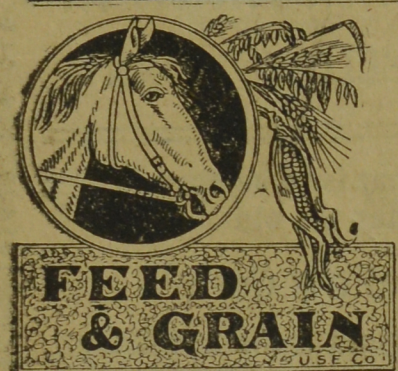

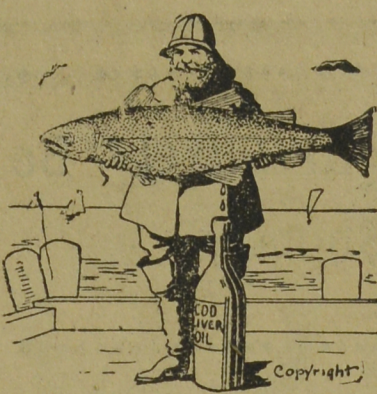

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, or daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties, by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father or mother, (if the father is deceased,) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

Six months' notice in writing must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands, at Ottawa, of intention to apply for patent.

TERRIFIC COLLISION

Eight Persons Killed in Maryland Electric Railway.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 6.—In a head-on collision between two special cars of the Washington, Baltimore & Annapolis Electric company, last night, eight persons were killed outright, and a score of others were seriously injured, some of them perhaps fatally. The collision was due to a confusion of orders, as the line has been running several extra cars each way in connection with the commencement festivities at the naval academy.

The Flight of Birds.

The course of flight is a distinguishing characteristic of many birds. The grouse rises gradually while flying in a straight course; the woodcock rises to a height of several feet or even yards, then flies straight away; the cuckoo's flight is also in a straight line, but peculiarly arrow-like, being graceful and silent, the long slender tail and body of the bird still further suggesting an arrow. A number of the birds, notably the brown thrasher and the song sparrow, progress in short flights, as from bush to bush, with a queer eccentric or bobbing motion, as if their flapping tails were a great hindrance. A Wilson snipe flies in a zigzag line, a goldfinch in long undulations or bounds. All of these and many other ways of flying can be indicated by dotted lines in the note book, supplemented by such words as "sailing," "rapid," "slow," "heavy" or "graceful" flight and "rapid," "slow," "silent" or "clattering" wing beats; the wings of the grouse hum, those of the woodcock and the mourning dove whistle.—St. Nicholas.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Further Proceedings of the Presbyterian Parliament at Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, June 6.—After paying a warm tribute to Principal MacLaren, the Presbyterian General Assembly yesterday accepted his resignation with regret.

The address by Dr. J. Wilbur Chapman of Washington, on evangelistic work aroused much enthusiasm and interest. He was introduced by Principal Patrick as one of the greatest evangelists. He made a strong plea for closer attention of the assembly to evangelistic work. He said he was commissioned by the General Assembly of the United States, which met in Kansas city two weeks ago, to appear before this assembly and express the hope that the evangelistic committee would be appointed to carry on work in Canada similar to that in the United States. Every Presbyterian minister in the United States stood now for evangelism.

There was no problem of the city which the Gospel could not solve. It was only necessary to intensify preaching. He deprecated irresponsible evangelism and believed the church should train its own evangelists, using them on the frontier, in rural districts and city churches. He believed in professional evangelism, but the hope of the church was not in that branch. Pastoral evangelism was the ideal kind that counted. The private life, prayer life, public life, and pulpit life of the preacher determined the character of his work. He made the assertion that personal evangelism was necessary because the majority of people in the church had never won a soul to Christ. He closed by offering fully hearty co-operation and assistance of the evangelistic committee in the United States.

DR. GORDON'S VIEW.

A resolution by Principal Gordon expressed the appreciation of Dr. Chapman's address and named a committee to consider the whole question of evangelistic work, reporting later. Dr. Gordon said whatever the divergence might be regarding the methods of evangelism, and while all believed in historical criticism, personal grasp was essential. All the advantages could be combined with most fervent Christian evangelism. It was desirable to have organized rather than spasmodic evangelism, and the movement should be assisted by the committee to take oversight of the efforts for spreading the spirit of God throughout the land.

The report of the home missions of the eastern section was presented by Dr. McCurdy, who pointed out that the West was making heavy drafts on the men of the East. The need of men was emphasized by Rev. S. J. McArthur, who told of the difficulty of keeping up with gospel work in Newfoundland, Labrador and parts of New Brunswick.

The resolution was adopted. The report on Sabbath schools showed a marked increase in the four western synods in the number of schools reporting, the total being 2,919 (2,578 Presbyterian, gain of 64 and 341 Union, loss of 21). Total enrollment, including teachers and scholars in union schools, is as follows: Officers and teachers, 23,011, gain of 512; scholars, including Bible classes, 194,324, gain of 6,958; average attendance, 134,251, gain of 4,165; home department, 8,384, gain of 666; cradle roll, 8,992. Contributions also show marked increase, reaching total of \$162,521, gain of \$9,715.

FOUGHT SAVAGE DOGS.

Dr. Grenfell on an Ice Pack Defended Himself for 40 Hours With a Knife.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 6.—Battling for forty hours against a pack of hunger-maddened dogs on an ice pack off the coast of Labrador, with the temperature ten degrees below zero and only a knife to defend himself, is the thrilling experience that Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, the celebrated missionary physician, recently had. The story is told by Capt. W. Bartlett, of the steamer Strathcona, which has arrived here from the North.

Dr. Grenfell had left Battle Harbor, Labrador, to attend patients at another settlement ten miles distant, and was driven off the coast by a moving ice field, and into an area covered only with broken drift ice. Before he could stop the dogs, they carried him into the water. The dogs attempted to climb on Dr. Grenfell's back and he was obliged to fight them before he was able to climb on to a solid piece of drift ice. The dogs also succeeded in saving themselves.

With the wind blowing a gale, the temperature 10 below and night at hand the doctor thought he would be frozen to death, as his clothing was saturated. He cut his skin boots in halves and placed the pieces over his

back and chest to shield those parts of his body from the blast. As the wind and cold increased when night came on, he determined to kill and skin three of the dogs to afford him more warmth and to supply the other animals with food, fearing that, becoming hungry, they would tear him to pieces. As it was they attacked him savagely, biting him about the hands and legs.

The doctor spent a trying night. Wrapped in the skins of the dead dogs he still found it so cold that repeatedly he had to run about to keep up the circulation in the blood. Hoping that next day he would be in sight of land, though the ice was fast receding from the shore, the doctor took the legs of the dead dogs, and binding them together, made a pole to the top of which he attached part of his shirt to serve as a signal, and this eventually proved to be his salvation, as the flag was seen by Geo. Reid and others of Lock's Cove, Mare Bar, and they effected a rescue. Dr. Grenfell was made a companion of the order of St. Michael and St. George two years ago by King Edward. His work is supported largely by Americans.

Kitchener's Many Narrow Escapes.

Lord Kitchener, to whom has just happened his third accident in India, has met with many hair-breadth escapes during his marvellous military career. He has, says P.T.O., been wounded four or five times in battle, and once had a narrow squeak of being hanged as a spy. After the conflict at Omdurman, the Sirdar and his staff only escaped death by the merest luck, for they had hurried into the town before the order to cease firing had been given. In consequence, for several minutes shells were bursting all round the place where the general and his party had taken up their position.

During the campaign of 1888 Major Kitchener—as he then was—was hit in the side of the face by a bullet during a skirmish near Suakin. He was taken to the Nile to the hospital at Cairo, where, despite all the efforts of the surgeons, the bullet could not be located, the X-rays being then unknown. The wound was a healthy one, and very soon healed. The medical officers came to the conclusion that the bullet had worked its way out without being noticed on the passage down the Nile. One day, however, a tasty beefsteak was served to the patient, which he had no sooner attacked than he put his hand to his throat, exclaimed to the attendant, "If there is no bone in the steak, I've swallowed the bullet; I felt it go down." This proved to be the case.

EXCITING BEAR HUNT.

Mr. Bruin Himself is Shot Down and Chase is Given to His Consort and Cubs.

With guns, axes, clubs, knives and several other weapons, which might be considered the thing in the Rockies the inhabitants of a farming district about Lennoxville, Quebec, as well as many city sports, are on the war path for big game these days. The casus belli is a large black she-bear with a number of fatherless cubs, which are in the neighborhood, seeking unlawful prey.

There was another member of the family, a big burly male, but he met his end a few days ago. He had evidently been the most troublesome of the bunch, and several farmers of the vicinity complained of depredations on their flocks of sheep. Among the heavy losers was Mr. John Racey, the owner of a large stock farm. On Monday, a member of Mr. Racey's family walking in the orchard by the house, got the first glimpse of the miscreant, he beat a hasty retreat, and then out came Mr. Racey himself, armed with a double-barrelled self, armed with a double-barrelled gun.

Shot No. 1 took Mr. Bruin on the coco, but was only sufficient to anger him, and he came on valiantly to give battle at close range. Shot No. 2 did the deed, however, and the brute rolled over dead. On being weighed he was found to tip the scales at 218 pounds, a pretty good hefty for the species.
