral Reform Association. In connection with elections in which he (not the mayor) had taken part in the past not five cents had been expended to his knowledge.

The resolution was adopted and a committee of twenty-five was named to meet with the government committee.

DRIVING PARTY.
